## She Drives a Big Red Truck

Many of us met Linda Sundram at our 2011 District Conference in San Diego. She led a visit to Camp Pendleton where we paid a tribute to the fallen Marines at the Memorial Wall. Linda showed us the site for the Camp Horno Memorial Garden. Plan to donate to and to attend the Baby Shower for Camp Pendleton on October 18 and the Halloween Festival at Camp Pendleton on October 25. onsall retiree Linda Sundram never had children of her own, but the hard-charging fundraiser for projects at Camp Pendleton said she feels like a mom to the 70,000 or so Marines who call the Oceanside base home. "These boys are my babies," she said. "I would adopt them all if I could." Linda is a two time past president and full-time volunteer for the Camp Pendleton Rotary Club, which has raised more than \$500,000 for renovations, memorials, and family programs on base since it was chartered in 2005. Linda, who puts in about 60 volunteer hours a week, has spearheaded most of these projects out of a sense of personal obligation born from a personal encounter with a wounded warrior in 2007.

"People are so generous and wonderful," Linda said. "All you have to say is 'the Marines need' and there is an outpouring of help." Besides doing its own fundraising, the Camp Pendleton Rotary Club acts as a conduit for other clubs and charities that are unfamiliar with strict government rules and red tape. The no-nonsense Linda said she enjoys the challenge.

The Camp Pendleton Rotary Club and other Rotary Clubs donated funds to create the Memorial Garden for mourners who come to say goodbye to Marines who lost their lives protecting our freedom. Former Marines—Larry Bender, Chuck Anderson, , Leandro Carde and Joel Forman—laid a wreath at the site. A project especially close to Linda's heart is the base Memorial Wall at the Mainside parade grounds. Sandstone panels are etched with the names of more than 1,500 Camp Pendleton Marine Expeditionary Force members who died in Iraq and Afghanistan. The \$200,000 wall, underwritten with donations from many Rotary clubs, was conceived seven years ago after the mother of a Marine killed in Iraq begged the base commander to ensure that her son is never forgotten.



Running her fingers over the engraved name of Cpl. Brandon M. Hardy, who was killed by an IED in Anbar province on April 28, 2006, Linda said that his mother's wish has been fulfilled. "I can't do enough for these boys. When they say 'thank you, ma'am,' it's the best sound in the world," she said, her voice choked with emotion. "This is the best job I've ever had."

Linda climbs aboard her big red truck, which she uses to traverse an average 100 miles each day on the base, and drives away in a cloud of dust to pick up and deliver donated furniture and supplies to those young Marine families in need.

Did you know that many prominent politicians, leaders and business executives won their local Rotary Club high school speech contest? Any size club can use the competition to have a great community event at their club. Invite guest judges that could include: local political leaders, the police chief, business owners, college deans, professors, local celebrities and artists.

Students, parents, teachers and counselors should know that at the District Contest level the guest judges include University Deans and Professors. Two students who did not even place first, second or third in the contest caught the attention of the judges. One student was awarded a \$40,000 dance scholarship to LMU and another earned an \$80,000 art scholarship to Otis College of Art and Design! Imagine the buzz in your club and your community if your student accomplished that!

### Lucky Coin! Dave Harris

re you able to recite the 4-Way Test?

When I joined Rotary I didn't even know what the 4-Way Test was about. Soon I learned where it came from and how it helps us make better decisions about "the things we think, say, or do."

I was very interested in this little tool, since ethics or trying to make better decisions was my field of study in graduate school. I hold a Master's Degree from Princeton in Ethics and a PhD from the University of Chicago in Ethics and Society. But, I also soon discovered that many Rotarians are unable to recite the 4-Way Test when asked. If the 4-Way Test is part of what it means to be a Rotarian, how can club members make it part of their decision process?

