"Strike Out Polio"



Sunday, August 23rd Kauffman Stadium Kansas City, Missouri 1:10 pm game between the Kansas City Royals and the Minnesota Twins

Bring your family, friends, neighbors and colleagues to Kauffman Stadium for a "Strike Out Polio" event that will involve over <u>TEN</u> Rotary Districts. The goal is to have at least 1,000 Rotarians and their guests attend this game. This is a tremendous opportunity to raise funds for PolioPlus/Gates Challenge and to raise public awareness of Rotary's effort to eradicate Polio—and also a great "Family of Rotary" event.

Rotary will have a booth at the game to be used by the various districts to promote the eradication of Polio and the PolioPlus program. There will also be several Rotary **"Public Service Announcements" broadcast on** the scoreboard at the stadium throughout the game.

HOW CAN THIS BENEFIT YOUR CLUB?

Use a sign-up sheet at your meetings to gather names, number of people attending and a contact phone number. Once you have a ticket count for your club, call Brian Madden (Royals Group Sales Representative for Rotary—816.504.4165) and give him your order. Payment will need to be by credit card or check.

Then you collect \$26 per ticket from those attending the game. This is the regular price charged by the Royals for these seats -Field Plaza on the 3rd base side, lower level. However, to help Rotary "Strike Out Polio" the Royals will charge only \$12 per ticket. Your club keeps the \$14 per ticket profit to be sent to Rotary International for your club's contribution to the PolioPlus/Gates Challenge. There will be an \$8 shipping and handling charge on each group order of tickets. The tickets will be mailed to your club (be sure to allow time for this) for distribution.

Why not promote this in your community! Share with the baseball and softball teams in your area. Promote at retirement villages. Hand out flyers to your co-workers. Contact former club members. Involve your club's new or prospective members. Send flyers to other community clubs in your area—Kiwanis, Lions, etc. And the list goes on and on.

Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA)

Over seventy high school students participated in the District's annual Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA) held at the University of Kansas in Lawrence from May 31 to June 4.

The diverse group of students represented twenty-nine cities and towns in Eastern Kansas with their local clubs paying for their cost of attendance. Throughout the five days, the students participated in a wide range of activities designed to develop their leadership skills and to promote the importance of community service.





Robert Thompson of the Gardner Club and District Polio Eradication Chair and Lenet Compton of the Spring Hill Club kicked-off the program Sunday evening with an enlightening presentation on Rotary's efforts to eradicate polio. The students would later divide into small groups and use the

information presented by Robert and Lenet to develop fundraising proposals involving Rotary and polio eradication.

The students spent most of Monday at the Adams Challenge Course, participating in a series of teambuilding exercises facilitated by KU staff. On Tuesday, the

Lawrence United Way coordinated several community service projects for the students to participate in, including stocking shelves in a local food and clothes pantry. That experience **led into Wednesday's sessions that featured a tremendously received presentation on civic** engagement by Dr. Barbara Ballard of the Lawrence Lunch Club. She also hosted the **students for a tour of the Dole Institute of Politics and participated in a "mentoring lunch"** along with several other Rotarians.

A true highlight of RYLA was Thursday's graduation ceremony that saw over two hundred parents and Rotarians in attendance. District Governor Vickie Randall began the ceremony with an inspiring talk on the importance of leadership and community involvement. The students then delivered formal presentations on their small group projects, demonstrating their ability to work as a team along with their newly gained knowledge of Rotary.

This was the first time for KU to host RYLA, with the program developed and coordinated by **the staff of KU's Memorial Union Corporation. The RYLA Committee is currently evaluating** host sites for RYLA 2010 with a formal announcement expected sometime in July.

The RYLA Committee would like to thank all the Rotarians, particularly club RYLA chairs, who helped to make the program a tremendous success!







Rotary and Heart to Heart Team Bring WASH Program to Guatemala

From May 6-13, 2009 a team of Rotarians from Leawood and Overland Park South Rotary Clubs and a Heart to Heart International volunteer participated in the implementation of the Water, Hygiene and Sanitation Program (WASH) in the communities of Patanatic, San Andres Semetabaj and San Antonio Palopo located in the department of Sololá, Guatemala. This year the clubs, with the assistance of the Olathe Rotary Club and a 2008-09 Grant, the team was able to fund 120 water filters, 11 stoves, 12 latrines, 1,200 doses of de-worming medicine, hand-washing kits, multivitamins and educational materials/training.



During this Intensive Service Opportunity (ISO), the volunteer team held a meeting with the seven school's principals to learn about the status of the WASH program in their schools and partici-

pated in the installation of the portable water filtration systems, stoves, latrines, and hand washing education activities, as part of phase two of the WASH program.

<u>Portable Water Filtration System Installation:</u> The portable water filter is a 7-pound unit that can purify five gallons of water every twelve hours. In the community of San Luis Patanatic the team installed 109 portable

water filters in homes, beneficiating 545 parents and children. The team also installed 40 water filters in San Andres Semetabaj and 40 filters in San Antonio Palopo beneficiating and additional 400 students, siblings and parents.

<u>Hand-Washing Program</u>: Because of the current situation with the Swine Flu in Guatemala, the Rotary/HH team re-focused on the hand-washing program by presenting educational material translated in Spanish and Kackchiquel to the teachers and families of the communities of Sololá. The team also presented an educational skit to create awareness in the community about how the swine flu can be prevented in the home, the school and the community. More than 300 teachers, mothers and students from the Patanatic School were present during this performance.

