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

# Message from RI President Sakuji Tanaka

#### Dear fellow Rotarians,

The year 2012 is nearly gone, and we have reached the midpoint of this Rotary year. It is time to take stock of the goals we have set for ourselves, and the progress we have made toward them. Are we on track to achieve what we set out to accomplish?

I am a great believer in the importance of setting goals that are high but realistic. A worthwhile goal should be within your reach but still require you to stretch. Opening yourself to a new challenge helps you find out what you are really capable of – which may well be more than you think.



On I July, we will embark on our newest challenge as an organization: the full rollout of the Future Vision Plan, the new grant model for our Rotary Foundation. We in Rotary

have set for ourselves a simple and vital goal: to do the most good we can with all the resources we have. To do this, we will be working to reduce overhead; to improve accountability, transparency, and local control; and to focus our service more intensely in the areas where we know we can have the most impact.

"We in Rotary have set for ourselves a simple and vital goal: to do the most good we can with all the resources we have." With Future Vision, we will implement a simplified grant structure that will encourage Rotarians to serve in our six areas of focus:

- I. Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- 2. Disease prevention and treatment,
- 3. Water and sanitation
- 4. Maternal and child health
- 5. Basic education and literacy
- 6. Economic and community development.

These are areas in which Rotarians around the world have already been working for many years, and in which we have experience and a track record of project sustainability.

Sustainability will be a major focus under Future Vision, as we shift our emphasis to long-term, high-impact projects. Simply put, a sustainable project is one that will continue to benefit the world even after Rotary funding ends. The ultimate example of a sustainable project, of course, is polio eradication: When polio is gone, the good that we have done will continue forever, centuries after the last polio vaccine is given. And the lessons we have learned from PolioPlus are universal. A truly sustainable project requires an emphasis on planning and cooperation, a long-term perspective, and an approach that considers community members as partners in our service, not passive recipients.

Embracing Future Vision means embracing a more ambitious view of Rotary – one in which we work to address major issues in a serious, lasting way. It is a new way of thinking about our service, and an approach that I believe will lead to a Foundation more capable than ever of Doing Good in the World.







In response to the urging of Rotary International President Sakuji Tanaka, the Manhattan Rotary Club and the Manhattan Konza Rotary Club will be co-hosting a Rotary Peace Forum in Manhattan on Saturday, February 23, 2013. Several other Rotary clubs are co-sponsoring the Peace Forum (and by doing so will fulfill one of the requirements for the Presidential Citation for 2012-2013).

The Peace Forum will be multi-generational and will include both Rotary and non-Rotary participants from across Kansas. One important objective will be to share information and opportunities concerning present and future peace-related endeavors and to encourage new collaborative efforts. The key take-aways of the forum are: 1) to raise awareness on building a more peaceful world, 2) to provide participants with real examples on how each can contribute to a more peaceful community in their places of dwelling and community; and 3) to empower participants to reach out to the needy and the impoverished across the globe to create a better world.

We have identified six thematic areas which include keynote speakers and three rounds of concurrent sessions. Each participant will have an opportunity to attend three of the six concurrent sessions. Session presentations and discussion topics will include peace-related discourse, citizen/student exchanges, study abroad programs, peace-related service projects, peace and conflict resolution in our schools & communities, peace advocacy groups and efforts, and peacekeeping matters related to diplomatic and military service.

### Foundation Banquet Report by Bob Swan, Jr—Lawrence Central President



A special "thank you" to Bob for this wonderful article. Because of Ann Lee's visit to our District, we are partnering with Colorado's Mountain Foothills Rotary Club to participate in Crutches 4 Africa. See pages land 4 for more information.

On November 10, I was honored to attend the District 5710 Foundation Banquet in Overland Park and to meet one of PolioPlus's most inspiring leaders, Ann Lee Hussey. During her presentation, she both informed and motivated the several hundred in attendance at the District 5710 event.

Ms. Hussey related that there were 1,000 cases of new polio cases per day when Rotary International began its noble campaign in 1985. She shared the pain and helplessness caused by the disease through sharing her own experiences as a child who contacted the dreaded disease in Maine in 1955 at the age of 17 months. Ann Lee was initially paralyzed from the waist on down, and the next eight years had many surgeries and endless physical therapy, three times a week. She faced the taunting of childhood peers—a "cripple" she was called back then as she struggled to cover up and hide the braces on her legs.

Through a lifelong commitment to her health and rehabilitation, Ann Lee Hussey became a productive member of society—but her greatest contribution lay ahead. In India and other lands, seeing children crawling on all fours, she experienced her "Rotary moment" when she saw a small polio victim struggling just as she had, with great fortitude and courage—but with far less support than Ann Lee had been fortunate to receive in the United States sixty five decades earlier. She decided to dedicate her life to polio's eradication—and has now done more than 20 NIDs—National Immunization Day trips around the globe.

