COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT - ROTARY'S PATH FORWARD

Community engagement is a strategic process with the specific purpose of working with identified groups of people, whether they are connected by geographic location, special interest, or affiliation. Interested people or groups collaborate to identify and address issues affecting the well-being of the community.

Why Community Engagement?

- To find out what our communities want and need
- To find ways to help provide the wants and needs
- To connect with our communities through partnering and increased membership

How to Engage Post Pandemic

There may be limited ways the community is wiling to gather during the pandemic. Fortunately vaccination has started and an end to isolation is looming on the horizon. When individuals feel safe to gather again, sponsor an event like a pancake breakfast or BBQ lunch to get community members out. Once you have community members as a captive audience, seek their feedback. One way to do this is by brainstorming for ideas, then having individuals prioritize the ideas. A suggested technique for this is described below.

- Seat your community members in groups of six to eight, preferably at round tables
- Provide each table with a few sheets of Flip Chart paper and markers
- Ask each group to assign a note taker and reporter
- Ask each table to come up with as many wants and needs for our community as possible and give them ten minutes to do so.
- Ask each table to report their wants and needs
- Pin up the flip chart pages from each table on the walls
- Give each participant a strip of coloured dots.
- Get the participants to put their coloured dots on the projects that they feel are most important/ worthy. They can put more than one dot on a project.

- Thank your audience for their participation
- Take the flip chart results back to your club and decide what you can do to provide what the community wants/needs most.
- Once you decide what you can do, call another meeting of the community to engage the community in the project(s) that you can support.

How to Engage During the Pandemic

- Invite your community to a Zoom meeting.
- Ensure that you have breakout rooms set up and a facilitator to ensure that assignments to rooms and discussions are well handled.
- Consider a draw for a prize as an incentive to get people to join the meeting.
- Ask each breakout room to assign a note taker and reporter
- Ask each breakout room to come up with as many wants and needs for our community as possible and give them ten minutes to do so.
- Make sure you have at least two people assigned to collect the feedback from each group into poll questions
- Ask each group/breakout room to report what they came up with
- Have another person assigned to capture the feedback on a shared screen.
- While showing the total collection of ideas on the shared screen, ask the participants to vote for the ideas they like the best, 1 most important to 10 least important to them
- This requires some solid pre-planning and practise to ensure positive results
- Thank your audience for their participation
- Take the results back to your club and decide what you can do to provide what the community wants/needs most.
- Once you decide what you can do, call another meeting of the community to engage the community in the project(s) that you can support.