Well, as I visited different clubs, I discovered that some clubs say the 4-Way Test as part of opening. The meeting: invocation or thought for the day, flag salute, and everyone repeats the 4-Way Test!

ne of the world's most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics is The 4-Way Test, which was created in 1932 by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor when he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy. He later served as Rotary International President. This 24-word code of ethics for employees to follow in their business and professional lives became the guide for sales, production, advertising, and all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company is credited to this simple philosophy.

Adopted by Rotary in 1943, the 4-Way Test has been translated into more than hundred languages and published in thousands of ways.

So, when I became our Club President, I instituted that practice at our meetings. Of course, even with it up on the screen most of us stumbled through it over the summer. But, by November or December, most of us could recite the 4-Way Test without looking at the screen!

Another small device I found was a little brass coin with the 4-Way Test on one side. I gave everyone in our club a coin and kept one for myself. That was 10 years ago and I have that same Centennial 4-Way Test coin in my pocket today!

That little coin became a little reminder and comfort to me over the years. I would sometimes take it out of my pocket and read it over again recalling some of the past tough decisions that I had to make. Many times I must admit some of the principles were in conflict. In one case, I needed to say something that certainly was the truth, but it would not build good will and better friendships by a long shot!

As I struggled with how to remain true to the words on that little coin, a small tactic and discrete way of conveying my message came to me. The result was a necessary message was delivered, it was taken in the right way, and the relationship was strengthened, when it could otherwise have been seriously damaged.

The recipient of that message was my son. Today I enjoy a still great relationship with him, his lovely wife and my 2 wonderful grandsons. I am so thankful I had the luck to use that little coin to create that unusual tactic. It worked. And, that little lucky coin with its 4-Way Test has done the same for me again and again.

So, you may want to adopt one of those little lucky coins and carry it, and its message with you every day!

## Rotary International Council on Legislation Drew Frohlich, PDG

very three years, Rotarians meet at the Council on Legislation (COL) to review and vote on proposed legislation. The Council gives us a voice in how our organization is governed. The COL is Rotary's "parliament." While Rotary International's Board of Directors sets policies, the COL is where Rotary clubs have their say in how our association of Clubs will be governed.



Clubs can submit proposed legislation to Rotary's 2016 Council on Legislation (COL). To do so, they must act soon. Even though the COL won't meet until April 2016, proposed legislation must be received by Rotary International (RI) by December 31, 2014. Club proposals must be endorsed by the district before they can be submitted to RI.

Accordingly, we have the following schedule if a club wishes to submit:

- October 17, 2014 Proposed legislation due to District Office November 03, 2014 — A ballot of the Club and District
- proposals and arguments will be sent to Club Presidents November 30,2014 —Completed Ballots are due to District Office
- December 15, 2014—District sends endorsed proposed legislation to RI

December 31, 2014—RI Legislation receipt deadline September 30, 2015 - Proposed legislation published April 2016 – 2016 Council on Legislation convenes

It is not required that you and your club make a proposal, but this is the opportunity to offer changes.

#### World Polio Day

ctober 24th, we observe both **World Polio Day** and the birthday of Dr. Jonas Salk, who developed the world's first safe and effective vaccine against this crippling and sometimes deadly disease. We also celebrate the fact that the world is on the verge of eradicating one of the most feared diseases of the 20th century.

Rotary Clubs are encouraged to contact their city governments and ask to have a Rotary Proclamation added to their city council agenda. Submit an article to local papers and blogs regarding your club's efforts to end Polio and to help celebrate World Polio Day.

This year, a End Polio Now: Make History Today Livestream event, including a global update on the current status of polio eradication, will take place on World Polio Day, October 24, 2014 at 18:30 pm CDT and will be streamed live at endpolionow.org. Clubs may plan to have a viewing party of the event, or incorporate it into existing World Polio Day plans. The archived video will be available following the live program.

To help with planning for World Polio Day events a toolkit is posted on <u>endpolionow.org.</u> Spread the word about the club's plans for World Polio Day activities. Visit <u>endpolio.org/storytelling</u> to submit stories and photos.
