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# MISSOULA NOON RECEIVES \$50,000 GRANT TO HELP LOCAL YOUTH

In 2010 Youth Homes began their campaign to build a new Tom Roy Youth Guidance Home. This is the Youth Homes oldest group home and it has had steady use from more than 500 teenagers over the past 35 years, and is worn out! The Tom Roy program strive to improve the lives of high school aged youth who are aging out of the foster care or the judicial system. Without a support system to turn to, transitioning youth are highly likely to drop out of high school and become homeless.

They are more likely to drop out of school and thirty percent of the nation's homeless adults have a history in foster care. **This home beats those odds.** The program helps kids graduate from high school, develop the necessary skills to live

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## FIRST DISTRICT SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

Todd Wojtanowicz did not dream about becoming a doctor. After graduating from high school in Bozeman, he enrolled at the U of M to pursue a degree in history with the intent of studying law after receiving his bachelor's degree. But, a taste of working in the retail world of sales and business management pulled him in another direction. It was, however, a personal matter that turned his career goals upside down.

One of his aunts was in need of care due to an illness and Todd volunteered to assist with her needs. He delayed a planned return to college in 2009 and assisted his aunt until she succumbed to her illness. As Todd told us, "The role I was able to play helping to bring dignity to her final 18 months of life remains the singular most important experience that led me down the path of medicine."

Todd returned to the U of M and completed his prerequisite courses for medical school. He spent countless hours volunteering at St. Patrick's, shadowed surgeons at Bozeman Deaconess and worked as a clinical assistant at Bridger Care.

Todd and his wife are currently living near Northwestern University in the Evanston, Illinois area.

# POLIO-WHAT'S HAPPENING TOWARD THE GOAL OF ENDING THE DISEASE?

#### (Taken from the September 2013 End Polio Now Newsletter)

Although no cases of paralytic polio have been reported in Israel, environmental sampling indicates that the virus is being transmitted there, and supplementary immunization activities are being held throughout the country. The Ministry of Health in Palestine has also acted to prevent the virus's spread, with the support of the Rotary Club of Ramallah.

"Upon learning of the possible outbreak of polio, we approached [the ministry] to assess their needs," says Nader Dajani, the club's Rotary Foundation committee chair. "We found that they had drawn a good theoretical plan, [but] lacked the resources to implement it."

The club purchased protective equipment for health workers who collect stool samples, which are used to determine the presence and origin of poliovirus; equipment for collecting the samples; refrigerated containers for transporting the samples to testing labs; and air-conditioning units for the labs.

#### British Rotarians getting ready for World Polio Day

Rotarians are preparing to launch activities linked to World Polio Day, October 24th, in support of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. The Rotary Club of Leicester, Leicestershire, England, is asking local schools to participate in <a href="Purple Clothes Day">Purple Clothes Day</a> on October 18th, with each student donating US\$2 and wearing an item of purple clothing. District 1070 (England) is encouraging participation in the event at workplaces and schools worldwide to promote awareness of the need for polio eradication and to raise funds. Dozens of US Rotary clubs, mostly in the eastern US, are planning to participate in Purple Clothes Day.

independently, gain valuable job skills and create a system of supportive, caring adults. They do this with a skilled staff who coach, mentor, guide and support each youth to achieve their goals for a constructive life. The Tom Roy Youth Guidance Home teaches youth to become self-reliant. The capital campaign to build a new home was appropriately titled the **Campaign for Self Reliance.** 

The Missoula Noon Rotary got involved with the project after Club President, Conor Smith, toured the home and reflected on his own adolescence. Conor was moved by the kids he met, what the home does and he was extremely creative in getting his fellow members to join him in supporting this project. He gave a dynamic presentation where he used a fish as a symbol and talked about teaching kids to fish so they could feed themselves. He also asked every club member to think back to what life was like when they were 17. This got Rotarians to think about how they grew into adults which had significant impact. The Club became immediately invested thanks to Conor's inspiration.

In addition to Conor, past president Kevin Milkto, took on the task of making the club project an international

matching grant through Rotary International and the result was amazing! Through its members, the Missoula Rotary Club raised an incredible \$57,040 through direct donations and The Rotary Foundation Matching Grant Money. Thanks to the matching grant process, the Noon Rotary Club was able to turn \$25,000 raised locally, into \$50,000 for the Tom Roy Youth Guidance Home! An equal amount of Matching Grant money was funneled into four projects in India which include two that supply benches and desks for different impoverished schools, one for a neonatal unit, and the fourth project is to provide a laser for eye treatment of diabetic patients. The \$7,040 on top of the matching grant came from gifts from Club members which brought the total to \$57,040.
