and sidewalks. The project will take place between July 1, 2017 and July 1, 2018.

CHARISM will own the van. The Fargo and Moorhead Park districts will own any repair stations placed on city property. CHARISM will maintain, operate and secure their van. A non-profit community bike-riding organization, Great Rides, has agreed to maintain all of the bicycle repair stations for the warranty-period of five years. After that time, the park district will take over maintenance.

Will training in use and maintenance of technical equipment (including software) be provided? If so, who will provide training?

Yes. Bicycle safety training will also include training on the bicycle repair stations. Great Rides and Rotary members will provide the training.

Describe how the benefiting community will maintain this project after grant funding has been fully expended.

CHARISM has agreed to maintain the van through their own community fundraising efforts. The bicycle stations are under five year-warranty. All non-warrantied repairs will be paid for by funds from the Rotary Ride for five years. After that period, the park district will take on maintenance costs. Other communities have confirmed that possible repair costs are nominal.

Describe specific activities of the benefiting community partners in implementing the project.

CHARISM will own and operate the van purchased with this grant that allows them to expand their programming. They will be responsible for all maintenance, insurance and licensing. The bicycle stations will be installed on city park land in Fargo and Moorhead. Park district officials will oversee professional installation and will take over maintenance and repairs after the warranties have expired in five years.

A non-profit community bike-riding organization, Great Rides, will coordinate efforts among cycling groups and advocates, including the city park districts. Rotary clubs and community groups will identify ideal locations, develop safety materials, and promote safety education in collaboration with FM Community Education. Safety education will include promoting the use of the bike repair stations.

How will Rotarians be involved the project? Please note that financial support is not considered active involvement, (See the District Grant application instructions for suggestions.)

Members of the FMPM Club have been involved with identifying the need, sourcing the van, obtaining approval and support from city park districts, partner organizations, and CHARISM. Members will also work to promote the bicycle safety program.

Overall, the five clubs of the Fargo-Moorhead area have worked together to sponsor a Rotary bike ride since 2013 that promotes bicycling in our community and raises money for local community projects.

We will generate \$15,000 to match our request via \$3,000 from each of our five area clubs in Fargo-Moorhead.

SAFE TRANSPORTATION FOR NEW AMERICANS IN OUR COMMUNITY
The FM-PM Club has been partnering for several years with CHARISM Neighborhood Center, a
non-profit organization providing support and outreach programs for at-risk children, youth and
adults in Fargo (See attached). The majority of the community they serve consists of New
Americans of all ages representing twenty-three nationalities.

In 2014, supported by a D5580 Grant, we introduced a literacy project. We purchased Andy & Elmer children's books about the 4-Way Test, t-shirts, and an apple tree to align with the theme of the book. This ultimately resulted in a neighborhood orchard and ongoing "Rotary Week" every summer during CHARISM kids' camp. Each year during Rotary Week, they use the 4-Way Test Andy & Elmer story to teach good citizenship and manners, engineering, entrepreneurship and cooking skills.

The apple trees purchased by the grant was a catalyst for CHARISM to apply for funds from the USDA for a community orchard to complement their community garden. Last year, our club spent the afternoon installing benches, watering plants, and celebrating the grand opening of the orchard with the families who live there. We regularly volunteer at CHARISM with their grocery assistance program and miscellaneous projects. We continue to donate books and cash in attempt to meet their urgent program needs.

We have become aware of a critical need for more safe transportation options for the population CHARISM serves. Most New Americans do not have a driver's license, nor do they understand the rules of the road. Some people cannot drive due to age or health or simply have no access to a vehicle. They must rely on public transportation, friends and family, bicycles, walking, or community organizations such as CHARISM.

CHARISM has recently expanded its after-school literacy programs to serve more neighborhoods and this has left them needing another van to transport adults to skills building programs and volunteer opportunities that connect this population to the community, ultimately supporting their economic and social development, independence and community integration. Our proposal to provide safe transportation options includes two areas: In conjunction with providing a van, we also wish to promote bicycle safety and maintenance. We are aware that a significant number of our neighbors, both New Americans and other economically-disadvantaged groups, use bicycles as their primary mode of transportation. To this end we hope to provide education on bicycle safety.

We also want to install bicycle repair stations around the community where a cyclist can pump tires and have access to basic tools to repair common problems versus riding an unsafe bike, or literally abandoning their bicycles for lack of resources, City officials have confirmed this is an ongoing issue.

Of the \$30,000 budget, approximately \$23,000 would be allocated to purchase a reliable used 12-passenger van. The other \$7,000 would be dedicated to the bicycle project.

SCHOOL YEAR PROGRAMS

S.T.E.A.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math)

CHARISM S.T.E.A.M. provides academic enrichment opportunities during out-of-school time for children. Programming runs throughout the school year Monday-Friday from 3-5 pm. Nutritious snacks and transportation are provided - caring mentors provide a safe encouraging atmosphere for children to learn and grow!

The program helps students meet state and local education standards in core academic subjects, such as reading and math; offers students a broad array of enrichment activities that can complement their regular academic programs; and offers other life skill development activities so they are able to grow as students and as individuals.

CHARISM will work with over 250 students throughout the year partnering with four schools - Cheney Middle School, Ed Clapp Elementary, Jefferson Elementary, and Lewis & Clark Elementary.







