THE POLIO CHALLENGE IN MORADABAD, INDIA

(Article edited from a letter by Ashok Mahajan, Trustee for The Rotary Foundation and a Director of Rotary International, 2007-09)

Moradabad (India) has probably earned the distinction of hiding the polio virus in small pockets that are not visited by the Rotarians or health workers. This city still poses a challenge for the polio eradication program. RIPN Kalyan Banerjee and I decided to visit the place before the NID in January 2010. It is the wish of RIPN Banerjee that polio be eradicated from India before he becomes RI president in 2011. Both of us decided that the New Year's resolution will be to activate clubs in District 3110 to fight the virus to the finish.

(We) noticed that the routine immunization program was deficient in certain areas and the markings on the houses revealed that the children had not been immunized. Deplorable sanitary conditions were noticed in most areas and extremely unhygienic drinking was what people were consuming. This is an area where clubs can concentrate their efforts and bring about a visible change.

Like many small villages in countries south of our US border, the average person has

probably never heard of El Maguelar, Honduras. And, like many other villages, clean drinking water was only a dream until Rotary and other groups decided to step in and give them a hand up. Thanks to Rotary clubs in Texas, Bozeman Noon, Big Sky, and many others, the town of El Maguelar now has
