What a special opportunity we have to call ourselves Rotarians. Few organizations have compiled the number of leaders Rotary has, all with the desire to give of their time and money to improve their community. As our 2016-2017 Rotary year comes to an end, I'd like to share some District statistics with you all regarding our accomplishments:

- We sent 8 students overseas and received 11 in our International Youth Exchange Program
- We have 7 Interact Clubs and 5 Rotaract Clubs
- 80 Students are attending RYLA this summer, an all-time high
- 42 out of 44 clubs participated in District Grants
- 7 Global Grants initiated covering all 6 Areas of Focus
- \$58,321 donated to Polio Plus... with an additional \$58,000 to be given before June 30th
- \$1,165,589... is the reported money given by our clubs in their communities outside of Grant funding

Junction City Receives Significant Achievement Award

Each year, the District Governor has the opportunity to nominate one club in the District for the Significant Achievement Award. The criteria specifies that the Club address a "Significant problem or need in the community." Last year, Past District Governor John Donovan nominated Junction City for its "Rotary Babes" project.



In 2010, the State of Kansas released the Infant Mortality Survey, which showed that Geary County had the highest infant mortality rate in Kansas. This information hit the club hard. They determined that they were going to make a difference.

Looking for a way to leverage their vocational expertise and community reach, they looked for programs to support, further extending their reach into the community, vice trying to start something completely new. The Geary Community Health Care Foundation had recently started a "mothering" initiative called Delivering Change.

Part of the Delivering Change program is "Becoming a Mom." This is a 6-week class, one night a week for three hours. Challenging both parents and other care-givers to attend all 6 classes.

The Rotary club of Junction City decided to get involved with this class. They had members attend all classes to support the clients. They mentored and encouraged and supported 30 to 40 participants in each class. They let them know the community appreciated them and their babies. Each Rotary meeting, all of the members filled out cards with encouraging and supportive personal messages.

They did this for two 6-week class periods over 4 months. The club raised money to be able to purchase for the members of the class who attended 4 to 6 weeks of the classes, baby monitors, diapers, "Pack n Plays", baby wraps and wipes.

They have greatly increased the visibility of Rotary in Junction City to the point they get acknowledged in passing in public in ways most of us would find embarrassing. Having built this rapport with the community helps the young families know they care and want them to make their doctors appointments, take their prenatal vitamins, follow the doctors instructions, etc. As of 2015, the infant mortality rate in Geary County, Kansas has fallen in half.

As PDG John said in his nomination, "they have truly renewed their club life and purpose, and expanded an awareness of Rotary in Geary County."

Planning Assistance Available to all District Clubs

Overland Park Rotarian **David Stallings** has been assisting three Johnson County clubs by facilitating discussions among members about the future of their clubs. Stallings has now offered his service free, to any Rotary Club in District 5710 that would benefit from his assistance.

Stallings also brings a wealth of knowledge in the nonprofit sector having served as Chief Financial Officer (CFO) for the Girl Scouts of Northeast Kansas and Northwest Missouri.

From 2005 to 2010, David provided consulting services exclusively to nonprofit organizations. David has served as an adjunct professor teaching Public Finance, and Financial and Legal Frameworks of Nonprofits in the Masters of Public Administration program in the Bloch School of Business at the University of Missouri – Kansas City (UMKC) and graduate programs at Rockhurst University in Kansas City.

The <u>Rotary Club of Overland Park</u> provided the Kansas City Kansas School District (<u>USD 500</u>) with a donation of **75,000 new children's books.** Forty-nine schools (elementary thru high school) and Head Start Programs in USD 500 received these donated children's books. In addition, several charitable organizations whom serve the Kansas City, KS, community received new book donations. The entire book donation had a **monetary value of \$825,000**.

A press event was held Thursday, May 18, 1 PM, at Kansas City Kansas Community College Dr. Thomas R. Burke Technical Education Center.

More than 20 Rotarians, KCKCC Tech Center Staff and VIP's including: Mayor Mark Holland, Kansas City Chiefs Ambassadors, Dr. Doris Givens (President, KCK Community College), Dr. Cynthia Lane (Superintendent USD 500), and Erin Carlstrom (VP of Educational Programs) Feed the Children and their film crew attended.

The Burlington Rotary Club's third annual Catfish Capital Tournament and Fish Fry is right around the corner. The tournament, for two-person teams of all skill levels, will begin at noon Friday, June 2, and conclude at 2 p.m. Saturday, June 3.

The fish fry with all the fixings, which is open to the public, will be held at 5 p.m. Saturday at Rock Creek Country Club. There will be a chicken option. Team prizes and individual prizes will be awarded following the fish fry.

The fishing tournament and fish fry celebrate Burlington's catfishing heritage and the town's designation as Catfish Capital of the World. Coffey County offers some of the best all-around catfishing, whether you are fishing for yellow cats, blue cats, or bullhead.

The catfish tournament is a catch, measure and photo format. Length, not weight, of up to five catfish will determine the winner. Teams will be able to fish anywhere and using any method allowed by law.

Cash prizes will be awarded to winning teams in two flights. Individual cash prizes will also be awarded for longest flathead catfish, longest blue catfish, longest channel catfish, longest bullhead catfish, longest catfish caught by 8-14 year-old, longest catfish caught by fisherman 7 years old and under, and shortest catfish submitted.

In Memory— Past District Governor David Baker

Our District lost a Past District Governor on May 16, 2017. Although he was only in our District for a short time, Dave was a devoted Rotarian. Here is an excerpt from his Obituary:

After graduating from K.U. he joined First National Bank of Topeka as a teller. He spent over sixty years in the financial arena, in Topeka, Hutchinson, Wichita and most recently as Vice President of the Bank of Eureka Springs, AR. He and his wife retired in Lawrence in 2013. Dave was a devoted husband, father and grandfather who enjoyed the times spent with his family especially this past February while celebrating and early 60th wedding anniversary with them on a Caribbean Cruise.



He was an active civic leader in the communities where he lived, serving on the United Way, Chamber, American Cancer Society and many other organizations.

He almost accomplished 50 years of perfect attendance as an active Rotarian. He served as President three times, chairman of many committees and participated in many conferences. He was selected Rotary District Governor 6110 in 1999 – 2000 which covered 77 clubs in parts of Arkansas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Kansas.

His passion since 1986 has been the Eradication of Polio Worldwide. He wanted that to happen in his lifetime. He attended many International Rotary conventions and was looking forward to this year's in Atlanta, Georgia. He had nearly 50 years' perfect attendance. He received the 4 Avenues of Service Award, the Foundation Award and the International Commitment Award. He believed and lived the Rotary Motto "Service Above Self". Dave was a Paul Harris Fellow, member of the Bequest Society and Benefactor. He loved reading to kids in the Elementary School and working with youth related programs.