Check & Connect

Mentors work with students who are disengaged from school with poor attendance, behavioral issues, and/or low grades. The Check & Connect program "Checks" and monitors students' performance and the variables involved and "connects" with students and their families by developing strong relationships, personalized approaches and goals to increase their network of support resulting in increased attendance and performance.

CHARISM partners with Jefferson Elementary and Carl Ben Eielsson to support up to 50 at risk students. Mentors work directly within the school to provide support and encouragement to participants.

YEAR ROUND & SUMMER PROGRAMS



GAP (Grocery Assistance Program)

In partnership with Great Plains Food Bank, CHARISM redistributes recovered food from local grocery stores to families in need of groceries.

Fighting food insecurity in the FM Area!

CHARISM distributes food twice weekly on Tuesday and Friday from the CHARISM Family Center. 425 families are registered to receive food - We serve an average of 170 families and distribute an average of 12,000 pounds of food each week



Community Garden

CHARISM organizes a community garden in partnership with Growing Together at McCormick Park for neighborhood residents to work as a team to grow and harvest nutritious food for their families and neighbors. Nutrition and cooking teachings are integrated into each session; participants build connections with their neighbors and community in a meaningful way.. We also have educational sessions with children at the garden to teach them about gardening, weather, and nutritious foods. In 2016 CHARISM had 26 families registered.

CHARISM Kids Camp

Up to 50 participants take part in indoor and outdoor enriching activities with opportunities for fun, friendship, and exploration. Helping children discover science, explore nature, and engage in creative arts - providing a safe environment while decreasing summer learning loss for children.



C4 Youth Camp

An extension of the school year Check & Connect program where at risk youth take part in character building, leadership development, recreation, artistic, and team building activities. Providing a continuation of support and encouragement throughout the summer months keeping at risk youth involved in positive activities.

STEM Academy

In partnership with Cheney Middle School, CHARISM provides STEM centered activities that involve participants applying their knowledge using the engineering design process, critical thinking, and various scientific methods to solve real world problems.



Dear friends at FMPM Rotary Club,

As you may know, for the past 23 years CHARISM has been serving the Fargo/West Fargo area through our mission of "Building Stronger Neighborhoods" by providing educational programming to our children, mentorship programs for our youth, and resource connections for adults and families. We do not just offer a safe place for at risk youth to be after school or during the summer; we also get to reinforce what they are learning in school and teach them new skills. CHARISM focuses on community outreach, to help neighbors get to know each other and build a sense of trust, and respect. CHARISM is always seeking ways and collaborating with various groups to connect our neighbors with more opportunities outside of CHARISM increasing access to meaningful services. Our programs and events are a place for everybody - our team works tirelessly to ensure we reduce any barriers that may hinder participation. CHARISM has had the unique ability and success in engaging, retaining, and impacting a challenging demographic. We experience language barriers as our participants represent 23 unique nationalities. Some of the youth we work with don't fit in any other programs offered in the city because of their behavioral challenges. We also work with families who are guarded, apprehensive, and have difficulty in trusting groups. This is where the success of our relationship based approach comes in to play - through those relationships we are able to build trust, belonging and tailor our approach to make meaningful connections, opportunities, and impacts.

A phrase we have been using lately is "deepening our roots, to expand our reach". And what that means is that for the people that we have been serving and are serving, we are adding even more substantial work looking for ways to help them in their lives now and not just now but also for the future. Then the expanding reach, just this year we have grown to two new elementary schools in the work that we do. Providing educational and enriching after school programs to low income children. There are pockets around the FM area that need the types of programs that CHARISM offers.

Because of this recent growth in meeting the needs of the community, CHARISM is also in need ourselves for an additional van for transportation for our participants. We currently have two ten passenger vans that are used in transporting children home from two of our after school STEAM Club sites Monday — Friday. Those sites are also growing in participant numbers and we are having to start doing two trips per day to get everybody home because their parents are unable to pick them up. Also, because those vans are designated to those programs each day, we have experienced some missed opportunities for participants in our other

programs. We used to take our adult participants to volunteer bi-weekly at various organizations for them to gain experience while learning more about their community. There has also been some decreases in our ability to provide opportunities to our participants to attend skill building workshops. Instead we have been trying to arrange for groups to come visit us to conduct trainings. This school year we have been unable to take the kids on any field trips.

An extra van at CHARISM would provide many opportunities for growth for the individuals we serve, and would allow us to deepen our impact and expand our reach. We would be able to provide children safe transportation home, especially important during the winter months. We would also be able to provide more enriching opportunities for not only children but adults as well throughout the year.

Bicycles are the main form of transportation for the children and youth served within our programs. We feel that there is a great need for bicycle maintenance education, as many of the kids do not know how to fix their bicycle if the chain falls off or the tire goes flat. We feel like this might also be beneficial for the community as it may reduce bicycle theft in our area.

When you think of bicycle programs in the community, most minds go towards bikes for kids; however, in our community there is actual a great need for adults receiving bicycles. A lot of the population we serve do not have their licenses or vehicles and aren't as confident to utilize public transportation regularly. Encouraging cycling and providing bicycle safety education for adults could offer them an opportunity for transportation to employment / training, appointments, and to also serve as a physical fitness activity.

We are so thankful for your continued support of our organization and your dedication to giving back to your community. Thank you for your consideration of assisting us within this proposal.
