


ROTARIAN MAGAZINE MONTH

POLIO—"THIS CLOSE" Is Not Close Enough

The polio virus is sputtering. It has one finger of the last rung of survival. If we turn our backs now, it WILL take the opportunity to regain a firm grasp. "This Close" is not enough.

The continued National Immunization Days being held in vulnerable areas are having very positive effects. As of the first week of April, only 21 cases have been recorded worldwide compared to 47 at this time last year. Twenty of these are in Pakistan and one in Afghanistan. Rotarians and other key groups continue to work hard on delivering the polio vaccine despite the extreme danger to volunteers. Thanks to continued support from the Bill & Malinda Gates Foundation, every \$1 of contribution to polio eradication becomes \$3. Ω

HELENA SUNRISE ROTARIAN RETURNS FROM NID IN INDIA

Belle Marie of the Helena Sunrise Rotary club participated this year in the polio National Immuniza-

tion Day (NID) in Nuh, Haryana, India. Nuh, a predominately Muslim community, is located approximately 45 miles from Delhi and endures ongoing poverty. The goal of NID throughout India was to immunize 170 million children per day against polio during the five day immunization campaign.

During the NID in India, over 2.3 million volunteers administered two drops of the life-saving oral polio vaccine to children less than five years of age. India was declared polio-free in 2014 after three years with no new cases. However, continued vigilance is particularly important in India because neighboring Pakistan experiences high rates of polio cases as a result of resistance to immunizations in some communities. According to WHO, "As long as a single

child remains infected, children in all countries are at risk of contracting polio. Failure to eradicate polio from the last remaining strongholds could result in as many as 200,000 new cases every year, within 10 years, all over the world"

Rotarian Belle Marie commented, "As polio immunization volunteers, we were welcomed by Indian communities. It was a privilege to participate in NID with other Rotarians from all over the world, and it's exciting to think that our work assisted efforts to make polio the first human disease to be eradicated in the 21st century."

HEART WARMING HELP

Thanks to the generosity of medical equipment manufacturers and Benifis Health Systems, Great Falls Rotarian Dr. Roberto Cattaneo and his medical team were able to save the lives of 6 children during his February trip to Ethiopia. The children needed repair or replacement of heart valves due to damage caused by rheumatic fever. The replacement heart valves cost between \$5,000 and \$10,000 each.

If access to penicillin was easier, these and other children in developing areas of the world could be spared this deadly complication that is now almost non-existent here at home.

PARTY TIME (FOR KIDS) IN BOZEMAN

On May 16th, for the 6th year, Bozeman Sunrise Rotary members – in conjunction with our community partner Ressler Motors - will again host nearly 500 kids and parents at their FREE FISHING DAY event at East Gallatin Recreation Area. Activities begin with registration at 9:00am followed by fishing on Glen Lake from 10:00am to 12:00 Noon. Lunch will be provided for everyone at no cost thanks to more Rotary partners including Wheat Montana, Foodservices of America and Lehrkind Coca-Cola.

The event is open to all kids ages 1-13. Each child will receive a goodie-bag with food, beverage, gear and certificates. Prizes will be awarded in each age category for boys & girl for the MOST fish caught and the LARGEST. Kids are encouraged to bring their own gear; but, limited loaner equipment will be available on a first-come, first-served basis at no cost. Fishing is free, for kids only, through a license exemption provided by Montana Fish Wildlife & Parks for this 2-hour period. FWP is also generously donating and planting nearly 1000 rainbow trout into the lake days before the event. Being added this year are more kid-friendly activities including on-site Face Painters and an inflatable bouncy house.

Sunrise Rotary started this event in 2010 to showcase the upgrades to the Park, especially the nearly \$200,000 restroom, changing and concession building built in 2009 by members and corporate partners. With the building addition, it has been easy to encourage more visitation to the Park on a year-round basis and better utilize the natural assets of the Park. In 2011, Rotarians built a new patio for larger group gatherings and provided upgrades to the volleyball courts. In 2014, a new fishing and diving dock at the lake's edge (adjacent to the patio) was installed. All told, Sunrise Rotary has invested nearly \$500,000 of its own member funds, funds from fundraising events (like the Golf in the Dark tournament), corporate sponsor efforts, and contributions from state and municipal grants as well as Rotary Worldwide and District grants.

What's next after fishing? Families can look forward to their newest event next winter, Rotary SnowFest, with more details forthcoming. (Information provided by Mike Banville, Bozeman Sunrise Rotary) Ω
