Message from RI President, John Kenny

There are many service organizations in the world today, but none so old or so successful as Rotary. There are many reasons for that, and Vocational Service is one of them. This year I wish you to place a special emphasis on Vocational Service, which is sometimes the forgotten Avenue of Service in Rotary.

High ethical standards in business and personal life are still as important today as they were in 1905. Indeed, many of the problems our world is facing today have been caused by the failure to observe such standards in business affairs.

Vocational Service, in Rotary, means that we are committed to honest business and unassailable ethics, and that we are equally committed to using our vocational skills and advantages to help others. The idea is simple enough—but it is unique to Rotary.

Many service organizations are open to anyone who wished to join. That has never been the case in Rotary. Rotarians only seek out as members those who are qualified—those who have the character, the ability, and the resolve to make a real contribution to their club.

I have long believed that the bedrock of Rotary is our commitment to ethical behavior. It has been putting what's right above what's convenient—and Service Above Self—that has made Rotary different from the rest. That is why we must always remember that whatever we do, we are each the public face of Rotary. We are each the standard-bearers of our organization. What one member does, for good or for ill, reflects on all of us.

So much of what we've achieved as a organization has come about because of the trust the world has in Rotary and in Rotarians. That trust has been a major part of our success in polio eradication—the fact that we are known in every community, and know to be people of goodwill and good hearts.

If we wish to see our organization grow and prosper, we must keep Vocational Service front and center in our minds and actions. We must seek out skilled and determined men and women of character. We must do what is right, even when it is inconvenient. And we must always, always, put Service Above Self.

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Shawnee Rotary Club Projects

On Saturday, September 26th, seventeen members of the Shawnee Rotary Club worked with the local *Rebuilding Together Shawnee* committee to clean-up, fix-up and paint-up the Shawnee Community Services Center in Shawnee, Kansas. The Center has been distributing food, clothing and household goods to the needy in the Johnson County area for more than 20 years under the direction of Shawnee Rotarian and long-time community leader Evelyn VanKemseke. Earlier





this year, the Shawnee Rotary Foundation gave the Rebuilding Together Shawnee not-for-profit group a check for \$6,000 so that the organization could rehabilitate more than 15 older homes in the Shawnee area.

The Shawnee Rotary Club conducted a very successful *Bike Safety Rodeo* at Mill Valley High School. This was their fifth year and they had more than 450 kids go through a seven-station agility test, were given and fitted with new bike helmets, and had their bikes checked by a local bike shop. All kids completing the course got a certificate attesting to their efforts. They targeted kids 3rd-grade through 6th-grade who wanted to ride their bikes to school. Sponsors helped us with this year's event and helped make it a success. We also had some great help from our Interact Club at Maranatha Academy and prospective Interact Club at Mill Valley High School.

The Leawood Rotary Club worked tirelessly in preparation of their annual dinner and auction. The event was held at the Ritz Charles. Topeka South Rotary Club New Member Red to Blue Badge

Editor Note: I had the privilege of visiting the Topeka South Rotary Club with DG Jim on his club visit. This is a young, vibrant club and DG Jim asked them to share some of their membership ideas with the District. A sample of the forms will be added to the District website on the HOME page, gold column under DISTRICT. Click on NEW MEMBER IDEAS. A "thank you" to Kip Slattery for providing this information.

When a member joins the Topeka South Rotary Club they are given a red badge. The new members are required to complete a list of items in order to turn in their Red badge and receive their permanent Blue name badge. They are given a "New Member Orientation Period Requirements" form that lists the tasks to be completed and who to contact in the club for information and assistance with the task. Each member must:

- Attend a New Member Orientation
- Participate in one service project
- Stand as a greeter for one meeting

In addition they are to complete three of the following:

- Complete one makeup at another club's regular meeting
- Attend a Topeka South Board meeting
- Volunteer for a Topeka South committee
- Present a vocational talk
- Lead the club in the opening prayer and Pledge of Allegiance
- Make a contribution to the Rotary Foundation



Each new member is assigned to one of the members of their Membership Committee who monitors the new members progress toward their blue badge and provides help if needed. In addition to their sponsor, each new member is assigned one of the club's past presidents as a mentor. The new member is provided with a form that gives them the name of their mentor along with the mentor's phone numbers and email address. The mentor is given a form with the new member information.

The club does not put a time requirement on completion of the tasks, but encourages each new member to complete the tasks as soon as they can, if possible within the first four months.

This process encourages the new member to discover the world of Rotary and accelerates their knowledge and involvement in the club.

Maranatha School Track Team Gives Away Metals and Receives a PHF

The Shawnee Rotary Club gave a Paul Harris Fellowship to Bernie Zarda, the Maranatha Track Coach, and his team for the following act of the Four Way Test—Is it the TRUTH? Is it FAIR to all concerned? Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIP? Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned? The club thought so. Here is the story . . .

The 3,200-meter relay team of senior Ali Bailey, Juniors Bethany Zarda and Mallory Keith and freshman Christa Courtney won a state title in 10 minutes, 7.38 seconds. The time shattered the old Maranatha school record of 10:16, which allowed the Eagles to accomplish their main goal at state.

Later, they gave their medals away to the team from Pittsburg-St. Mary's Colgan, which won the race but was disqualified for an exchange

zone violation. The violation occurred when a St. Mary's Colgan runner's toe crossed the line when she reached to grab the baton from a teammate who had collapsed. The Eagles decided that, regardless of the violation, the St. Mary's Colgan runners earned first place.

"They deserved it. They ran their hardest," Zarda said. "And the fact that they had someone collapse and they still beat us proves that they're faster."

Topeka South Rotary Club and Greensburg Rotary Club—'9/11 Drill for Safety'

The Topeka South Rotary club recently partnered with the Greensburg Rotary Club to participate in the Safe America Foundation's '9/11 Drill For Safety' texting exercise to teach Americans the importance of being resilient. The texting drill encouraged participants to use their cell phones to send a text message to family, friends and co-workers a pre-determined 'test message' that could then be used in the event of a future disaster or other unplanned event. During the exercise, a total of 100 Rotarians from the two clubs participated in the drill, texting nearly 500 contacts.
