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The Flamingos of Change-Rotary District 5870's Annual Foundation Dinner Features Rotary International President Barry Rassin

On February 2, 2019, 404 Rotarians and friends from Rotary District 5870 (Central Texas) gathered for dinner at the Austin Hilton to celebrate the District's support to The Rotary Foundation in Calendar Year 2018. The attendees experienced an uncommon treat, as Rotary International President Barry Rassin served as the guest speaker; it is not every day that the RI President visits an event in one of Rotary's 539 individual Districts!

President Rassin shared amazing stories about our progress towards polio eradication, the importance of the Rotary Peace Fellows program, how work within our Areas of Focus helps bring peace to the world, and how Rotary was the first organization to respond to the earthquake in Haiti. He challenged us, as Rotarians, to think bigger - to find even more ways to have impact on our communities and the world. Finally, he described the cover photo from the July 2018 issue of The Rotarian Magazine to the audience. In that picture, Rassin and his wife Esther are standing in front of seven flamingos, six of which face left, and the seventh faces right. He described the seventh flamingo as "the Flamingo of Change" - the individual that chooses to go against the flow despite the challenges and difficulty. Interestingly enough, the other six

flamingos all performed an about-face and began following the Flamingo of Change just a few minutes after the photo. Rassin's analogy was that we need a Flamingo of Change in every Rotary club, someone who will ask whether the club is relevant today and if it is taking the steps to remain relevant in the future. President Rassin concluded by describing three ways our clubs can embrace change today to remain relevant in the future: deliberately attract young professionals; encourage diversity among our membership; and ensure we provide value to each of our members.

The night was not just about speeches, it was also about recognizing and honoring the selfless contributions made by District 5870 Rotarians

to The Rotary Foundation. RY 2017-2018 was a great year for our District, with over \$499,000 raised for the Foundation; we're poised for an even better year in RY 2018-2019, with more than \$468 thousand raised in the first six months alone! These accomplishments are not possible without the dedication of our individual Rotarians, many of whom were honored in person during the dinner. Across our District in CY 2018, 22 Rotarians achieved a new level of Major Donor status, four achieved a new level of Bequest Society status, 12 achieved a new level of White Hat status, and 561 achieved a new level of Paul Harris Fellow!

Recognition is important, but Service Above Self is what truly drives Rotarians. Each Rotarian in District 5870 understands that three years after contributing to The Rotary Foundation, a portion of their gift returns to their Club by way of the District Assistance Program (DAP) program, and potentially via the Global Grants program. District 5870 clubs are very active in each of these programs. In prior years, Global Grants awarded to our clubs have funded international water projects, literacy projects, and many others; DAP grants have helped our local communities by funding projects at homeless shelters, food pantries, schools, and the Early Act First Knight (EAFK) program. Our giving to The Rotary Foundation is what allows us to "Be the Inspiration" in our communities and around the world!

Now that's all changed! This year for PETS, D5400 launched a website with all its training materials, schedules, slide shows, and handouts for the entire training event all in one place: **www.5400pets.com**.

"This is a great way to put all the material where Club President and club officers can find it easily. The site will stay active for their Rotary year. They can access it at a board meeting or when they are in a club meeting. Share a video. Print a handout. This method saves paper. It makes it easy to correct typos and add information quickly before, during, or after the event," says District Governor Elect Rich Kirkham. The site is set up as a Google Site, a free collaborative software product, that multiple district presenters can work on simultaneously to create the content. All content is housed on the District's free Google Drive. Content can be viewed on desktop, laptop, tablet or mobile devices. "We paid \$1 for our domain name and everything else was free," Kirkham says. "I definitely recommend it to other Districts. It's a great way to go!"

It's hard to believe that I left for Dublin almost six months ago. Over the course of those months I have had the opportunity to see the difference Rotarians and Rotary scholars are making all over the world. Living in Dublin is an exciting and rewarding experience. The Equality Studies program at the University College Dublin offers courses in human rights law, peace and conflict, the economics of equality, and social justice policy. I am enjoying the opportunity to take a variety of classes and discuss issues with people from a wide range of backgrounds.

