Message from District Governor Adam Ehlert

We will discuss and announce (ssshhh, don't yet tell President Ian) a partnership with our neighboring districts, to launch a Public Image and Membership campaign. This will position us well, in concert with DGE Blanche's neighbor-Governors, to grow in the first few months of the new Rotary year.

Thank you all for your support so far, and especially in the remaining two months of this Rotary year. Your enthusiasm is driving our ability to continue *Making a Difference*.

2018 DISTRICT CONFERENCE & ASSEMBLY RE-CAP

For the Rotarians who attended the 2018 District Conference and Assembly, the theme "Rotary: Making a Difference" resonated throughout the entire event. Friday morning's highlights included presentations about Zone Institute, RLI graduates, RYLA info, Kansas Leadership Center, The Rotary Foundation, Membership and a message from RIP-elect Barry Rassin.

Collectively, the audience was blown away by our lunch speaker and performer Janine Stange, "The National Anthem Girl." Janine is the first person to perform the National Anthem in all 50 states. She shared a wonderful story about her inspiring mother—then sang the Star Spangled Banner for us. Goosebumps all around.

The afternoon featured an outstanding panel celebrating the 30 years of Women in Rotary, which included our three female PDGs Sandy Rieger, Vickie Randel and Deb Rodenbaugh-Schaub, as well as Olathe President Vanessa Vaughn-West, Rotarians Judy Wright and Joan Wagnon, as well as the lone male panelist PDG Bill Kromer.

After recognizing Heart to Heart for its 25 years in service—and in partnership with Rotary, a check was presented for \$7,500 collected in honor of the 30 years of Women in Rotary, for women's hygiene kits. The day concluded with a service project for Heart to Heart, and the kits were assembled.

The evening dinner proved to be an extension of the day, with awards and recognitions by DG Adam. The presidents and presidents-elect were recognized and a very special Paul Harris Fellow was awarded to Charlotte Urban (daughter of Village West member Lee Urban). Frank White shared stories of his baseball career while the packed house enjoyed dinner. The silent auction and "murder mystery" entertainment concluded the evening.

Saturday picked up where Friday left off with the ever-popular panel of Youth Exchange students, followed by fantastic presentations on peace and the plight of human trafficking. The Friendship Exchange team provided lots of info and pictures, then we learned all about the efforts of the tree-planting initiative, polio-plus and public image.

Saturday's luncheon brought our conference to a close, with our fantastic President's Rep, PDG Carolyn Johnson. Carolyn embodies "Making a Difference" and told us about her efforts with literacy and teaching children in Guatemala to read. A teacher by trade, Carolyn's passion for literacy and Rotary is evident in every word she speaks.



2018 Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA)

We are getting closer to RYLA week. I have heard from several of you around District 5710 and it appears that we have a lot of interest in RYLA again this year. We have received a few applications, so far, but I am hoping that we see more in the next few weeks. Remember May 4th is the deadline to turn in the applications for the students



your club wants to sponsor. Do not let your club miss out on this wonderful opportunity to sponsor a student to enjoy this unique experience.

RYLA 2018 is a five-day camp for incoming high school sophomores, juniors and seniors interested in developing leadership potential. The students will learn from business and community leaders about strengthening their leadership skills and abilities, promoting ethical behavior, and facilitating personal growth and selfawareness. There are several past participants of this program that stated their experience was life-changing and made them more aware of their capabilities. It is common to see a student become emotional when talking about their experience with RYLA. For many students, this is their first exposure to Rotary and what we, as Rotarians, can accomplish. The projects and exercises in this five-day camp are designed to get the students to think differently about certain situations and develop their own solutions with fellow students they may have not met before attending the camp. Many students worldwide, who have attended RYLA, have continued on to become members of an Interact, Rotaract, and eventually a Rotary club.

The University of Kansas in Lawrence will once again host District 5710's Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA) from June 3th - June 7th. The cost per student is \$325 (\$300 registration fee paid by the sponsoring club and \$25 application fee paid by the student). A record 85students attended last year's RYLA, engaging in a wide range of leadership development, team-building, civic engagement, and community service activities.

DISTRICT PEACE & CONFLICT RESOLUTION PROJECT

We are working with the Kansas Attorney General, Derek Schmidt's office on this project and we are starting with 2 projects that are:



- Providing Crisis Packs for victims
- Assisting in the roll out of an Educational program, "End the Demand," to our clubs, businesses, and communities

There are many more areas that we can work in if we have enough interest from the clubs in our District. A major need is a "safe house" for victims who have been rescued to stay while they are waiting to testify.

Tuition is provided by the grant and all other cost will be the responsibility of the participants.

There is great Polio-Plus news that through the start of May there have been ZERO new cases of Polio for 3 weeks in a row. Even if the 8 cases reported so far this year in Afghanistan and Pakistan are the last cases we ever see it will still be 3 years before Polio will have been declared eradicated. And after that, every child, everywhere, must be vaccinated every year to assure that Polio will never emerge again! So now is the time to look ahead to see if our Clubs can grow this year's \$92,000 in donations all the way to the \$100,000 donation level and with District help turn that into more than ½ Billion \$'s for Polio-Plus.



Think of what we can do if every club plans a significant funding event for EndPolioNow to take advantage of the Bill & Malinda Gates 2X Gift Match. There are great ideas for these events ranging from Art Fairs to Food



Feasts; Bike Rides to Bar-B-Q's; fly the END POLIO NOW Flag; and lots more. On July 27th we can all turn up to "STRIKE OUT POLIO" at T-Bones Park. As individual Rotarians, you can be prepared to advocate for Polio-Plus in your communities: wear your "End Polio Now" button with your Rotary Pin; follow Polio-Plus on Facebook and Twitter; share what your club is doing to End Polio Now on social media; reach out to friends, neighbors and your community to encourage advocacy for reaching our goal of polio eradication. LAWRENCE ROTARY PLANTS FRUIT TREES FOR COMMUNITY

The Lawrence Rotary Club had two responses to RI President Ian Riseley's request that each Rotary Club plant a tree for each member. First, they observed that the club had already planted 200 trees at the Rotary Arboretum, inaugurated to celebrate Rotary's 100th anniversary in 2005. Second, in response to a suggestion, they agreed that planting fruit trees in public areas might contribute both to air quality and nutrition in the community.

