FROM HUNGARY WITH LOVE

Tri-Lakes Rotary member Russell Chun from Monument, Colorado, recently visited the Rotary Club Budapest-City, District 1911. During his visit, he also met with Rotarian members from Israel, Budapest, Israel, and Ecuador.

Budapest is a truly international city, with members of the Budapest-City club (which holds meetings in English) hailing from Italy, China, Ecuador, South Africa, Ghana, and other nations. The club is engaged in numerous projects, with a significant focus on supporting a school for Ukrainian children and their families who have fled the conflict in Ukraine.

Currently, about 10,000 Ukrainian children reside in Budapest, awaiting a safe return to their country. The school, which presently accommodates 100 children, aims to expand its capacity to 700 children. The Rotary Club Budapest-City is actively seeking Global Rotary grants to achieve this goal.

UPDATE

Dear Rotarians and Friends in District 5470:

Hello it's Buddy Sims from the Edwards CO Rotary Impact Club. For the last two years my old Rotary club in Goodyear PebbleCreek (RCGYPC), AZ helped start and support a new Ukrainian Elementary School Project in Budapest, Hungary. Rotary Club Budapest City (RCBC) <https://www.rc-budapest-city.hu/> is also RCGYPC's sister club and the only English- speaking club in Hungary. Below you can find a link to a short video showcasing the currently operating school that was equipped with lots of US and Rotary world-wide support (over 15 Rotary sponsors). Since September 2023, this school has served almost 200 Ukrainian refugee kids in Budapest. https://youtu.be/IXzG8r0YZU4?si=CIDFcK6GDTsqa9U_

Here are some key updates about the ongoing Ukrainian School Project: Over the last few months, RCBC has been working to engage new potential sponsors, and it looks promising that we might reach a total budget global grant goal of \$300,000. The Rotary International President 2024/2025, Ms. Stephanie Urchick from Pennsylvania, USA, and the Rotary International Director, Mr. David Tanase from Romania, visited the currently operating Ukrainian school and were enthusiastic about supporting the project.

Please see three attached photos of their visit. The organization of two summer camps in Sátorajújhely and Mórahalom (Hungary) for 30 Ukrainian refugee children, free of charge, is progressing well. In June 2024, a trainer who will hold smart board training for the Ukrainian refugee teachers will visit the school, and hopefully, we can finalize the structure of the training that is in line with the Global Grant requirements. New sponsors to cover the salaries of the currently (Cont)

(cont) working teachers has been secured. Sponsors have been found to pay the two months' deposit and one month pre-payment for the larger building starting in Sep 2024 housing 700 students. The larger building contract was signed in May 2024 and we are waiting for the new school license from the Hungarian Government.

A Buck for the Basket for the Blind

A Buck for the Basket for the Blind • Rotary Club of Pagosa Springs Niger is often listed as the poorest country in Africa. Sixty percent of Niger's population lives on less than \$2/day. The long-term solution to global poverty is self-sufficiency. Improving science and math literacy in underdeveloped countries can increase the rate of economic development and self-sufficiency of their people. Thousands of high school students in the capital city Niamey are studying biology, chemistry, and physics. These students will likely play a major role in the economic development of Niger.

The Rotary Club of Pagosa Springs is partnering with our twin club in Niamey to improve high school science education in Niger. The science teachers in these high schools have no equipment and little experience with hands-on science. We are helping them create laboratory manuals for biology, chemistry and physics. Science teachers will receive training through workshops and the supplies required to perform practical experiments. Each school will receive computers and digital projectors that will facilitate teaching large classes.

And we are now starting a mini project. With just our spare change, our members are supporting nine visually impaired students attending the National School for the Blind in Niamey. This is an easy and affordable way for each of us to support our International Service work in Niger. Our goal is to collect \$25 each week over the next year to provide the basic supplies these students need at a cost of about \$125 each. The members of our twin club have promised to send us updates on our support. This gives us the opportunity to be reminded on a regular basis about this vital work in Niger.

