What Is Rotary?


- ▶ The oldest SERVICE organization in the world

THE OBJECT OF ROTARY

THE OBJECT OF ROTARY IS TO ENCOURAGE AND FOSTER THE IDEAL OF SERVICE AS A BASIS OF WORTHY ENTERPRISE AND, IN PARTICULAR, TO ENCOURAGE AND FOSTER:

1. THE DEVELOPMENT OF ACQUAINTANCE AS AN OPPORTUNITY FOR SERVICE;
2. HIGH ETHICAL STANDARDS IN BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS; THE RECOGNITION OF THE WORTHINESS OF ALL USEFUL OCCUPATIONS; AND THE DIGNIFYING OF EACH ROTARIAN'S OCCUPATION AS AN OPPORTUNITY TO SERVE SOCIETY;
3. THE APPLICATION OF THE IDEAL OF SERVICE IN EACH ROTARIAN'S PERSONAL, BUSINESS, AND COMMUNITY LIFE;
4. THE ADVANCEMENT OF INTERNATIONAL UNDERSTANDING, GOODWILL, AND PEACE THROUGH A WORLD FELLOWSHIP OF BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL PERSONS UNITED IN THE IDEAL OF SERVICE.

- ▶ “The heart of Rotary is our clubs—dedicated people who share a passion for both community service and friendship.”







- ▶ Do things right


Motivation

- ▶ Each SAG selects their committee(s) for each Avenue of Service




Other District Committees


- ▶ District Governor elects Chairs for

- ▶ Ambassadorial Scholars

- ▶ Interact

In-school: youth meets during school hours, mandatory to have a Rotarian present

- ▶ Rotaract

To foster development of leadership skills via Rotary projects, connections for future membership in Rotary

Rotary Youth Exchange / Yex

- ▶ Rotary Youth Exchange is a secondary school international student exchange program. Started in 1929, RI hosts young people around the globe to experience new cultures.

Estimated that 9,000 students are sponsored by Rotary every year.

- ▶ RYLA = Rotary Youth Leadership Awards

Set Goals then Prioritize

- ▶ Know your priorities
- ▶ Keep clear goals
- ▶ Focus on the big picture
- ▶ Reward yourself at checkpoints
- ▶ Make deadlines/goals public
- ▶ Make your meetings more efficient
- ▶ Minimize interruptions
- ▶ Plan for crises

- ▶ “Every Rotary Project Anywhere In The World Always Started With One Person Who Had An Idea.”




Project Management

- ▶ **Project management** is the application of knowledge, skills and techniques to execute projects effectively and efficiently.
- ▶ It is a strategic competency for organizations,
 - Enabling them to tie **project** results to goals
 - To be able to complete projects on time and within budget

- ▶ Effective service projects do more than just offer a quick fix for problems. The most effective service projects:
 - Respond to real issues
 - Improve community members' lives
 - Incorporate the abilities of those who are served
 - Recognize the contributions of all participants as important and necessary



Project Plan Development

- Specific Tasks

Assign

- Individual Responsibilities
- Who does what, when, where, why and how

Budget

- Expenditures
- How much, materials, supplies

Income

- In-kind donations
- Goods and services
- Grants

Project Plan Development

- Check insurance coverage
- Do you need additional?

Funding a Project

- Do you need to fundraise?
- Get supplies?

Publicity


- What to do for publicity?