<u>Stove and Latrine Installation</u>: Eleven stoves were installed in homes of families that were still cooking over an open fire in their kitchens. The smoke from the open fires directly exposed the families to a high level of carbon monoxide that consequently affected the health of the family and increased the chance of respiratory diseases. Also during this trip, the team provided latrines to twelve families, benefiting the sanitation and health of 60 children and parents.

Rotary and Heart to Heart Team Bring WASH Program to Guatemala (Cont)

Most of the water filters and stoves installations were completed in the village of Patanatic. The team was greeted with overwhelming enthusiasm by the principal, teachers, parents, and the children. After being taught by Jorge (Heart to Heart team leader and member of Indian Creek Sunset Provisional RC) how to assemble a water filter, they divided into two teams. With the help of each parent the team assembled the **family's water filter**. Then they proceeded up hill and downhill to each of their homes. It was important to let the families carry their own filter giving them more of a sense of ownership. The team and an interpreter from Heart to Heart set up the filter, filled it with water and explained its use.





The team also installed wood-burning cooking stoves in homes. The first one was delivered to a home situated on the top of a hill. The trail seemed to be straight up! The team was led up the hill by the homeowner who was

a very small 73-year old lady who was raising her granddaughters. She was the only one not out of breath at the top! The grandmother was very grateful for her stove.

On May 12, the members of the Leawood and Overland Park South Rotary Clubs joined the Guatemala Sur Club as part of their interaction between national and International clubs. DGE John Vandewalle, Jake and Debby Schloegel, and Nancy Barber shared their experiences of being a part of the implementation plan of the WASH program with the Guatemala Sur club members.

Olathe Lone Elm Park

The Olathe Rotary Club, the City of Olathe Parks Department, and Barnhart Specialty Contractors joined forces to erect a beautiful 6000 pound sculpture in Lone Elm Park at the Southeast corner of 167th and Lone Elm Road in Olathe. The project for the City of Olathe began in **2003 to commemorate Rotary's 100**th birthday and was dedicated May 2, 2009.

For several decades, starting in 1821, this site served as a campground and meeting point for travelers along the Santa Fe, Oregon and California trails. It is thought to be the only site in the United States where the three famous trails crossed. There are many enhancements and projects slated for the park in the coming months and years.





The project spanned six Olathe Rotary Presidents. Olathe Rotarian Max DaMetz was the project chair, and did a great job working with the city and everyone involved with the project. Over \$12,000 was contributed to the project from Olathe Rotary Club. There was a great turnout for the breakfast and dedication!

The original sculpture was created for Ron Barnhart of Barnhart Specialty Contractors for the exterior of the building walls that he was constructing for the Kansas Visitors Center at 119th and Strang Line Road. Mr. Barnhart commissioned Eldon Tefft, Professor emeritus of sculpture at the University of Kansas, to create the oxen and conestoga wagon sculpture. The sculpture was begun in 1994 and was set on the building at the Kansas Visitors Center in January 1995. With the closing of the visitors center in 2002, the sculpture was dismantled , awarded to the City of Olathe by the State of Kansas, and was kept in storage until designated for reconstruction. Little Apple Takes on Big Apple-Running to Save Lives in NYC Marathon



The Manhattan Konza Rotary Club is excited to announce a Little Apple/Big Apple project with The Rotary Club of New York. The 62-member Konza Rotary Club, is teaming together with this triple-sized Club from The Big Apple in a friendly New York City Marathon competition. Marathoners from both clubs will be Running to Save Lives, as they help generate donations which will benefit well-known and deserving charitable causes near and far.

Research by the Manhattan Konza Rotary Club discovered the Rotary Club of New York to be one of the few charitable organizations selected by the NYC Marathon organizers to receive guaranteed runner slots to use for charitable fundraising purposes. Envisioning a lively, spirited match-up, the Manhattan Konza Rotary Club requested and received one of those highly-sought-after runner slots and is now an official member of the Rotary Club of New York NYC Marathon Team.

Aptly described as "Running To Save Lives," all donations received by check or cash by the Manhattan Konza Rotary Club will equally benefit these well-known, worthy causes: the *Manhattan KS Konza Rotary Club Polio Plus* fund, a Rotary International program to eradicate polio in the world; *Gift of Life*, a program which saves the lives of children born with congenital heart defects; *Ronald McDonald House; RCNY Foundation* for projects such as their inner-city soup kitchen efforts; and the *Manhattan KS Konza Rotary Club* for local community projects.

A Kansan for the past seven years, Hannah is a high school art teacher at Wamego High School, Wamego, Kansas, as well as a founding member and officer of The Little Apple Road Runners Club. No stranger to New York, Ms. Merle was born in a small town outside of Buffalo, and ran the NYC Marathon last year. With many marathons under her belt, this avid 35-year-old marathoner is ecstatic to be representing the Manhattan Konza Rotary Club in this year's NYC race. Hannah is focused and training hard toward reaching her personal goal of 3 hours and 40 minutes for this year's NYC Marathon, which would also qualify her for the Boston Marathon.

"In the hopes of creating a fun and unique 'Little Apple/Big Apple' Rotary club project, it was exciting to connect with the Rotary Club of New York to find out more about their New York City Marathon involvement," Deb Rodenbaugh, President of the Manhattan Konza Club explained. "When I contacted David Del Monte, their marathon project chair and club president, to pitch the idea of a 'Little Apple' running slot on the 'Big Apple' running team, he was in total agreement in the partnership potential for the project."
