FIVE INTERVIEWED FOR YOUTH EXCHANGE

Youth Exchange applicants from the Bozeman and Missoula areas were interviewed on December 7th in Helena. Each student's parents also met with the interview team. A long term exchange is a serious commitment for the students and their families. Submitting an application is no guarantee that a student will be selected to represent our district as a YE student in a foreign country.

All five of the applicants have been accepted and each will be

assigned to one of the following countries: Austria, France, Taiwan, Ecuador, and Brazil. Students are asked to submit a preferred country with the understanding that they may be assigned elsewhere.

Our district will be accepting five (5) inbound students for the 2014-15 school year. At least three clubs are needed to host one of these students. Clubs interested in participating are asked to contact District YE Chair Daryl Hansen as soon as possible.

POLIO SURVIVOR AT ZONE

Most Rotarians of a "certain age" know someone who had polio back in the days before it was eradicated in North America. Few of us have seen a polio survivor whose mode of transportation is crawling. At the Zone Institute in Bastrop, Texas on December 13th, there was silence in the room as we all watched a young man pull himself along by his arms as his malformed legs dragged behind him. Ramesh Ferris was born in India in the mid 1970s and con-



tracted polio as an infant. The love of his birth mother and a caring adoptive couple from Canada provided Ramesh the opportunity to grow into a man who is making an enormous international difference in the polio eradication effort. Through fundraisers, meetings with heads of state, and public appearances, he is inspiring thousands of people around the world to End Polio Now. of your fellow club members or trying to gain support for an idea of your own. Supporting the idea of others and taking a stand for an idea of your own is great but the important part is knowing when your decision is wrong and then graciously backing away.

© Boosting confidence in others.

Many members leave the club because they don't feel appreciated, become de-motivated or are not given the opportunity to participate in projects in the way they had hoped. A good leader recognizes the power of recognition and tries to always boost confidence in others by celebrating club accomplishments through the members. Acknowledging the work of others and celebrating it together with the club is a simple and easy way to boost member confidence. It helps to validate that they are doing great work.

③ Asking for help.

Asking for help shows you respect that individual's expertise and judgment. It makes the person on the other end feel more important and part of a team. It brings forth a sense of unity and as such you show your club

members that their ideas, suggestions and feedback on whatever the topic may be, matters and will be heard.
Owning mistakes.

As a person in a position of influence, failures will often lead back to you in some way. If the matter is small, rather than playing the blame game and pointing fingers, accept the mistake on behalf of the club and acknowledge the lesson learned. Use this a training tool so a similar mistake can be avoided in the future. Let your members be proud to be part of a club, that even when mistakes are made, the club sticks together as a family, just as you do in times of celebrations.

Just as in the workplace, club members will feel a sense of pride if they are shown appreciation by those in leadership positions. Sometimes, all it takes is a little listening and a sincere support.
