## **TERMS OF REFERENCE (December 2019)**

To be reviewed annually.

#### **BELIEF STATEMENTS**

- Positive peace embodies the attitudes, structures and institutes that support and sustain a
  peaceful society. Peace is more than an absence of violence.
- Rotary International promotes peace through service projects, peace fellowships and scholarships to address the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, lack of access to education and inequality.
- Working together on service projects connects people and creates the potential of opportunities to build community, a sense of belonging and peace.

#### **MEMBERS**

- Membership is open to Rotarians and Rotaractors in good standing who have an interest to promote peace building and peace literacy, including:
  - o Peace Fellows and / or Peace Fellow Candidates
  - Past District Governors
- Membership will be capped at 15 members.
- Current membership: two Past District Governors, a District Governor Nominee, three Rotaractors and one Rotarian.

#### **MEETINGS**

- Meetings will be convened in-person or via Zoom on a bimonthly rotation unless otherwise agreed by the members.
- The chair will organize and call the meetings.

  Agenda topics will be generated by chair and members.
- Notice of meeting and agenda will be circulated by email one week prior to meeting date.
- The chair will circulate meeting notes within two weeks of the meeting.
- Non-members may be invited to attend the meetings for specific purpose, e.g. presentation of information on a certain topic.

#### **INFORMATION**

- Information will be shared via verbal or written communication.
- A brochure / pamphlet / website is to be developed.

#### **ACCOUNTABILITY**

- Members are accountable to the group.
- The chair shares information with the District Board.

#### **TRAINING**

- Members will access current resources on peacebuilding.
- Members will view Institute for Economics and Peace website and training videos such as the Peace Academy, What is Peace?
- Members will participate in Peace literacy workshops.

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#### **ACTION GOALS**

#### 1. Encourage and facilitate peace education conversations

- Build awareness and actions related to peacebuilding and peace literacy.
- Involve Rotarians, Rotaractors, Interactors, high school and university students in presentations and facilitated sessions about peacebuilding.

## 2. Gather and develop a data base of resources on peacebuilding including print, social media and video

- Develop a short video with information, testimonials on "what is peace? and model an
  interactive activity related to peace literacy. Have committee member available to make
  club presentations and / or online, via Zoom.
- o Provide links to the Institute for Economics and Peace Academy materials
- Provide links to the Rotary Action Group for Peace resources.

#### 3. Host information and interactive sessions

- o District Assemblies / Training Sessions
- Presentation by Rotaractors on peacebuilding activities
- Demonstrate connections between Rotary's areas of focus and peacebuilding.
   Peace Fellow presentation
- Explore Youth Exchange involvement.

#### District / Zone

- Provide information on peacebuilding and peacebuilder clubs utilizing videos, in- person presentations or via Zoom to District Clubs.
- o Develop and distribute a speaker list on Peace Fellowships and Peacebuilding
- Explore options to share within Zone 28 & 32.

# 4. Create, plan and deliver an interactive information session for the Spring District Assembly

 Develop a 30- minute session that provides information and opportunities to explore and experience peace building and peace literacy activities.

### 5. Promote and educate about peacebuilding in educational institutions and community

 Explore collaborations with the University of Alberta Department of Education, Edmonton Public Schools, Concordia University and other institutions and companies.

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#### **SUMMARY STATEMENT**

Peace is the foundation for progress and well-being.

Goal 16 of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals states, "To promote just, peaceful and inclusive societies."
