What We Are Going To Do

- 1 Construct a borehole well.
- 2. Install a solar powered pump with solar array.
- 3. Build a storage system for over 22,000 liters of water.
- 4. Build a distribution system for the water to provide easy access to the water and a means of payment for it, so that the well will be sustainable.

How will this happen?

- 1. RC Forest Lake, RC Masaai-Mara Narok will work together to write this grant.
- 2. They will work with Rotary Districts 5960 and 9212, and The Rotary Foundation to have it approved.
- 3. They will find a suitable contractor, make sure that the work is done correctly, and that the project is successful.
- 4. The Water Committee for the place called Mukuyuini will educate the people of the community so that the project is maintained, and provides them with many years of service.

Why is this project necessary?

- 1. Currently villagers (mostly women and children) are faced with having to walk approximately 5K to a water supply that is neither clean nor safe.
- 2. Due to the distance and the location of this water source, those tasked with obtaining the water risk attack from humans and wild animals.
- 3. The creation of this clean, safe source of water will allow the village and its economy to grow.

Why do we need your support?

- 1. According to the formulas for DDF's and TRF contributions, we need to raise approximately \$28,000.00.
- 2. The more you give, the more the District gets back from TRF.
- 3. Clean water saves the live of kids!