Within a few weeks of arriving in Dublin, I attended a Rotary Global Grant Scholars weekend in Coventry, England. It was a wonderful opportunity to meet fellow scholars from all over the world who had also just arrived in the U.K. and Ireland to study. My host family for the weekend went out of their way to make me feel welcome. We stayed in touch after the Scholars weekend and in November I joined them on a visit to the Rotary Peace Centre in Bradford, England. It was amazing to hear about the Peace Scholars' work around the world and inspiring to hear what they are planning to do in the next stage of their lives.

I am very grateful to Rotary International and specifically the Rotary Club of Topeka Downtown and Rotary

Club of Dublin-Fingal for being my sponsor and host clubs respectively. The experience to live and study abroad, meeting Rotarians and Rotary scholars from around the world who are united by a desire to create change, has been truly life-changing. I am forever grateful for Rotary's support and kindness.

I took advantage of reading week (no classes February 11-15) and spent a few days in Scotland, just for a change of pace. Edinburgh is a lot quieter than

London, and it was nice to have a few days of walking slowly and some time to catch up.

From February 19-25 I had the opportunity to serve as an elections observer in Moldova. Moldova is a small country located in between Romania and Ukraine. Up until 1940 it was part of Romania, and then it was part of the Soviet Union. So, it is still a very new country transitioning from the Soviet system. I was specially chosen to visit a polling station in the town of Vanitsa, which is on the border with disputed territory Transnistria - a militarized zone. I'm lucky that I could blend in relatively well (most of the time people guess that I am Ukrainian) - and thus overhear conversations in Russian about vote buying and intimidation that people had experienced.

I have three more weeks of classes! I absolutely cannot believe that I'm so close to the end of classes (but of course not assigned papers) - soon I will be able to just focus on my individual research and writing my dissertation until September deadline.

I cannot express how grateful I am for this opportunity. I feel so lucky to be living here and receiving this education. I'm really looking forward to the rest of the year!

A Life-Altering Experience

Gan one person's dream make a profound difference in the lives of others? In 2014-2015, Art Zeitler (District 5930 Governor) shared with the District Scholarship Committee (DSC) a dream he had. College students from District 5930 who had completed at least 2 years of college work and were working towards a degree in a field connected to one of the Rotary Foundation's Areas of Focus could apply for a scholarship. The scholarship would allow them to spend two weeks in Costa Rica (a stable and democratic country) as members of an interdisciplinary medical brigade that would treat individuals in need. The Committee agreed this experience would be invaluable.

Since then, at least two students each year have participated in this two-week experience. The DSC works closely with the International Service Learning (ISL) organization that coordinates this activity to ensure students have a rewarding experience. The DSC pays for each student's registration fee, room and board (some meals), round-trip coach air fare, and travel insurance. The DSC also provides an orientation prior to the trip and assistance, as needed.

ISL also provides invaluable support. These services include 24-hour accompaniment by professional bilingual staff, airport pick-up and drop-off, ground transportation, lodging, two-meals per day, and drinking water. ISL also provides licensed medical professionals to supervise the students, medications and supplies, and a quality international learning experience.

Students also fulfill important responsibilities. These include ensuring their passports and

vaccination records are current. registering on the ISL website, and serving as volunteer members of the Medical Brigade Team. Among students' duties are surveying communities to identify their needs and referring individuals to an ISL clinic, as appropriate; participating in patient interviews and taking their vital signs; and closely observing the examination, diagnosis, and treatment of patients. They also participate in seminars on prevention and treatment of diseases common to the area and play with community children. Students also remain in communication with members of the DSC and engage in Rotary activities prior to, during, and after their trip to the extent possible.

