




The Conference is over but the work of Rotarians and partners in District 5550 will continue in our efforts to fulfill

out of his presentation and thought: "There is hope."



"Hierarchy of Needs" — and turned it upside down in the most excellent way. He pushed us to think about whether physiological needs (food, water, shelter) were really the most important things — is a well-nourished human necessarily happy? Of course not. Are purpose and meaning, belonging, self-worth, explanation, and expression really higher level needs? Or are they as necessary as food, water, and shelter? How



is peace more achievable if we understand our humanness and engage in relationship? Juicy stuff!

Another attendee: "Chief Cadmus was refreshing! Liked the way he presented his material. Mitty is one enthusiastic ambassador for Rotary! Mitty has a passion that is refreshing. This was a well-organized conference!"



Speaker Mitty Chang's challenge to the panel of new and potential Rotarians-

"What would be the first thing you would do if you could be President of RI for only one

week?" Responses were from "make it easier to get access to funds" to "fire everyone". Perhaps a meeting of the minds somewhere in the middle? All agreed that there needs to be more done to inform the public about what Rotary is and what it does. A most commendable job.

From an impressed Rotarian "Mitty's underlying message was clear—If Rotarians don't like change, we will like irrelevance even less. To be sustainable we need to be open to changes that will appeal to the younger generation."

"I really appreciated hearing about the work Rotary does internationally—whether in Guatemala, Afghanistan, or deploying shelter boxes around the world in response to disasters. The highlight was when Stephanie Christensen advised that Shelter box had been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize. Although it was an exhausting weekend, it was also very energizing and reminded me why I joined Rotary in the first place. Thanks all for your great work."