With an anonymous donation of \$500, matched by \$591 in Blue Cup funds, the club partnered with Just Food and the Lawrence Fruit Tree Project. They purchased 50 apple, pear and peach trees and planted them, with the help of Just Food volunteers, around the food pantry facility and on Just Food's property in North Lawrence. The Lawrence Fruit Tree Project planted 17 Asian pear, jujube, persimmon, peach, mulberry, cherry and autumn olive trees near the Sunrise Project, the Children's Shelter, and the Lawrence Community Orchard.



HOLTON COMPLETES PROJECT FOR CITY



The Holton Rotary recently completed a 2part service project for the City of Holton, which involved painting the city's fire hydrants.

The club started in the fall and just wrapped up the project on April 5. Teams of two set off across the city with a map, paint and paintbrushes—and got the job done!

NEWLY-FORMED AMBASSADORS CLUB FINDING ITS IDENTITY

Officially formed May 31, 2017, the Ambassadors (West Kansas City) Rotary Club (we refer to ourselves as the Ambassadors Rotary Club) is the brainchild of founder Kevin Tubbesing and represents a new kind of Rotary Club.

Organized around monthly meetings that encourage the participation of spouses and significant others, 8 meetings per year are of the social/networking variety and 4 meetings per year are dinner parties. The monthly hosts are given a budget from the Club to entertain and select the site and the menu.

The Ambassadors kicked off with their first monthly meeting on July 16, 2017. First year highlights for the Ambassadors include:

Inaugural Ambassador Rotary Dinner on September 9, 2017.

Participation in the Rise Against Hunger meal packaging event at Shawnee Mission Northwest High School on November 14, 2017. This was the Ambassadors' first public service project and helped raise \$3,000 for this worthy cause. Rise Against Hunger was founded in 2012, and through 2017 has packaged and distributed more than 5.6 million meals in 14 countries.



At our January meeting we received a presentation from representatives of the Rotary Youth Leadership Academy about the Ambassadors' grant to send 5 students to this summer's RYLA camp at KU.

In lieu of our February social meeting, the Ambassadors purchased several tables at the Sunflower House Gala. Sunflower House is non-profit headquartered in Shawnee, Kansas that protects children in our community from physical and sexual abuse through education, advocacy, forensic, medical and therapeutic services. The Gala was co-chaired by Ambassador members Kevin and Dawn Tubbesing and raised more than \$200,000 for Sunflower House.



At our March meeting, the presidency of the Ambassadors was passed to Dr. Rick Randolph and District Governor Adam Ehlert and his wife Heather attended as guests. We received on update on RYLA applications and on Mexico mission trip opportunities.



At our April meeting, we received a presentation from Rick Reiman, Executive Director of The Giving Grove, a program of Kansas City Community Gardens that helps communities in the Kansas City metro area plant small orchards to provide nutritious fruits and nuts for neighborhoods in need.

The Ambassadors enjoyed a successful first year and are looking forward to increased activities in 2018-2019.

LEAWOOD ROTARIANS COMMIT TO PLANTING ONE TREE FOR EACH MEMBER

When the Rotary International President challenged Rotarians around the world to improve our planet and our communities by planting one new tree for each Rotary member, the Leawood membership decided to accept the challenge. After consulting with the Leawood Parks and Recreation department, plans were made for a Rotary tree grove at Ironwoods Park where 20 trees would be planted. This is the first planting in what will be a three-year, 60 tree project.



With the guidance of the City's tree expert, Dustin Branick, the 20th tree, a new Black Gum, was put in place just in time for an Earth Day dedication.



Taking part in the dedication were, Rotary President, Roxann Kerr Lindsey, Tree Project Committee Members, Jim Arnett, Mel Hawk, and Chuck Sipple.

Also digging and shoveling were Rotarians, Chuck Udell, Brad Moore, Jim Rawlings, Bill Crowe, and Charles Lusk. The club was also pleased to have Alice Hawk, president of the Leawood Foundation, and Chris Claxton, Leawood Parks and Recreation Director, present to witness the dedication.

Konza Rotarians Build Garden Boxes, Plant Fruits & Vegetables, Grow Relationships Along the Way

The Homestead is a safe, transitional care program for women 18 years and older who have exited the sex trafficking industry. Participants (Homesteaders) live in a house in Manhattan and have access to drug, alcohol, and mental health counseling, as well as general health care from partnering local social service agencies. Life skill classes give homesteaders the tools to develop a 3-phase Individual Growth Plan to meet long and short term goals. Education and Job Training allow them to integrate back into mainstream society.

Konza Rotarians became aware of the Homestead in 2016 and began to learn more about its operation in order to pursue a District Grant. A fundraiser was conducted in May 2017 in order to support the organization's Healthy Eating Initiative.

This project culminated into the building of raised garden boxes on site, so that homesteaders can learn about healthy eating habits and participate in growing their own food. The joint gardening efforts moving forward

will allow for continued relationship building with Homesteaders and Konza Rotararians.

In addition to the gardening, grant funds were used to purchase identified needs in the facility's kitchen. Utensils, tableware, cookware and small appliances further promote meals that are nutritious and healthy.

The Homestead is operated by Homestead Ministries, a not-for -profit 501c3 agency.
