Rotary honors World Polio Day on October 24

Rotary members throughout the world will honor World Polio Day on October 24, a day to celebrate all the children who are living poliofree thanks to vaccinations.

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 30 years. As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we have helped reduce cases of polio by 99.9 percent.

There is still work to be done. Two new cases were reported in the Philippines, where the program began in 1979. It costs only \$3 to vaccinate a child against polio. It costs \$100



million to conduct polio surveillance worldwide. In 2017, 430 million children in 39 countries were vaccinated, thanks to Rotary members like you.



New District Committee launched to help Clubs enhance Vocational Service programs

When Paul Harris decided to launch a new club in 1905, he wanted to emphasize the expertise and experience that Rotary Club members could offer to their community. Thus, Vocational Service became one of the Avenues of Service still integral to the work of Rotary throughout the world.

What is your club doing to enhance the high, ethical standards of business and professions? Do you recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations? Do your members view their occupations as an opportunity to serve society? Those ideals are the second object of Rotary, according to DRFC Sue Carstens, who recently announced the formation of a new District committee to support Vocational Services.

To promote networking among Montana clubs and to expand vocational service programs in the state, the new committee, dubbed Vocational Service Sub-Committee (VSSC), will serve as a resource for all Rotary clubs.

DG Sandy Wong said that the vocational service efforts of the clubs are effective when a club recognizes the needs of communities in which the club is located and uses the various areas of experience and expertise among its members to meet these needs. Sandy noted that while Rotary International and the District should assist in these efforts, to be successful, Vocational Service programs need to start at the club level utilizing this valuable resource of their members. She said that clubs will be encouraged to form their own clubs' Vocational Service committees.

Vocational Service crosses the spectrum of community service and includes youth programs such as book giveaways and mentoring at the elementary and junior high level. Programs at the high school level often work through and with the Interact Clubs and career counseling offices. These programs include student mentoring and working with guidance and career counselors, as well as Professional Learning Communities in the schools and school districts.

Beyond the high school level, Vocational Service works with Rotaract Clubs, veterans groups and other service organizations to assist young adults and seniors. These programs may include one-on-one counseling and group meetings with Rotarians.

Vocational Service programs also provide assistance to business, civic and social organizations, offering the valuable expertise of Rotarians through presentations, seminars and workshops dealing with career, social, civic, community, educational and ethical topics.

The District VSSC will also publish a Vocational Service newsletter for Clubs to share topics and ideas on how to increase Vocational Service in their communities. Nigeria marks 3 years without a case of polio



Nigeria announced that three years have passed since it last recorded a case of polio, a key step towards eradicating the notorious disease in Africa, according to the World Health Organization (WHO).

This is a big change from 2012 when the country accounted for more than half of all polio cases worldwide. While it can be seen as a significant milestone, it will be several months before the country can officially be labeled polio-free.

Now, the WHO needs to make sure there is a robust surveillance system in Nigeria to be certain that there are no further cases of the wild poliovirus, the chairman of Nigeria's polio committee, said Dr. Tunji Funsho.

"We are confident that very soon we will be back here trumpeting the certification that countries have, once and for all, kicked polio out of Africa," said Dr. Matshidiso Moeti, WHO regional director for Africa.

Nigeria is the last country in Africa to have witnessed a case of polio — in Borno state, in the north-east. Outside of Nigeria, the last case on the continent was in the Puntland region of Somalia, in 2014.

Insecurity in the north-east of Nigeria had hindered the polio vaccination program, but success in fighting the Boko Haram militant group has been cited as one of the reasons behind the recent success.

In addition, officials have said that political support and an injection of funds have also helped. In 2018, there were a total of 33 polio cases confined to just two countries: Afghanistan and Pakistan. In 2019, two new cases were reported in The Philippines.

Matshidiso Moeti said the continent is "on the verge of an extraordinary public health achievement; one which will be our legacy to our children and children's children." But health experts urge caution.

They must first be sure that every part of the continent has been reached and no cases have been missed. For now, there are renewed calls to vaccinate children against polio. It has taken the effort of thousands of volunteers to deliver the much-needed vaccines to all parts of the continent.

Polio, a highly infectious disease, invades the nervous system and can cause total paralysis in a matter of hours. Initial symptoms include fever, fatigue, and headache. One in 200 infections leads to irreversible paralysis. Among those paralyzed, 5% to 10% die when their breathing muscles become immobilized.
