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Message from John Kenny, RI President

Lord Byron wrote, "The days of our youth are the days of our glory." For me, that is the line that springs to mind whenever Rotary's youth programs are mentioned. In Rotary, September is New Generations Month—a time to focus our attention on our programs for youth and the role they play in shaping the Rotarians of tomorrow.

Our youth programs—Interact, Rotaract, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), and Rotary Youth Exchange—are some of the most

important programs of Rotary. I say this because of the unparalleled potential they have to influence young minds and souls toward peace, goodwill, and harmony. That potential is the greatest in youth because the experiences of our early years never leave us; they shape who we later become. In the words often **attributed to St. Francis Xavier, "Give me a boy until he is seven, and I will give you the man." For myself, I** would give it a bit longer than that—but there is no doubt that the experiences of our youth have a greater formative power, and a greater ability to shape character, than any we may have in our adulthood.

When a teenager from the United States has the change to travel to India to participate in a National Immunization Day, or when a student from Brazil spends a year studying in Japan, that person will be forever changed. These young people will have formed connections and affections that will endure. They will never think about their own country, or the world, in the same way again. Their perspective, their priorities, and their values will have been permanently shaped by that experience in a way that no later experiences will have the power to do. Your hard work ensures that these experiences continue to be possible—that these programs continue to be available, to be well run, and to earn the trust of the participants and their families.

The impressions of youth are strong, and they are lasting. There is never a second change at them. We may grow and change as we get older, and we are surely changed by all of our experience. But there is never another change to build who we are. That happens only once; in our youth.

The days of our youth truly are the days of our glory—but through Rotary's youth programs, those days become the glory of all of Rotary.

September is "New Generations" Month

September is New Generations Month, when Rotary celebrates its commitment to youth and young adult programs, including Interact, Rotaract, RYLA and Rotary Youth Exchange. But what are these programs?

Facts about Rotaract

- Rotaract is a service club for young professionals and students ages 18-30. Sponsored by local Rotary clubs, Rotaract clubs provide young people with opportunities to foster leadership, responsible citizenship, and promote international peace and understanding.
- Rotaract will be celebrating its 42nd anniversary in 2010.
- The first Rotaract club was chartered on March 13, 1968 in North Charlotte, North Carolina.
- India has the most Rotaract clubs in the world (1,899), followed by Brazil (643), the United States (565), the Philippines (508), and Italy (401).
- Rotaract clubs can be organized at a college or university or in a community, and they must be sponsored by at least one local Rotary club.
- Rotaract's motto is "Fellowship Through Service."
- In 1989, over 450 Rotaractors from around the world gathered in Seoul, Korea, to participate in the first Rotaract Preconvention Meeting. This annual two-day event, which takes place immediately before the RI Convention, brings together Rotaractors and interested Rotarians to discuss a wide range of Rotaract topics in interactive workshops, to listen to interesting and informative speakers, and to build lasting friendships. The next meeting will be held June 18-19, 2010 in Montreal, Quebec, Canada.

What is Interact?

Interact is Rotary International's service club for young people ages 14 to 18. Interact clubs are sponsored by individual Rotary clubs, which provide support and guidance, but they are self-governing and self-supporting. Club membership varies greatly. Clubs can be single gender or mixed, large or small. They can draw from the student body of a single school or from two or more schools in the same community.

Each year, Interact clubs complete at least two community service projects, one of which furthers international understanding and goodwill. Through these efforts, Interactors develop a network of friendships with local and overseas clubs and learn the importance of:

- Developing leadership skills and personal integrity
- Demonstrating helpfulness and respect for others
- Understanding the value of individual responsibility and hard work
- Advancing international understanding and goodwill

As one of the most significant and fastest-growing programs of Rotary service, with more than 10,700 clubs in 109 countries and geographical areas, Interact has become a worldwide phenomenon. Almost 200,000 young people are involved in Interact.

What is Youth Exchange?

A Rotary Youth Exchange student, will spend up to a year living with a few host families and attending school in a different country. Whether they participate in Rotary's long-term or short-term Youth Exchange programs, They'll learn a new way of living, a great deal about themselves, and maybe even a new language. These youths will be an ambassador, teaching people they meet about their country, culture, and ideas. The students can help bring the world closer – and make some good friends in the process. More than 8,000 young people each year have experiences like these through Rotary Youth Exchange. It's the opportunity of a lifetime.

What is RYLA?

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is an intensive training program for youth ages 14-30. Talented young people attend a seminar, camp, or workshop, generally three to ten days in length, organized by Rotarians at the local club or district level. Participants' expenses are often paid by sponsoring Rotary clubs.

The RYLA program enables young people to debate issues of professional responsibility and human relations, improve leadership and communication skills, learn about businesses and institutions, and meet Rotarians while having fun and making friends. For young adults, RYLA provides the opportunity to refine skills and explore pertinent topics with their peers and elders. For Rotarians, RYLA offers the chance to help develop leaders, share valuable expertise, and bridge the gap between generations.

Youth Exchange-How to get the ball rolling!!

