

Supporting Rotarian Efforts Through Giving

How do the 1.2 million Rotarians around the world accomplish so much? Volunteering millions of hours is part of the answer. The other part is the financial support provided by Rotary members, their families, and friends.

Many Rotarians become Sustaining Members and give \$100+ each year to the Annual Programs Fund. Some make a one-time donation; some pledge part of their estate to the Permanent Fund for future support. Another avenue is the Donor Advised fund which is used by individuals, clubs, and groups to determine where their money will be used.

An easy way to make sure your contribution reaches The Rotary Foundation each year is Rotary Direct. This automatic payment program allows you

to determine when and how much is charged to your credit card monthly, quarterly, or annually. If you want to make sure that half of what you contribute returns to the District in three years for use in local and international projects, have your donation designated to the Annual Fund-SHARE. You may also make automatic contributions to PolioPlus through Rotary Direct.

NEW DISTRICT FOUNDATION COMMITTEES

Eight new district level committees have been created to help operate the new grant model for Rotary Foundation and district grants. Many of the grant oversight duties that were handled at The Rotary Foundation level will now be the responsibility of the district.

These new committees include: Audit, Fundraising, Grants, Vocational Training Teams, PolioPlus, Reporting (grants), Scholarships; and, Stewardship. Each group has been given a written description of their duties and responsibilities. Some, like the Grants committee, are already meeting in preparation for the changes coming in the 2013-14 Rotary year.



More than 40 Rotarians volunteered to serve on the various committees after attending the Foundation Seminar in Butte on October 20th. There is still room on several committees if you are interested in being involved in how our Foundation contributions are handled here in Montana. POLIO—Knock-out Punch Needs Funding

In late September of this year, Rotary International made a pledge of an additional \$75 million dollars over the next three years to aid in striking the final blow to the polio virus worldwide. Rotarians have contributed more than a billion dollars to the eradication effort since the program began back in the 1980s. With polio cases now only in the hundreds throughout the world, the final knock-out punch is on its way; but, it can not hit the polio target without continued support from Rotarians and others in the form of financial contributions and many volunteer hours to organize and carry out national immunization days in countries around the globe.

As of November 14, 2012, there have been 187 cases reported in four countries: Pakistan (54); Afghanistan (27); Nigeria (101) and Chad (5). At this time last year, there had been 520 cases. For more information about the global initiative, visit www.polioeradication.org.
