Promote the Four-Way Test on its 50th Anniversary

Businesses that ignore the principles outlined in The Four-Way Test don't have much trouble getting noticed. Cook the books, set up a shady Ponzi scheme, or get caught cheating on your taxes and you're front-page news. But what about companies that abide by the test, quietly practicing truthfulness, fairness, and goodwill every day?

Ethics awards can help even the score. Presented by Rotary clubs and Districts, sometimes in cooperation with local business schools or other like-minded organizations, the awards recognize professionals who adhere to high ethical standards in their businesses and communities. They also shine a light on Potany's litrus test for athical conduct. How can you publicize The Four

also shine a light on Rotary's litmus test for ethical conduct. How can you publicize The Four-Way Test?

- Essay and Speech Contests—Invite students to submit essays or speak on a topic related to ethics and The Four-Way Test.
 - Scholarships—Establish a scholarship program that rewards ethical behavior or asks students to articulate how they will use the test in their careers.
- Teammates—Co-sponsor speakers and workshops with local business schools or chambers of commerce, or team up with national groups such as Character Counts (charactercounts.org), to support ethics education in schools.

A Tribute to PDG Gene Amos

On July 24th District 5710 lost a dear friend and a dedicated Rotarian, Gene Amos. Gene had been a Rotarian for 56 years and had 56 years of perfect attendance. He was a member and past president of the Lenexa Rotary Club, and before that had belonged to the DeSoto and Shawnee Mission Rotary Clubs. He helped start the Shawnee Club in February of 1997 and mentored its first full-year president, his daughter, Joni Pflumm. He attended meetings at the Shawnee Club almost every week, in addition to meeting with his own club. Gene served in a number of leadership positions in District 5710. He was District Governor in 1985-**86, when the Rotary theme was "You Are the Key." July 1, 1985, the first day on the** job as District Governor, Gene and Pet Heaven hand delivered an application for the formation of the Johnson County Rotary Club to the Rotary International President in Evanston, IL. In addition, he was a loyal supporter of The Rotary Foundation, by his gifts and his service. He was a Paul Harris Fellow as are every member of his family. Gene received the Rotary International District Service Award in 2002-03. He led the District in raising funds to eradicate polio, and was recognized by 2009-10 Rotary International President president president John Kenny for his long service, faithful attendance and his leadership in the fight



against polio. The District also honored him in 2009 for his outstanding contribution to the campaign to eliminate polio.

Our thoughts go out to his wife, Margaret and his family, and we join them in celebrating the life of this wonderful man.

Reach One, Keep One-New RI Membership Slogan

The RI Board of Directors adopted a new membership slogan, "Each Rotarian: Reach One, Keep One," at its June meeting. The slogan emphasizes the need for Rotarians to focus on both recruitment and retention in their membership growth efforts.

"Membership development is each Rotarian's responsibility," said Paul Netzel, a member of RI's Membership Development and Retention Committee and a past RI director.

"'Reach One' reminds us that because Rotary membership is by invitation, it's essential that each Rotarian reaches out and invites someone to join," added Netzel, a member of the Rotary Club of Los Angeles.

"Keep One' reminds us that it's not sufficient to simply sponsor someone into Rotary; we must also see that new members become active and involved Rotarians. We know this is an essential element in membership retention."

The new slogan complements the Board's long-term membership strategy, which was also adopted at the June meeting.

Member sponsor and retention recognition

At its January meeting, the RI Board adopted a New Member Sponsor and Retention Recognition program, which became effective July 1st. The program, also part of the long-term membership strategy, allows Rotary club presidents to nominate and recognize individuals for sponsoring new members while focusing on retention. There are several award categories:

- Gold pin and certificate: For Rotarians bringing 25 members into any Rotary club, with 20 still active after six years
- Silver pin and certificate: For Rotarians bringing 10 members into any Rotary club, with eight still active after four years
- Bronze pin and certificate: For Rotarians bringing five members into any Rotary club, with four still active after two years

Banerjee is Choice for 2011-12 RI President

Kalyan Banerjee, a member of the Rotary Club of Vapi, Gujarat, India, since 1972, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International in 2011-12. Banerjee will become the president-nominee on October 1st if there are no challenging candidates.

Banerjee said he would like to see Rotary blossom from being the world's most recognized service organization to being the most important nongovernmental organization in the world. "Rotary, it is said, has the strength of a government and the tenderness of a parent," he added.

Banerjee has served Rotary as a director, Rotary Foundation trustee, committee and task force chair, International Assembly group discussion leader, president's representative, and district governor.

The chair of the Southeast Asia Regional PolioPlus Committee, Banerjee has served as a member of the International PolioPlus Committee for many years and has attended international meetings with the World Health Organization and UNICEF in that capacity.

Banerjee noted that Rotary's strengths include its ability to attract leaders from different vocations around the world, as well as its role in promoting peace. "Rotary needs to become the preferred organization for today's generation to join and participate in, to make the world better and safer and happier," he said.

Banerjee's wife, Binota, is a social worker and Inner Wheel club member. The couple have two children and four grandchildren.





Reversing a Membership Freefall-Establish Priorities

Is you club at a plateau—do you have the same number of members at the start of the 2009-10 Rotary year that you had at the start of the 2008-09 year? Is your club on the downward freefall with less members to start this Rotary year?

Why is this happening to so many clubs? What are the issues and how does your club overcome them? Here are a few guidelines to consider.

 ESTABLISH PRIORITIES—To reverse the decline in not a one-person show; it requires the cooperation and help of many. What are the needs of your members? Effective clubs advance



the Object of Rotary, which satisfies their members' networking, friendship, and achievement needs. Focus on becoming more effective by satisfying the members' needs. Find out why new members joined the club. Why do long-time members stay?

- CREATE A POWERFUL GUIDING COALITION—Your club Board is a logical place to start building a coalition, but don't leave out long-time or new members. Be sure to ask present and future leaders to join the coalition.
- ESTABLISH AN ATTAINABLE VISION—Your membership coalition must establish goals that are attainable within a reasonable length of time.
- CREATE A PLAN WITH SHORT-TERM ATTAINABLE MILESTONES—Real change takes time, but the vision will be lost if the coalition does not build in short-term successes.
- COMMUNICATE—Plan to communicate priorities and timely updates to all members. Share the coalition's membership/ retention plans and keep the members' of the club up-to-date with information where the club stand relative to the long term and short term goals.
- REMOVE OBSTACLES—Obstacles will arise as your club proceeds on the path to success. Many try to side step or ignore impediments rather than deal with them. The most common obstacle are those who "fight the wind of change." Find a way to satisfy their needs as well as the needs of the club members ready to move forward and upward.
- DO NOT DECLARE THE MISSION ACCOMPLISHED TOO SOON—Once you have meet your desired goal, refine the priorities until the new customs and practices become operational norms. Only then can your club continue to grow.

Reversing your club's Membership Freefall must be the number one priority of all members.

Reversing the membership freefall must receive top billing in letters, newsletters, training sessions, web pages, club bulletins, speeches, awards, projects; otherwise the growth will not happen and the enthusiasm of those who want change will cease.

Simply put—"THE FUTURE OF ROTARY IS IN YOUR HANDS"

What is your favorite color, holiday, ..., and why? Why did you join Rotary? What keeps you active? What is one thing about yourself that most people do not know? What hobbies do you have? Tell everyone about your family, job...., and on and on. The object is to get to know your members.


Village West Rotary Club Planning 3rd Annual Parade of Heroes

Rotary Books For Kids Project


For the past three years Kansas City area Rotary Clubs have partnered to provide more than 16,000 books for the six-county area of Head Start programs.
