District 5550 continues to be a district interested in promoting literacy in our communities and around the world. Our Literacy Committee contacts all clubs in the district two to three times from September to mid-March when information is due for this report. 24 of 46 clubs reported on their initiatives for 2023 – 2024 and 20 of these clubs have earned District Literacy Award Certificates.

Clubs that completed at least five literacy activities have been recognized with a District Literacy Award Certificate. In addition, special recognition has been given to one club for their initiative and creativity in organizing interesting literacy projects or fundraisers this year.

This report is a summary of all the great work our District 5550 clubs have accomplished this year to support literacy and is an excellent resource for any club considering becoming involved in new or different projects and programs.

- In partnership with the Dryden Public Library and the Friends of the DPL, we have now built, and continue to stock and maintain, three *Books for Sharing* boxes in our community.

- The club donated \$1,000 to the Annual Festival of the Arts which showcases music, poetry, drama, dance, and public speaking with participation from all ages.
- The club supports the Harbourfront Concert Series and the Lake of the Woods Concert Series with an annual donation. These showcase local talent as well as bringing in talent from across North America.
- The club sponsors an Interact Club at a local high school. Rotarians meet with students monthly and have participated in joint projects.
- The club partnered with Special Olympics for a Lucky Duck Race fundraiser.

- Donated books to Little Free Libraries by encouraging community members to distribute books from our inventory to these libraries and by providing books to a free library at Brandon Airport.
- Recycle books donated by regional libraries in Western Manitoba.
- Continue to support a reading program with inmates at Brandon Correctional Centre. Many
 inmates are from rural and remote areas of Manitoba and there is a real loss of contact with
 family due to incarceration. Our club provides children's story books which are read by the
 inmate to their child and recorded at the Brandon Correction Institute. The book and the
 recording of the parent is sent to the child in the home community and the child can read the
 book along with the parent's voice. The parent is allowed to provide a message to their child as
 well. This program includes both male and female inmates and this tape recording might be the
 only time a child hears their parent's voice during incarceration which could almost two years.
 This unique program provides hope for both parent and child during a very difficult time. Our
 club feels strongly that this program benefits families under extreme stress, supports child
 literacy and is beneficial to all concerned.
- Donated money to the Ripple Effect program.
- Contributed to the Ripple Effect for school building projects.
- Organized a book sale where one free book was provided to each child in attendance.
- Provided books, including children's and popular authors' books, to Brandon Airport for reading on Westjet flights because there is no store in the Brandon Airport.
- Continued to provide books to seniors' residential facilities under Manitoba Housing (Grand Valley Apartments, Winnipeg House, Hobbs Manor) and places like Rotary Villa. In such places, the seniors have limited access and are often restricted to their apartment units and building facilities.

Scholarships could be used to enter any post-secondary training facility, including trade schools.
- The club donated \$500 to the Northern Juried Art Show to enable free entry to youth ages 9 to 17 years of age.
- There were two individuals involved with RYLA last year and one is gearing up this year yet.
- The club donated \$1,000 to each of the two elementary schools to offset costs of their swimming programs. Two \$1,500 donations were given to The Pas Road Runners Swim Club to cover the costs of running two swim meets.
- A donation of \$500 was made to offset the costs of local student participation in the provincial level of the Manitoba Skills Competition.

SASKATCHEWAN

Rotary Club of Saskatoon

President **Wendy Cooper** reported on the club's support for the following literacy programs and projects:

