CLUBS MAKE FUNDRAISING CHALLENGES

Challenge #1: The Rotary Club of Missoula has thrown a challenge on the End Polio Now table—see who (Rotary, Rotaract, and Interact) can donate the most money to polio eradication—Griz fans or Bobcat fans (Bozeman clubs have already accepted the challenge). Besides raising money for polio, it is a great way to increase awareness of Rotary in our state. Ideas include tailgate parties, dinner parties, artist paint out, garage sales, bake sales—any idea that can raise money and awareness. The winner will be determined based on per capita contributions between October 1 and November 23 (the big Cat/Griz game in Bozeman). For more information, contact Lauretta Belts, president of the Rotary Club of Missoula.

Challenge #2: The Missoula Sunrise Club is donating \$1000 and sponsoring a grant to make much needed improvements (for the health and safety of campers) to the kitchen at Luccock Park (our RYLA camp location). A total of \$12,000 is needed to install a high temperature dishwasher and a convention oven (which allow more meals to be prepared and at a proper temperature). Whitehall is challenging other clubs in the district to match, on a per capita basis, that of Missoula Sunrise. Whitehall's match is \$500 or (continued on page 3)

DISTRICT FOUNDATION MAKE-UP CLASS HELD

Several dozen Rotarians gathered in Butte on October 12th to complete their club's eligibility to apply for grants. Since this is the first year under new grant guidelines, the district decided to provide a make-up program for those clubs who were close to qualifying or needed to go through the entire process.

District Foundation Chair David Kinsey was assisted by other district leaders and members of the district foundation committee in explaining how the new system works. Club members were able to ask questions and provide input on where they felt improvements could be made.

Perhaps one of the most difficult items was the new deadline to apply for a District Grant. For many years, clubs could apply after the start of the Rotary year. From this point forward, grant proposals must be submitted no later than March 31st of each year. For clubs wanting to do projects during the 2014-15 year, their grant proposals must be submitted by March 31, 2014.

Clubs should check the district web site before using any of the grant application forms since many forms have been updated or modified since July of this year. Ω

IN CASE YOU MISSED IT—PBS PROGRAM ON POLIO

The PBS series, Religion & Ethics, recently had a very enlightening segment on polio in Pakistan. The episode, which aired on Montana PBS on October 4, 2013, is titled "The Francis Factor, Supreme Court and Prayer, Pakistan Polio."

You can watch the segment for free my going to PBS.org and select-

ing Montana. Enter a search for Religion & Ethics; select the October 4th program. The polio segment is at about the 16 minute point of the program.

Pakistan is one the three countries still struggling to eliminate polio. The program explains the many challenges, radical's religious opposition

being just one of them. People interviewed include a Pakistani Rotarian and a woman doctor, each explaining their views of solving the polio problem in their country.

Pakistan faces a number of challenges in eradicating polio—vaccine fear is one.

about \$25.00 per member.

RYLA is the largest group that uses the camp. Our district anticipates staying at the camp for at least six more years. The camp facilities have allowed our RYLA program to increase attendance by about 40%. There are few other camps in the state that can handle our size group and those are either at a more inconvenient location for the majority of participating clubs and/or have a

much higher fee.

ANNUAL PEACE PARK ASSEMBLY—SUMMARY REPORT

The 81st annual meeting of the WGIPPA was held on September 13-15 in Waterton, Alberta, Canada and hosted by the Rotary Club of Calgary South. Districts represented included 5390, 5360, 5370, and 5080. Total attendance was about 140. Terry Allen from Calgary South was elected Vice-president and will start his term in 2015. Marshall Gingery from the Rotary Club of Helena will be the Vice -president for 2015/16 and become president in 2017. Newly elected directors for the board include Carl Ernst, Rotary Club of Miles City; and, Dr. Dan Gingham, Rotary Club of Helena. The other districts will have their proposed directors selected at the WGIPPA meeting scheduled for March, 2014 in Lethbridge, Alberta.

Presentations were provided by Jeff Mow, Glacier National Park Superintendent, and Ifan Thomas, Waterton Park Superintendent. They focused on highlights and issues affecting the parks during the past 12 months. Mr. Thomas' talk on "Parks in Canada's High Arctic was very well received.

Rotary Peace Scholar and Rotarian Martha McMannus summarized her work as a peace conciliator in many world conflict zones; Garth Toombs, DGE from District 5360, spoke about his work with orphans in Uganda. The Saturday luncheon featured respected Blackfoot elder and former Chief of the Pookani Nation, Chief Reg Crowshoe. His focus was on the decision-making and mediation processes used as a consultant to governments and educational institutions. Saturday evening featured conservationist, attorney, writer and photographer, Harvey Locke. He spoke about his work on the Waterton-Glacier Peace Park and the Flathead Valley wilderness and landscape conservation. He is the founder of the Yellowstone to Yukon Conservation

Society.

Youth Exchange students from both sides of the border attended and were looked after by members of the Rotaract Club in Lethbridge. They each had an opportunity to say a few words to the attendees during the Saturday evening festivities.

The traditional "Hands Across the Border" ceremony was held on Sunday morning. This includes attending Rotarians, family members and guests as well as representatives of both countries—Montana Highway Patrol, Border Patrol, park rangers and Canadian Mounted Police are annual honor guards.

Rotary International Directors will be reviewing approval of the **Peace Park Fellowship** at their November meeting. Once approved, the Peace Park Assembly can become an official Rotary function. Ω