School has started and this is a perfect time to get your club started in Youth Exchange. Now is the time to start identifying students who want to spend a year abroad. You can target Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors. Look for outgoing students who would enjoy the challenge and adventure of spending a year abroad. You can even look within your own club. Children of Rotarians are encouraged to apply. If you locate a potential student they will fill out a preliminary application and be interviewed by members of your club to see if they would be good Ambassadors for Rotary and the United States. After that your student will fill out the long form application and submit it to the District. This needs to be completed by December 1st. District financial aid is available. The students and their parents will then be interviewed by the District Committee on December 12th. There are many countries that we exchange with. In recent years we have had exchanges with France, Germany, Italy, Turkey, Japan, Denmark, Sweden, Poland, Romania, Switzerland, Austria, Belgium, Ecuador, Brazil, Thailand and Chile.

This upcoming Youth Exchange year will be extra special. Ray Klinginsmith will be our RI president. He is an avid supporter of Youth Exchange and has asked that our multidistrict have exchange student representation from every certified district within Rotary. He also wants to have our students active at the international conference in New Orleans. Our district will be working hard to increase our numbers and will be hosting at least two students from countries we have never hosted from before. Last year was our largest year ever and for the upcoming year we would like to top that. Please help us achieve our goal.

KU Rotaract has adopted a special needs elementary school in Lawrence, East Heights Early Childhood Development Center. The club has assisted with landscaping, meal preparations, and just about everything in between.

Early childhood programs include Early Childhood Special Services, Preschool for four year olds and Parents as Teachers (PAT). At East Heights Early Childhood Family Center there are two half-day classrooms for children with disabilities. Joining them are children enrolled as Peer Models. School district efforts to support young children with disabilities began nearly 37 years ago. Today, there are six preschool classrooms at East Heights. This program is designed to provide income-eligible families with a quality preschool program for children age four. Classrooms serve 13 to 16 children who play and learn together in an all-day program.

K-STATE ROTARACT

The KSU Rotaract is off to a great start this semester! We had a great turnout at our Welcome Back BBQ thanks to the Rotarians who attended! Our goals for this year include increasing our membership and putting emphasis on involvement with our Birthday Book Program that is in conjunction with the Manhattan Rotary Club. For the Birthday Book program, KSU Rotaract takes children books that the Manhattan Rotary Club has purchased and wraps them. We then schedule a time once a month to visit the children at Northview Elementary School in Manhattan. During this time, the children whose birthday falls within the month (or specified time period) are invited to come and receive their Birthday Book. This has been and will continue to be an excellent opportunity to share the love of reading with the young people in our society.

Tyronne Flowers, Higher M-Pact (Serves At-Risk-Youth)



Higher M-Pact engages in the lives of high-risk youth and the communities in which they live by providing positive guidance and creating mentoring relationships.

Tyronne knows these at-risk youth well, because he was one of them. No father or mother, a series of foster homes, detention centers, reform schools, diagnosed with behavior problems and learning disorders, no one had any hope for his future. Determined to make something of himself, he returned to high school and excelled on the basketball team. He was offered basketball scholarships, but was shot by a friend during an altercation, which put him into a wheel **chair for the rest of his life. While in the hospital he heard the phrase, "I can and I want to!"** That became his motto for life. He went to college, law school and now serves high-risk urban youth. Higher M-Pact programs are aimed at changing the heart, head and habits of these youth to ignite a spark and invoke the leadership skills within them.

Building Peace, One Act At A Time

Lisa Monette knew she wanted to do something for her class project that would have a lasting impact.

Monette, a Rotary World Peace Fellow at Chulalongkorn University, joined forces with three other peace fellows who were thinking along similar lines. Together, they dreamed up A Million Acts of Peace, an effort they launched online 27 August to encourage one million people to carry out one act of peace each.

"The idea sort of grew out of the thought that people can do little things that may not mean that much," Monette says. "But if you have a million people doing little things, you can have a big impact."

Monette's collaborators include Gregorio Hernandez Jr., a major in the Philippine army; Raseema Alam, a peace-building trainer and consultant from Canada; and Virender Singh Malik, a retired colonel from India. All have now completed the three -month program. In addition to the Web site (millionactsofpeace.com), the peace fellows created a page on Facebook and are heavily promoting their effort through Twitter.

Their Web site defines an act of peace as "anything you do to further your understanding of another person, place or culture." It can also include efforts that help the vulnerable, outcast, or needy. So far, Monette says the group has tallied about 150 acts of peace, counted as people e-mail them or contact them via Facebook.



"Communication really is the key to preventing conflict. And dialogue is the key to solving conflict," she adds. "If we can get people talking and working together with others, we have achieved our goal."

Monette was sponsored for the Rotary World Peace Fellowships program by the Rotary Club of Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. She took a short leave from her job as a spokesperson for the Canadian Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade, specializing in issues related to Asia and terrorism and security worldwide.

She says her grandfather was a Rotarian, and her father, aunts, and uncles participated in the Rotary Youth Exchange program. As a high school student, she took part in a one-week program sponsored by the Rotary Club of Ottawa that brings students to the Canadian capital to teach them about citizenship and develop their leadership skills.

"I fell in love with Ottawa," says Monette, who attended Carleton University to earn a degree in communications and political science.

She says she and her collaborators hope to hit their mark by the end of the year. But she admits she won't be terribly disappointed if they fall a bit short of their target: "To get so many people thinking about peace to us is the most important thing."

They are taking their message to Rotary clubs and districts to solicit as much help as possible. "We really think this has a good connection to Rotary," she says. "It fits with Rotary's values. Rotary is all about peace."