- Sponsors two youth academic scholarship to Saskatchewan Polytechnic.
- Sponsored a student to RYLA plus a club member drove several students to RYLA.
- Our club is involved in the funding of a new Victoria Park Recreational Facility; it will be used by the Wild Sky Adventure Learning group, by CHEP's Urban Agriculture Internship program and the Riversdale Community Association for their cultural and educational programs.
- Donates to a literacy program RAP.
- The club is heavily involved in RAP (Restorative Action Program) which is now active in 10 Saskatoon high schools, working to keep at-risk students in school and out of the criminal justice system; support with club and personal donations from members and several members sit on the board of directors for the program (including chairperson).
- The club continues their partnership with "Hope Restored Saskatoon", an organization that works to eradicate sex trafficking and abuse by getting young girls (13-15 years of age) off the street and into a safe shelter; the club is sponsoring an incentive program which rewards the girls for staying in school and maintaining good grades.
- Internationally the club donates to the Hope for Malawi Project donated towards construction
 of early learning centres and an agricultural education program; a club member is the founder
 and director of this massive project.
- Internationally the club continues with the Joy's Center project in Uganda the club has provided funds for food, medical supplies and school supplies for the school and orphanage there.
- Continues to support the Nepal Literacy Program in Siribari, Nepal; we are funding a lunch program and teacher's salary at a primary school there; new to this year the club is funding the purchase of goats which will contribute to the sustainability of the lunch program.
- Another international project is the Becus Scholarship Program. Club members and friends sponsor approximately 100 middle school, high school, and university students in the Puerto Vallarta area of Mexico where elementary education is compulsory and free only up to grade 6. We also collect and send used laptop computers to this school to support their computer education.
- Applied for a District Grant for literacy.
- Recognized International Literacy Day by having a club presentation on their newest community project our participation in the funding of the Victoria Park Recreation Facility noted above.

Rotary Club of Saskatoon Nutana

Literacy Chair **Candace Odishaw** reported on the club's support for the following literacy programs and projects:

- The club continues their donation of \$2,000 per year for two youth scholarships at Oskayak High School. The scholarships are presented to students continuing on to post secondary education.
- Donated \$1,000 to Restorative Action Program (RAP).
- The club makes a donation to Foundations Learning & Skills Saskatchewan (formerly known as READ Saskatoon) on behalf of each weekly speaker. Our average yearly donation is \$1,000.
- For International Literacy Day in September, we had Lucille Ayers from the Rotary Club of Dryden speak to the club about their Be Reading Free Reading Program.
- This is the club's third year of providing \$20,000 to St. Frances Cree Bilingual School. Although the new school will not be completed now until 2025, the club is in collaboration with the school, working on enhancing an Indigenous performing arts program within the new school. This will include mentorship with the students, promoting arts and cultural resources. The club's full commitment in this project is for 5 years at \$100,000.
- We held a Steak Night Fundraiser specifically for the St. Frances project and invited and hosted many partners from the school district.
- The club holds an annual ceremony at Rotary Park at the Peace Plaza where a brick is dedicated to a Nobel Peace Laureate. This year grade 8 students from St. Anne School prepared the program, researched the Nobel Peace Laureate, Joseph Rotblat and Pugwash Conferences, and made their presentation to the club and visitors.
- This year in May we are holding our first annual African Heritage Fundraising Night in collaboration with another organization in the city, Truly Alive Family Foundation Inc. (TAFFI). This will bring the community together showing African cuisine and entertainment. Our portion of the proceeds will go towards a new multi-year Global Grant project focusing on Halbeo, a farming community in the Upper East Region of Ghana. The project will see the installation of water purification systems and the establishment of community water points. How this relates to Literacy is that it is generally the children that must travel for many hours a day providing water for their families, which means they are not in school.
- Donated \$2,220 to St. Edwards School to support taking students to Batoche to teach them Indigenous Cultural teachings.
- One of the Nutana club members has started an organization in Morocco so the club is helping with the purchase of computers and software to assist migrants in the country. The club is providing \$1,000 (including district grant). This will enhance literacy for migrants and enhance their employment opportunities.
- Received District Grants for its scholarships and Morocco project.

Rotary Club of Saskatoon Meewasin

President Luis Pagliarini reported on the club's support for the following literacy programs and projects:

- We donated funds for two bursaries to support single parents to continue their education at Sask Polytechnic.
- Sponsored a student to RYLA.
- Donated funds to the Saskatoon Restorative Action Program (RAP), a program supported by the Rotary Clubs of Saskatoon to provide a safe environment for students in ten of the high schools in Saskatoon.
- We have donated funds to the St. Mary's School Wellness Centre to provide a food basket given away each month to encourage student attendance.
- When the club has speakers, we have them sign a book which is presented to St. Michael Community School to assist them in promoting literacy to their students.
