CELEBRATING 30 YEARS OF WOMEN IN ROTARY

District Governor Elect Blanche Parks has announced a special event to kick off her inauguration year by supporting women in need.

Her goal is to raise \$5,710 to purchase the items for Women's Hygiene Kits. These kits will be sent to disaster areas and underserved countries. The kits will be assembled by Rotarians during the District Conference April 27th in Lenexa.



Girls in developing nations often lack access to adequate menstrual hygiene products. Instead these girls may use rags or grass as a substitute and have to change those in isolated, poorly lit areas, often resulting in infections, stains and physical attacks. To avoid embarrassment, potential attack and the cultural stigma associated with menstruation, many girls will choose to stay away from school during their periods, missing several days of education every month. Girl's menstrual hygiene kits were developed to break the cycle of poverty by giving girls the confidence and security to continue attending school, regardless of menstruation.

The Rotary Peace Committee will be hosting a presentation by Dorthy Stucky Halley, LMSW on Thursday, March 22. A licensed master social worker, Halley is director of the Victim Services Division in the Kansas attorney general's office. Halley, who received the Outstanding Victim Advocate of the Year award in 1996, has given more than 1,000 presentations at the national, state and local level on batterer intervention, domestic violence, human trafficking and other topics regarding victimization.

2018 ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP ACADEMY (RYLA)

RYLA 2018 is a five-day camp for incoming high school sophomores, juniors and seniors interested in developing leadership potential. The students will learn from business and community leaders about strengthening their leadership skills and abilities, promoting ethical behavior, and facilitating personal growth and self-awareness. There are several past participants of this program that stated their experience was life-changing and made them more aware of their



capabilities. It is common to see a student become emotional when talking about their experience with RYLA. For many students, this is their first exposure to Rotary and what we, as Rotarians, can accomplish. The projects and exercises in this five-day camp are designed to get the students to think differently about certain situations and develop their own solutions with fellow students they may have not met before attending the camp. Many students worldwide, who have attended RYLA, have continued on to become members of an Interact, Rotaract, and eventually a Rotary club.

The University of Kansas in Lawrence will once again host District 5710's Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA) from June 3th - June 7th. The cost per student is \$325 (\$300 registration fee paid by the sponsoring club and \$25 application fee paid by the student). 85 students attended last year's RYLA, engaging in a wide range of leadership development, team-building, civic engagement, and community service activities.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING AT THE KANSAS LEADERSHIP CENTER



Thanks to the efforts of Pat O'Donnell of the Olathe Rotary Club, Rotary District **LEADERSHIP** 5710 has received a Kansas Leadership Center Transformation Grant. This Grant of \$25,000 provides 40 training seats at the Kansas Leadership Center. The Kan-

sas Leadership Center is a non-profit organization committed to building stronger, healthier more prosperous communities through the effective exercise of leadership.

The district has 25 seats remaining for these three courses offered by KLC:

Your Leadership Edge: Designed for anyone who wants to lead more and get better results. Three days of intense learning followed by virtual learning. Held monthly in Wichita and Four times in the Kansas City Area

Lead for Change: Designed for people called to lead others through tough situations. Transforming the way you engage with your community or organization. Phase 1: Four Days at the Kansas Leadership Center. Phase 2: Three Months of Coaching and Online Learning. Phase 3: Three additional days at the Kansas Learning Center

Equip to Lead: Designed for those who know the KLC framework and want to share the Ideas with others.

Tuition is provided by the grant and all other cost will be the responsibility of the participants.

International Projects - How Can Clubs Help?

Are you interested in being involved with an International Project, but don't know how to get started? There are on-going projects right here in your district that could use your help!

Manhattan Konza Has Project Plans in Honduras - Interested in Helping?

Our June 2018 (tentative) project is to build a +20 x 20' catchment and storage building (+9,000 gallons) in the village of Bentley Bay, island of St. Helene, Honduras. The 29 homes, 80-100 residents (fluctuates with employment and school) only source of water currently is 50 - 500 gallon personal rain barrels. During dry periods they have to purchase and ferry water by land or water taxi. We plan to build a community water storage (that can in the future tie into a water distribution system being pursued by other Rotary Clubs including Roatan and Edmonton) and deliver thirty 5 gallon, Sawyer Filter, purification systems for each home.

Manhattan Konza currently has \$15,000 on hand for this project. We would like to hear from other Clubs which have available dollars so we can increase catchment volume. Jayhawk Breakfast & Village West Working in Panama

In partnership with the Jayhawk Breakfast Rotary Club, Woodland Charity and the Community of Buenos Aires, Chepo, Panama, a community medical facility will be updated to able to provide medical service to 100% of the families of Buenos Aires. Rotarians of Village West RC of Kansas: Glenn Harte and President Jeri McDonnell visited the facility during their past trip to Buenos Aires, Chepo, Panama and helped with the assessment of the project.

The community of Buenos Aires is led by the principal of the school, Mrs. Maria, and a health community committee. The health committee includes volunteer mothers and parents who collaborate during the implementation of the project and on-going follow-ups.

Local leaders started the project by cleaning up the facility and soon will start working with painting the clinic, putting on a new roof and installing all supplies needed in the community clinic. Woodland anticipates completing this project by May 2018.







