2017 Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA)

RYLA 2017 is a five-day camp for incoming high school sophomores, juniors and seniors interested in developing leadership potential. The students will learn from business and community leaders about strengthening their leadership skills and abilities, promoting ethical behavior, and facilitating personal growth and self-awareness.

There are several past participants of this program that stated their experience was life-changing and made them more aware of their capabilities. It is common to see a student become emotional when talking about their experience with RYLA. For many students, this is their first exposure to Rotary and what we, as Rotarians, can accomplish. The projects and exercises in this five-day camp are designed to get the students to think differently about certain situations and develop their own solutions with fellow students they may have not met before attending the camp. Many students worldwide, who have attended RYLA, have continued on to become members of an Interact, Rotaract, and eventually a Rotary club.

The University of Kansas in Lawrence will once again host District 5710's Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA) from June 4th - June 8th. The cost per student is \$325 (\$300 registration fee paid by the sponsoring club and \$25 application fee paid by the student). 69 students attended last year's RYLA, engaging in a wide range of leadership development, team-building, civic engagement, and community service activities.

1947 Saturday Evening Post Article About Rotary in Topeka

DGN Blanche Parks was visiting the Lawrence Rotary Club when one of the members shared this article from the January 11, 1947 Saturday Evening Post. The correspondent had visited the now Downtown Topeka Rotary Club. A fun, humorous read!

Is Topeka Prepared for Rotary International?

Well, we thought we had seen everything until this copy of PM, the left-wing New York tabloid, landed on our desk the other day. It seems that an intrepid PM correspondent, venturing into the hostile territory of Kansas, was invited to a Rotary Club luncheon in Topeka. His dispatch home about the experience read something like an anthropologist's eyewitness report on a forbidden voodooistic ritual in Haiti, but with a remarkable difference that will appeal to habitual trend-spotters.



The dispatch took note of a few retrograde tribal customs, such as badgewearing, back-slapping and round of applause designed to welcome Rotarians

from distant places. Then it got interesting. "I've met a number of Topeka Rotarians and I like them," the PM man reported courageously. "They are generally conservative folks, but they are invariably fair minded and decent." Continuing, he spoke glowingly of "the independence and basic integrity of these plain people," and rapped some of his more narrow-minded ideological colleagues back home by remarking, "Too many progressives, unfortunately, have been too deeply influenced by the bitter debunking literature of Sinclair Lewis and his imitators. They tend to look down their noses at Rotary and all its works."

The PM man paused long enough on his spirited defense of the humble prairie muzhiks to admit that some of them were "somewhat ingrown, complacent." But he had a paternal and forgiving explanation for this. He wrote: "The Midwestern middle class, urban and rural, is largely insulated by tradition, geographical setting and present circumstances against the inflow of progressive thought that washes our coastal towns."

Columbus, as is well known, stumbled upon the New World while trying to find a new route to the East Indies. Journalistic history may record a similar fateful turn of chance in the case of the worthy PM correspondent: he happened to be out in Topeka interviewing some psychiatrists when he discovered the Rotary Club. Maybe we should all travel more.

Leawood's "Charitable Giving February"

The Leawood Rotary Club recently presented checks to three local charities, all of whom impact the lives of children and teens in the Kansas City area. These funds were to culmination of two separate auctions held during the 2016 Christmas season. With the \$3000 raised, the membership voted to gift \$1000 each to Urban Rangers, Sacred and Safehome Shelter.

-Urban Rangers works to prepare at-risk inner city youth for responsible and productive futures through a program of disciplined work experience and service in their community.

-Safehome's mission is to break the cycle of domestic violence for victims and their children by providing shelter, advocacy, counseling, and prevention education in our community.

-Sexually Abused Children's Relief Endeavor – or sacred - provides immediate financial assistance to families in need due to the reporting of child sexual abuse.

Representatives from all of these charities have made presentations to the Leawood Rotary in the past year or so and many of our members are board members or active advocates for these organizations.