Feedback from the students who participated in the May 26 to June 8, 2018 experience is particularly impactful. They viewed the trip as life-altering because it enabled them to understand how serving others helped improve their own lives and the lives of the people they helped. They are strongly committed to provide support to others in need and encourage college/university students to apply to participate in this experience. Students also enjoyed the recreational and sightseeing activities provided, as well as interacting with and learning from other members of the medical brigade.

The District 5930 Leadership Team is firmly committed to continue this initiative, since it can help develop strongly committed servant leaders. By now, we are confident you can respond with a resounding YES to the initial question and affirm that one person's dream can evolve into a significant and positive experience for others.







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District 5930 Gifts Peace Poll to Texas A&M University Corpus Christi

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas -University campuses are more than just a place of learning – they are a place of self-discovery, pushing boundaries, and making life-long connections with people from different corners of the map. This spirit of unity, as well as diversity, was celebrated during the Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi Peace Pole Dedication as student leaders from a variety of Islander clubs, along with campus representatives and members of South Texas Rotary District 5930 ioined together to commemorate the pole's permanent placement on campus.

The Peace Pole, gifted to the Island University by Rotary District 5930, features the phrase "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in eight different languages, plus Braille. The languages were selected based on the native languages of the most populous groups on campus and include Arabic, English, German, Hindi, Mandarin, Spanish, Urdu, and Vietnamese. The Peace Pole is a white multi-sided post that stands nearly 8-feet-tall and is centrally located near the University Center – between the East Lawn and Anchor Plaza.

"This Peace Pole serves as a beacon for deep discussion and the strong hope of all who gather around it," said Dr. Kelly M. Quintanilla, Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi President. "As Islanders, we strive to not only appreciate our commonalities, but to rejoice in our differences. It is my sincere hope that this pole will be a display of the respect and acceptance we have for each other – leading the way for our communities, our state, our nation, and our world."

Dr. Marilyn Spencer, retired professor and department chair of economics at A&M-Corpus Christi, and past



district governor for Rotary District 5930, led the force bringing the Peace Pole to the Island University.

"T'm so excited to be back on campus for this dedication," said Spencer, who currently serves as Rotary District 5930's peace chair. "Peace is an opportunity for boy and girls, men and women, to enjoy life without fear."

Kayla Stovall, `17 Islander alumna, Rotary Global Scholar, and A&M-Corpus Christi Coordinator of Prevention Programs, attended the Peace Pole ceremony. Stovall has been involved with Rotary since she was 15-years-old, and joined Rotaract, the collegiate arm of Rotary, when she started school at A&M-Corpus Christi. Rotary sponsored Stovall's 2015 medical mission to Costa Rica; and in 2017, Rotary fully-funded Stovall's Master of Public Health at the University of Edinburgh. "For me, peace means harmony – for

"For me, peace means harmony – for today and for the future," said Stovall. "This pole represents so much to me, not just because of what Rotary has done for me personally, but for what they have done internationally to promote peace and conflict resolution."

Peace Poles were first constructed in Japan in 1955 and since then, more than 200,000 have been placed around the world in nearly 200 countries.

"The phrase 'May Peace Prevail on Earth' celebrates diversity, yet oneness in strength," said Andrew Hagan, Rotary District 5930 District Governor. "This phrase embodies the mission of this University to foster and teach peaceful ways to resolve conflict, seek equitable solutions to what may seem to be insurmountable challenges, and actively engage in initiatives emphasizing the importance of our humanitarian service with a purpose."

The Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi student body is comprised of students from 51 different nations and 48 states.

"Our students are here to find solutions to world problems, learn how to be leaders, and make an Islander Impact," Quintanilla concluded. "This pole is going to be a popular gathering place and also a visible symbol and a daily reminder of the values of our great institution."

At the end of the Peace Pole dedication ceremony, attendees locked arms and sang "Let there be Peace on Earth," in a moving tribute to the part each individual plays in the promotion of peace throughout the world.