Rotary International's commitment and leadership inspired a worldwide campaign to eradicate polio once and for all. The CDC, World Health Organization, UNICEF and Rotary International are now full partners in the crucial home stretch of eradicating polio and are now seeing the lowest number of new polio cases in recorded history. With only several dozen new cases per year, just three countries remain that have experienced new cases of polio the past twelve months. But these are very difficult countries, with war and extreme poverty and terrorism—Nigeria, Afghanistan and Pakistan. One health worker, Mohammed Ishag, was shot and killed while immunizing children. Rotarians are on the ground in these countries doing NIDs—and in Nigeria alone there have been numerous terrorist acts during the past month. A number of other countries are still at risk—but funding is lacking to deal with these nations. So time is of the essence in this noble endeavor and our financial support is needed now more than ever.

Our worldwide cooperative campaign of polio eradication will prevail—and thousands of deaths from other diseases, such as measles and malaria, are being prevented by this model of cooperation spearheaded by Rotary. The Vitamin A supplementing by Rotary is boosting the immune systems of millions of children worldwide—and one official claims that it may have already saved the lives of three million children!

Ann Lee Hussey concluded by reminding us that, even with polio eradicated, there will be twelve to twenty million polio survivors in the world. Many will experience Post Polio Syndrome, with symptoms appearing decades later. Extreme fatigue and often pain return. Ann Lee has looked into the eyes of thousands of these children and adults across the globe and experienced their horrible suffering. They will need our help with treatment and rehabilitation for decades to come.

FDR, our president who personally was stricken by polio, once said, "Our ability to work together...will make our victory over polio endure." He could have been speaking about Rotary International—for Rotary is the only non-governmental organization that could have raised one billion dollars and organized thousands of teams to immunize hundreds of millions of people in more than 200 nations. We as Rotarians can be very proud to have been both the catalyst and the indispensable ingredient, the leading force with thousands of followers, in the eradication of polio. Now is the time for us, mindful of what we have done, to redouble our commitment to support PolioPlus as generously as we can and, once and for all, to eliminate polio from the face of the earth.

# Update on District 5710 clubs and Rotarians on the work they are doing in Guatemala after the earthquake on November 7th. From Lenexa Rotarian Jorge Coromac.

### Victims of the earthquake in Guatemala received humanitarian aid

Families affected by the earthquake of the past November 7th in Guatemala received help from Kansas City community and Woodland Public Charity Organization.



Woodland which is an NGO established in Kansas City Missouri conducted a product drive to collect donations to help the victims of the earthquake.

From November 8<sup>th</sup> our team of nurses from the "Centro Educativo y Salud Patanatic" – Patanatic Education and Health Center- based in Sololá Guatemala mobilized toward the disaster area. But that time the nurse and volunteers' team carry on medicines, food and water for the victims, commented Jorge D. Coromac Vice President of Woodland.



Thanks to the support of people of Kansas city like Marcela/Bob Gaona, Lynda Callon, Dr Joseph Spalito, Gricelda Cifuentes and family, the Mexicanita store (Metcalf/82<sup>th</sup> St.), the CAN Center, Mary/Mike Wilson, Patti and Paul Bossert, Faron Barr, Steve McCue, Robin Wolff, Wes McCoy the Spring Hill, DeSoto, Santa Fe Trail Rotary Clubs and anonymous donors was possible to collect hygiene kits, pillows and funds to purchase water filters, medicine, food and blankets for the victims.

In San Marcos Woodland has been able to support three shelters located in the Bethany Canton, the town of Palo Gordo and Las Lagunas village. The conditions of living are not ideal but is what the people can have for now while continue getting more help. Thirty-five families were assisted (around 210 people). The families are very grateful for the delivery of water filters that has the ability to eliminate 99.99% of parasites and viruses that live in polluted water.

More than 40 children received medical help. Many of them have coughs, colds, respiratory infections and infections in the skin, said Ana García nurse assistant from the CESP-Woodland who along with the pediatrician doctors of the United States Mary WilCrea (from Minnesota) and Charlene Mcinnis (from mountain) were conducting medical checkups.



Woodland will continue coordinating with the team in Guatemala as well as continue sending aid to Sololá and San Marcos. The next team of volunteers will arrive in January.

The need to provide with more water filters, blankets, food, medicine and materials to build houses are the highest priority, commented Coromac VP of Woodland. We invite the community of Kansas City and continue to support the victims of this earthquake. There are more than 20,000 families that their houses were destroyed or partially destroyed.

We know that if we unify our resources among individual donors, churches, businesses and social organizations can more effectively impact the lives of the victims of this disaster, commented Coromac.