The basic needs of the nine visually impaired students are as follows:

- Tablet used as a slate for taking notes during class lessons, price \$57.85
- Punch serving as a pen for the tablet; price \$4.96
- Paper in the form of Bristol cards for writing; ream of 300 sheets at \$33.06
- Ring to connect and classify courses; price \$0.33 per unit
- School outfit (Dress, pants + T-shirt) price at \$18.18
- School bag estimated price \$8.28

WELL UPDATE FROM ZAMBIA IN PARTNERSHIP WITH FARM STEW AND WILDERNESS GATE-JUNE 2024

KATUBYA CLUSTER, SPECIFICALLY IN SIANCHIMWA VILLAGE,, 17°13'57.2 S 25°26'53.4" E

Sianchimwa VILLAGE has made many strides since September 2023, when the first borehole, currently the only operational borehole in the 80 sq km of the Katubya cluster of villages, was installed. This borehole was provided by a District Grant from Rotary 5470 through FARM STEW International (FARM STEW). The borehole provided has been a lifeline, especially as Zambia has been experiencing an extreme drought this year.



The FARM STEW training and support in this part of Zambia began in Q1 2023, covering 16 villages. Trainers teach skills of farming, meals, sanitation, enterprise, and more. The goal is FARM STEW-certified households and communities that adopt the behaviors they are taught that will lead to a more abundant life. In particular, FARM STEW-certified households have established Kitchen Gardens that are thriving as they have grown and continue to grow



vegetables for their own consumption and for sale to the surrounding villages. This would not have been possible without the borehole. One village woman and her family were able to buy a goat and chickens because of the sale of vegetables; others exchanged vegetables for maize.

Since the borehole well was installed in September 2023, Sianchimwa now supports three other surrounding villages with water. The 2023/24 planting season for staple crops was a disaster for the whole southern part of Zambia and Katubya was not spared at all. The communities had just come through a previous tough season only to now go through an even more painful season of very little rain. This has meant families and whole villages will have an even bigger task of finding not only food but especially water. *(Continued on next page)*

Well Update from Zambia, Continued



CHALLENGES:

This is the only borehole well in the Katubya area of Sianchimwa village. It is already under stress as it provides water to three surrounding villages. The FARM STEW trainers working in the area are appealing for additional boreholes to ease the strain on the well as other communities work towards achieving FARM STEW Certified status.

The borehole has been a lifeline as it is the only source of accessible safe water for 3 communities, especially as Zambia's drought has been severe this year.

ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE CONTINUES TO GROW AFTER PANDEMIC HALT

Greetings from Mountain and Plains District 5470 Rotary Youth Exchange. We are in the midst of perhaps our busiest time of year for Rotary Youth Exchange, with students coming and going all over the world.

We are preparing a new class of high school-aged students to go outbound (study abroad) for the 2024-25 school year, while our current outbound group is returning from their year abroad. At the same time, we are saying goodbye to our inbound students who have been with us here in District 5470 for the past year, while also preparing to welcome a new group of foreign students in August who will be with us for the coming year.

There's never really a down time for Youth Exchange, and that's even more true as we continue to grow the program back to pre-pandemic levels.

This past year, we had 12 outbound students and an equal number of inbound students hosted by 12 different clubs in our district.

Among them was our first-ever Ukrainian student, Alex Protsenko, who came to Glenwood Springs through a special one-way exchange opportunity. Many thanks to all of the clubs and individual Rotarians who contributed financially to help support this exchange.

Our numbers this year were down slightly from 2022-23 when we sent 13 students abroad and hosted 19 students, but next year we will be sending 17 students abroad and hosting 18 students among 15 clubs.

Special thanks to three of our clubs, Carbondale, Crested Butte and Durango Daybreak, who will be hosting two students each next year. It takes a lot of work and volunteer hours to arrange for host families, provide financial support and take care of all of the fine details associated with hosting a foreign exchange student in our communities.

