To find a club before you depart on a trip, go to the District website and scroll to the bottom under Rotary Links. Click on International Directory and you will be on the "Club Locator" section of the Rotary International website. Just put in the area you will visit and click search. The clubs will be listed along with their addresses, day and date of meeting and a contact number for the club.

# Klinginsmith Asks Rotary Clubs to Get "Bigger, Better, and Bolder"

As the 2010 RI Convention in Montréal, Québec, Canada, drew to a close on 23 June, RI President-elect Ray Klinginsmith outlined his plans for his term, which begins 1 July. Participants also got a preview of next year's big event in New Orleans, Louisiana, USA, where the Host Organization Committee has planned fun for the whole family.

Klinginsmith will ask Rotarians to apply "cowboy logic" and make Rotary clubs "bigger, better, and bolder."

The fundamental principles of cowboy logic are taking pride in your work, talking less and saying more, doing what has to be done, and remembering that some things just aren't for sale, he explained during the closing plenary session.

"I believe the way for Rotary to remain viable and vibrant in the next century is to help our clubs to be bigger, better, and bolder," Klinginsmith said. "The clubs are the life and breath of Rotary. Therefore, it is clear to me that my job is to help the district governors to help the clubs. We can do it, and we will do it, if all of us follow the simple solution of cowboy logic."



#### **2010-11 Rotary International Theme**

After taking the stage to the tune of "California, Here I Come," RI Presidentelect Ray Klinginsmith announced the 2010-11 theme, *Building Communities* — *Bridging Continents*, during the opening plenary session of the 2010 International Assembly.

Klinginsmith said he arrived at the theme after reviewing RI themes of years past. He noticed that only a few spoke to non-Rotarians.

"As a result, I decided to search for a briefly stated theme that would fulfill two objectives: the first to explain Rotary to non-Rotarians, and the second to validate our work for Rotarians," he said. "The words I have selected to describe Rotary's current mission and to highlight our achievements are what we do best: Building Communities — Bridging Continents."


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

- North America Area Level—encompasses all of the United States, Canada, Caribbean Islands, part of Russia—approximately 8,000 clubs—only 6 Areas globally. THIS THE BIGGIE!!

Thirty clubs in District 5710 received *District Literacy Awards* for their outstanding work on literacy projects this year. Each of the clubs com-

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# District 5710 Rotary Clubs Get An "A+" in Literacy Projects in 2009-10 (Cont)

There were thirteen clubs in our district that also received *Zone Literacy Awards* for completing 10 or more literacy-related projects that met specific Rotary International criteria. These 13 clubs undertook literacy-related projects both locally and internationally that promoted literacy and educational opportunities for all. The 13 clubs receiving the Zone Literacy Awards were: *Atchison, Council Grove, Emporia, Gardner, Lawrence, Leavenworth, Louisburg, Manhattan, Manhattan Konza, Olathe, Shawnee Mission, Topeka Downtown, and Topeka North.* 

A special *Area Literacy Award was presented to the Manhattan Konza Rotary* club for their outstanding leadership at the District level. Two of Manhattan Konza's club members hand-delivered packets of school supplies to 5 schools in the San Felix/David region of Panama. The Panama

project involved co-partnering with 12 other clubs in our District, plus the David Panama Rotary Club. They installed water filtration units in schools in Panama, in addition to other locations (17 locations in all during this trip) and provided the people with sanitation and hygiene education. The Manhattan Konza club President, Deb Rodenbaugh, personally emailed 34 of her fellow Club Presidents in District 5710 asking for support and her appeal resulted in a total of 12 Clubs that participated in some way in the Panama project this year. The Manhattan Konza club also built public awareness of Rotary's efforts in Panama by talking with a local TV stations and making presentations to other organizations. Their initiative, collaborative spirit, and leadership is what earned Manhattan Konza their Area Literacy Award for 2009-2010.

The Literacy Award certificates at the District, Zone, and Area levels thank clubs for their significant support of literacy which has helped strengthen individual dignity and self-worth

of people, thereby strengthening the foundations of international good-will, understanding, and peace. Zone 27 Literacy Coordinator, Patricia Fiske said, "Congratulations on a great year in District 5710! The clubs' work for literacy is outstanding."

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# **Community Service Award Given to The Roasterie Coffee Company**

Note: The Family and Community Service Award is a certificate that Rotary clubs may confer on individuals or organizations for outstanding service to families and communities, or in recognition of the positive contributions to individual Rotary clubs made by spouses or family members of Rotarians. It is good way for clubs to celebrate Family Month in December, recognize members of the family of Rotary, and promote Rotary in the community. Certificates are available through Rotary International.

At the 2010 District Assembly Banquet, DG John Vandewalle, presented the first District Community Service Award to Danny O'Neil, founder of The Roasterie Coffee Company.

In 1978, Danny O'Neill picked his first batch of coffee beans in the mountainous, coffee-growing region around the Paos Volcano while studying abroad in Costa Rica. Right then and there, he fell in love with the country, the people and the coffee—especially the coffee.

Fifteen years later, Danny founded The Roasterie in his basement in one of Kansas City's great neighborhoods, Brookside. In 2005 The Roasterie Café was opened in Brookside. The Café has been named the "Best Coffee Shop" in Kansas City by "KC Magazine", two years running.

<u>From Danny's website, www.theroasterie.com</u>: The only thing as strong as our taste for great coffee is our passion for giving back to the communities we love. That's why we donate our product, time and resources to more than 150 local charities each year.

The **St. Drogo Foundation** was inspired by a good friend, Sister Donna Ryan. She brought up the notion of St. Drogo, the patron saint of coffee, who is now the symbol for our dedication to countries of the coffee's origin.

In addition to paying prices that are generally four times higher than what the commercial coffee companies pay, we also contribute a percentage for every pound of coffee we buy to the communities where our coffee is grown. That money goes into the St. Drogo Foundation fund where it is joined by money and "sweat equity" from origin communities. With this money, we've been able to make significant contributions to education in Brazil, Costa Rica and Columbia.

BRAZIL—We joined in bringing computers and high-speed satellite Internet service to a school in Brazil that didn't even have a

phone at the time. We also helped build a preschool for the younger children and, consequently, helped resolve the labor shortage problem in this area and provide opportunities for women to work outside the home.

COSTA RICA—We used our Brazilian experience as a model for other countries. The next project was two preschools in Costa Rica. They were already up and running, but very short on funds, supplies and resources of all kinds. We joined our friends at Deli Café and started a long-term strategic partnership with the help of the community. Once again, this was their project, their planning and their sweat equity.

COLOMBIA—Over the years, the Colombian Coffee Federation has done a terrific job of helping develop infrastructure throughout the coffee country in Colombia. So, when our coffee growers approached us and said they had good schools and health facilities, but needed a community center, we knew what to do. Plans were drawn up, and a community center is being constructed in partnership with our friends at Cafe Condor S.A.
