The Fergus Falls Noon Rotary Club proposes a project to build a greenhouse for Lake Region Takes Root. Lake Region Takes Root is a 1.5-acre community garden where volunteer community members and service groups garden collectively and then donate the produce to families in need. This land was donated to Lake Region Healthcare with a purpose to utilize it to help improve the health of our community. Lake Region Healthcare owns the land and coordinates the activities of the garden, however the work of planting, maintaining & tending to the garden is done entirely by volunteers.

The produce is donated to Battle Lake, Fergus Falls, Pelican Rapids Food Shelves, Salvation Army and other human service organizations including the Otter Tail County "Women Infant & Children" or WIC program. The Fergus Falls Noon Rotary Club has assisted the garden in the past by helping to build a high tunnel and by building the paver patio in the garden's pergola/education area. Our club has also held one of its meetings on-

RI District 5580 Revision: January 01, 2017 site at the garden and we have a couple of members who volunteer their time individually with other projects as needed.

The garden has been a work in progress with continued efforts to improve infrastructure each year to thereby continue to increase the amount of produce grown each year. So far, the growth has been incrementally substantial each year:

Year Pounds of Produce Grown & Donated at Garden

2013 1,600 lbs.

2014 4,600 lbs.

2015 7,700 lbs.

2016 9,300 lbs.

As the garden's capacity continues to increase, the goal is to produce around 20,000 pounds of produce annually. Improvements to the infrastructure that would allow plants to be started earlier in the season is one of the key steps toward this goal. Having the greenhouse facility would dramatically improve the capacity of the garden by providing a place to start seedlings. This will lower production costs and make operations more sustainable. Otherwise seedlings need to be purchased at wholesale from an outside vendor. The greenhouse will also help to increase overall harvest production volumes. More produce will be able to be harvested from transplants that can produce more quickly and longer into the season versus direct seeding. After moving transplants to the field, additional specialty plants can remain in the greenhouse which will further increase growing capacity.

Annually, the Community Garden serves over 3,000 individuals throughout Otter Tail County who receive the produce. Over 250 volunteers plant, maintain and harvest the garden throughout the growing season. We know as a Rotary Club that our participation in this project helps ease the burden of the volunteer recruitment, improves the long-term viability of the garden and most importantly, helps fill a need to reduce hunger and food insecurity in our community.

While the main purpose of the garden is to procure nutrient dense foods to improve the health of our community, another goal is to provide education to recipients and volunteers about growing their own food. This increases self-preservation skills and self-determination. So, it also benefits our club and other volunteers who are learning first-hand about horticulture and the spirit of community service as they work at the garden. We are learning the value of growing and knowing where food comes from while instilling the values of community service.

The project will take place in August and September 2017 and wrap up by September 30, 2017. There will need to be some minor site preparation which may require some ground leveling and running of electrical wire and irrigation plumbing to the building site which would take place in late August or early September. We believe the building itself can be erected in one-two days in late September using our Rotarians and other volunteers from the community.

The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty. How will this project meet the mission of Rotary Foundation?

This project is in lock-step with the mission of the Rotary Foundation. The mission of Lake Region Takes Root is to build a healthier population by engaging community partners to create a sustainable local food system that provides education for all ages and opportunities to increase access to locally grown fruits and vegetables.

There are many objectives the community garden hopes to achieve, but its primary goal is improving community health through procuring nutrient dense foods for families in need.

Another goal is educating the community around various horticulture methodologies, so that members of the public are inspired to try growing some of their own food. Recipients are learning about growing their own foods as they volunteer at the garden, which also has an impact on poverty. Additionally, various community volunteers young and/or old are also learning additional life skills and the value of growing their own food.

Master Gardeners and area teachers use the facility as an outdoor classroom to provide additional education to area students and the broader community.

Having the greenhouse would open-up additional ways to provide education more broadly throughout the county. In the past, there has been limited opportunity to connect with students because by the time it comes to planting in the spring, schools are in final testing mode or getting ready to let out for the summer. By having

the greenhouse, the garden would be able to engage more students earlier in the academic year because students would be able to access the greenhouse in April-May when they are still in school. This would allow for greater partnerships and supports from our area schools.

Lake Region Takes Root is under the ownership of Lake Region Healthcare (LRH) in Fergus Falls. LRH is a non-profit organization with a 501 (c) (3) status under the federal tax ID #41-0730602. LRH will maintain the greenhouse facility as part of the garden's operations once built.

Jason Bergstrand, Garden Coordinator, will work with Rotary Club President, Katie Johnson and President-Elect Steve Leitte to coordinate the purchasing of the greenhouse kit, arranging for site preparation, recruiting & coordinating any volunteers that may be needed within and beyond Noon Rotary Club members to build the greenhouse, as well as coordinate the work of the volunteers. Jason will also put together a system for providing educational and volunteer opportunities associated with the greenhouse for our Rotary club and for students and community volunteers in the surrounding area moving forward.

Will training in use and maintenance of technical equipment (including software) be provided? If so, who will provide training?

Jason Bergstrand will oversee the building of the greenhouse by Fergus Falls Noon Rotarians and any other community volunteers needed, using the greenhouse construction kit. Together under Jason's leadership, our club has previously built a high tunnel so we feel equipped to guide volunteers and resources necessary to complete the build successfully. We will recruit experienced local building trades personnel as necessary to improve efficiency and safety. Although a high tunnel is similar structure to a greenhouse, its function is not. The greenhouse is necessary as it provides improved insulation qualities, earlier heating and plant storage capacity. The greenhouse will allow us to get transplants into the high tunnel and field more quickly resulting in greater volumes of food being produced.

Describe how the benefiting community will maintain this project after grant funding has been fully expended.

Our volunteers and our school student population will be the key to long term maximization of the green house. The greenhouse will be used to educate students in the surrounding area as part of their spring curriculum and provide volunteers with additional ways to serve at the garden while producing much needed seedlings & plants directly to be used in the garden. Area teachers and the West Otter Tail County Master Gardners will have access to the greenhouse to do additional educational series for the public as desired. Their involvement will help create a sustainable system where community members are engaged in the education process while preparing/maintaining seedlings/plants until they are ready for later use within the garden.

Describe specific activities of the benefiting community partners in implementing the project.

This project will dramatically improve the ability of the garden to produce more fruits and vegetables as a result of having a greenhouse on site. This will in turn lead to more pounds of produce going to organizations like the Fergus Falls, Battle Lake and Pelican Rapids Food Shelves, Salvation Army, WIC and other human service organizations.

How will Rotarians be involved the project? Please note that financial support is not considered active involvement. (See the District Grant application instructions for suggestions.)

Our Rotary club members will physically help build the greenhouse and install pavers for the base of the building. As needed, we will incorporate other service organizations like morning Rotarians and Master Gardeners who may have an interest in serving in some capacity with the greenhouse moving forward.

We may consider an ongoing commitment to assist with the startup of the greenhouse each spring. This would help the garden get off to a great start to meeting the needs of the planting activities each year.