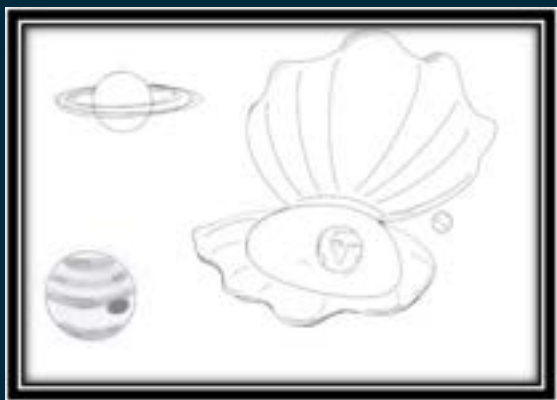

The book is written in English and translated into Amharic and Oromifa. It is based on the concept of a beautiful pearl being formed from pain.

The first day of training was held in Addis Ababa for twenty school directors and teacher volunteers. They were taught how to train in a learning center model. The group from Aliyu Amba traveled through a live battle and waited for a short pause in the fire in order to run through a road barrier. The group from Muki Turi was "detained" on their way for more than three hours.

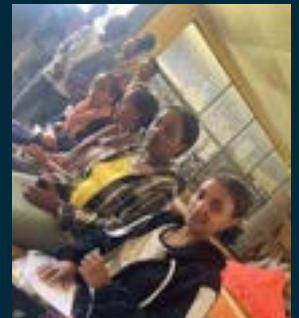

Lunch was served and the students kept whispering to each other in disbelief that they were encouraged to eat as much as they wanted.



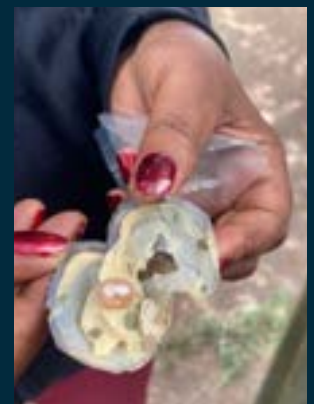
The afternoon session was the “Pearl of Hope”. A powerful panel of graduates from Trampled Rose who are now university students (one medical doctor and three engineers), and the opening, by trainers, of real oysters to find pearls.



As we left each other to return to our villages, the atmosphere was full of hope and commitment for a better future. Each student returned home with their own packet and the chance to create whatever came to them. As each student left they were given a hug and a pearl to keep in their pockets to remind them that they are our pearl of great value.

152 clubs (including several D-5470 clubs) and 26 districts (including D-5470) contributed DDF to this Global Grant, which will provide the gift of literacy, education, and training to more than 6,200 children and teachers in rural Guatemala, mainly during the 2025 Guatemalan school year (January to October).

ZAMBIA GLOBAL GRANT

I'm writing with good news! I received a lengthy update from my contact in the Phoenix 100 Rotary Club regarding the global grant in Zambia. Here are the highlights:

- TRF reviewed the grant and posed many questions (as they always do) regarding the grant. For example, TRF wanted more clarity on the selection process for contractors.
- The questions were answered adequately and now the grant will move on to final approval
- Final approval is expected imminently
- A member of the Phoenix 100 club, Kim Lorenz, traveled to Mbala, Zambia to meet with district and local club leaders as well as with World Vision representatives. They reviewed the grant together to align their efforts in more detail
- We will receive a request for funds in the next few weeks
- The project will begin immediately. It will most likely finish in March or April of 2025
- We are invited to travel with members of the Phoenix 100 Club to review the completed project

Now just some fun tidbits:

- The grant was held up for a few weeks when the Rotary district in Zambia discovered the Mbala club underpaid their club dues by \$75. This poor club did not have the funds to complete the payment. A generous member of the Phoenix 100 Club made the payment personally!
- After flying to Zambia, Kim Lorenz took a 1 1/2 hour in-country flight and then drove 7 hours on bad roads to get to Mbala. A new airport is opening in one month that will significantly reduce the drive time.
- I prefer to keep an eye on the global grant progress myself, but until we have sent the funds and become an official sponsor, I won't have access. You can imagine how eager I am to get that access!
- As usual, the schools in Mbala have many needs beyond the scope of this project. They will be asking for school desks for the children. I prefer to make arrangements to ensure the girls have access to their monthly supplies that will keep them in school.

The long-term solution to global poverty is self-sufficiency. Forty years of thoughtful research involving 70 countries shows a strong correlation between the rate of economic development and the science and math literacy in these countries. This correlation shows that aid to improve science and math literacy in under-developed countries is likely to increase the rate of economic development and self-sufficiency of their people. The immediate purpose of this Global Grant is to improve high school science education in Niger.

With a per-capita Gross National Income (GNI) less than \$1,000, Niger is often listed as the poorest country in Africa. To understand the severity of poverty in Niger, it is helpful to note that Mexico's GNI is \$16,000. Sixty percent of Niger's population lives on less than \$2/day.

Eighty percent of Niger lies in the Sahara Desert. Average annual rainfall in Niger is about 6 inches. The average annual rainfall in the U.S. is 39 inches.

In addition to fostering economic development in this impoverished country, this project will build understanding between Muslim and non-Muslim communities. Niger is about 90% Muslim.

Despite widespread, extreme poverty and the lack of development in Niger, there are thousands of high school students in the capital city Niamey who are studying biology, chemistry and physics. These students will likely play a major role in the economic development of Niger.

This project will support science education in 4 high schools in Niamey. One of the high schools, CES LAZARET has nearly 5,000 students. Lazaret is a northern suburb, which is known historically for its refugee camp with many Tuareg people. The camp became the largest in the Sahel during the extreme drought of 1973-1975. Another high school, Collège Mariama, has nearly 1900 students.

Although the science teachers in these high schools are rather well-trained in the theory of science, they have no equipment and little experience with hands-on science. One of the main goals of this program is to develop laboratory manuals for biology, chemistry and physics. Science teachers will receive training through workshops and the supplies required to perform practical experiments. Each school will receive computers and digital projectors that will facilitate teaching large classes.

This program builds on experience gained through similar projects in Senegal, as well as through 2 visits to Niger. (<https://pagosaspringsrotary.org/Stories/strengthening-high-school-science-in-niger>)

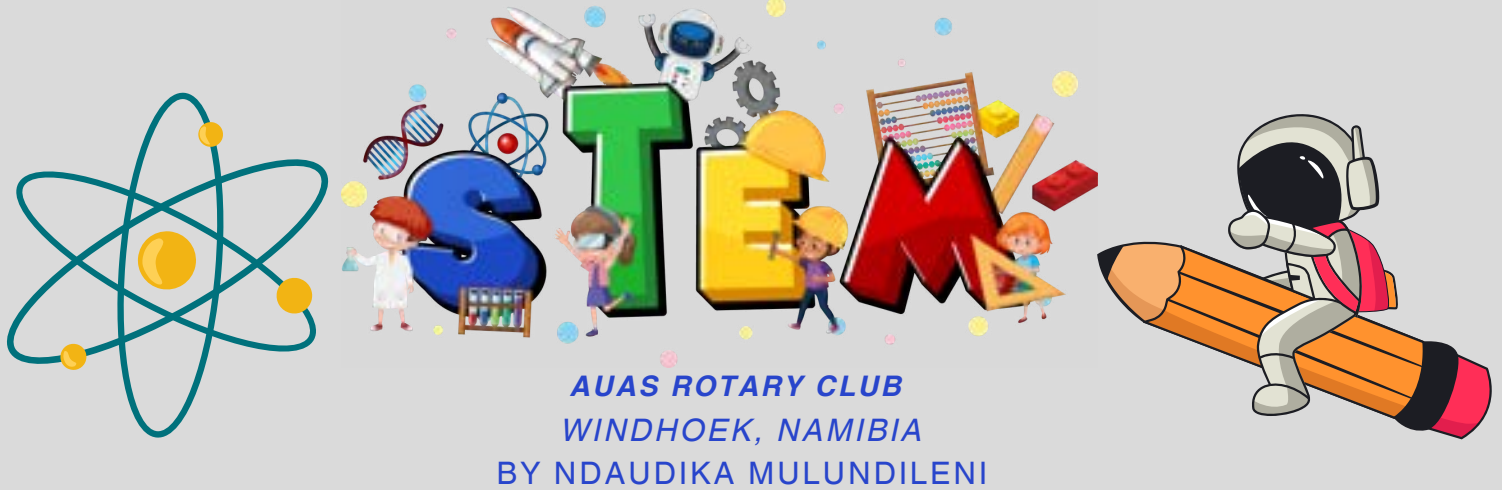

Dear Rotarians,

Join us in a transformative initiative to promote literacy and community development within the Navajo Nation by participating in a Global Grant and Rotary Service Project.

The Ajijic Rotary Club (Mexico), Glenwood Springs Sunset Rotary Club and Glenwood Springs Noon Rotary Club are enthusiastic about the impact a Global Grant of \$100,000 for the Navajo Nation Literacy and Community Building Project will have on the lives of those within the Navajo community. We are a third of the way in funding commitments to make this possible.

Need: The Navajo Nation is the largest reservation of indigenous people in the USA, but large areas of the reservation lack basic services. Nearly 50% of Navajo families have no running water, no electricity, no internet, no libraries. This means that children have limited access to educational materials – no books, no place to borrow or buy books without driving over 100 miles. Students begin preschool and kindergarten already significantly behind in basic literacy skills – it's hard to learn to read when there is nothing to read. Recent test scores indicate that 67% of 3rd graders and 89% of high school students are significantly deficient in reading proficiency. Basic literacy research again and again has shown that how well a child is doing in 3rd grade is the best indicator of how well that child will do in life. (Continued on next page)

Rotary Global Grant: This global grant will supply materials for equipping the permanent structure that will house all these components: learning and exploration centers, classes, STEAM activities, and more for toddlers through teens. A reading area and library will be an anchor for the already successful bookmobile. There will be a café for nutrition and cooking classes, as well as a place for parents and community members to relax, talk, share ideas, and plan projects.

Rotary Service Project: With a successful global grant, which receives matching monies from Rotary Districts and The Rotary Foundation, we will assemble a **Rotary Service Project** in the summer of 2025 to install materials in The Imagination Station Learning Center.

Navajo Partner: Our Navajo Partner is the nonprofit Chinle Planting Hope. Rotarians from several clubs have worked hands-on with Chinle Planting

Hope for the past few years. We continue to partner with this organization created and run by local Navajo, not only because the need is so great, but because they have demonstrated remarkable stewardship and follow-through with resources. The community center now includes a lending library/bookmobile, thrift store, a bicycle repair shop plus bikes and helmets given to children (once they complete their biking class at school), a community garden and soon The Imagination Station Learning Center.

Over 10,000 donated books have been cataloged into an active lending library – Read in Beauty Bookmobile. Over 1,500 students are proud owners of library cards and over 6,000 books have been checked out. Since the beginning of 2024, the Read in Beauty Book mobile is bringing books to schools that do not have libraries and also to communities at local events.



The Request: We are requesting a tentative funding commitment for Global Grant participation as soon as possible. We are planning to have final commitments by July 31, 2024. No amount is too large or too small. Participating clubs may also be interested in the service project connected to this effort. Please reply to this email with your commitment.

We already have commitments for \$10,000 from clubs and \$12,500 commitment for DDF from D-5470; with a TRF match of \$ 10,000 means we have \$ 30,000 or one-third of the project.

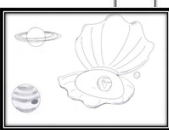
