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DG John's Message

Greetings Eastern Kansas! Wow – we're ten months into the Rotary year already. For most of you, that's not noticeable – for your club and district leadership, it's ***very*** noticeable! We just concluded District Assembly and District Conference – if you chose not to attend, you missed a great chance to chat with other Rotarians, do some goal-setting, learn about what other clubs are doing, and you missed an amazing presentation on what it takes to climb Mount Everest by Canadian Rotarian Alan Mallory – that was a standing ovation presentation! DGE Chris Ford and his committee are already planning a spectacular event next year and you should block your calendars! I am indebted to my home club, Leavenworth, for the amazing effort they put forth to make this a fun and functional conference, as well as the City of Leavenworth and her merchants, who stood up and made it even better! Club President Ellen Bogdan, committee chair Past President DeEtte Lombard, and Master of Deconfliction Brian Voorhees did an outstanding job of herding those cats and wrestling those pigs!

We did some business, too. We approved the final financial report from last year (14-15) and approved the District budget for next year (16-17). The key piece of that is – if you weren't there, you lost your chance at input. However, we *did* receive plenty of input prior to conference, and the approved budget does ***not*** contain a dues increase for next year. It is still a forward-looking budget, that will expand on what services District provides and how we go about it, but we went with a deficit budget (to establish the demand) that will be covered from the current reserve. This gives us the chance to implement some changes and seriously fund things for a couple of years and gather data on whether or not we generate a measureable return on that investment and whether we should continue it. That will allow us to husband your dollars while still trying to improve district-level services. For those of you who followed it, it was a clumsy process, out of which came a pretty good product that I am very pleased with.

Congratulations to Lenexa, Topeka Downtown, Topeka South, and the Washburn Rotaract Clubs for qualifying for the Presidential Citation this year! Amy Ruo, Lenexa, Curtis Sneden, Topeka, Faron Barr, Topeka South, and Lauren Barr, Washburn Rotaract and their boards and clubs deserve a great round of applause because this year's citation was a set of real stretch goals that great clubs who usually earn the citation were unable to meet this year. There are still problems at the RI level with the electronic data collection process, and believe me, a lot of District Governors whacked at the Evanston piñata about that – enough so that RI President-Elect John Germ is working the issues in response to our collective feedback.

We continue to do amazing things in our communities, and we continue to do our bit for the world – at the District Conference we raised money for a Shelter Box for Ecuador (and DGE Grant Glenn of Topeka and PDG John Binder of Shawnee are still collecting pledges and donations for that) and decided to stand up a district committee under Hernan Nieto of Lawrence and President Hank Chamberlain of Kansas City, Kansas to put together a District-level consolidated response for a longer-term project to help the recovery efforts in Ecuador. More on that later. We also announced that we are contributing another \$25,000 to Polio Plus this year – yes, in addition to the \$25,000 we already sent! We are stepping up to End Polio Now!

May is Youth Service Month, and many of you are sponsoring young folks for RYLA! There is still some space left, but you'd better not wait much longer as they will fill quickly!

Rotary International was founded in 1905 in Chicago. On December 2, 1915, our Club #195 was organized in Kansas City, Kansas with 41 charter members. Over one hundred members and guests enjoyed a program celebrating the rich history of the club spanning the last one hundred years. Overbrook Rotarians Out on a Limb to Help with City Wide Cleanup

On April 16, 2016, the Overbrook Rotarians and other volunteers lent a hand to help with picking up tree limbs in the city. The tree limb pick-up is an annual event to help residents with their outdoor spring cleaning and occurs a week before the city-wide garage sales.



Lawrence Jayhawk Collects Books for BrainFood

Jayhawk Rotarians led the way in collecting **6,295 books** for the **United Way BrainFood Book Drive**. Children who receive a BrainFood book are the poorest of the poor in Douglas County. They have been deemed food insecure by their schools--the school is not sure the children have enough food in their homes to make it through the weekend --so they receive Harvester's Back Snacks once a week filled with food for the weekend.

United Way of Douglas County deduced that if the families cannot afford food, they likely are not purchasing books for their children. As books in the home are a leading indicator of school success, United Way decided to ensure all these students received a free book every week, food for their brain, hence the program name: BrainFood.

The Lawrence school partners, which collected the books, included Deerfield Elementary School, Free State High School, Lawrence High School, Liberty Memorial Central Middle School, Saint John Catholic School, Southwest Middle School, and West Middle School.

In addition, 1,037 books were donated through Michaels Craft Store, and 1,614 books were purchased with the \$3,239 Rotary District fund grant (\$2 average per book).

Jayhawk Rotarian Micki Chestnut coordinated the BrainFood Book Drive, and she was assisted by Christy Blanchard, Alyssa Brown, Brad Finkeldei, Ernesto Hodison, Craig Penzler, Sarah Randolph, Lindsey Slater, Pat Roach Smith, and Nicole VanVeltzen.

Jayhawk Rotary volunteers planned logistics and promotional materials, coordinated with the schools in setting up successful drives; then, picked up books, and sorted. The books will be distributed to 13 elementary schools in Baldwin, Eudora, and Lawrence.

As a group, Jayhawk Rotarians volunteered 75 hours. According to <u>independentsector.org</u>, each volunteer hour represents \$23.56 to our community. Congratulations to Jayhawk Rotarians for their participation!

The newly named SoJo Summerfest is also a meaningful charity fundraiser organized and produced by the Overland Park South Rotary Club, historically raising a total of more than \$1.5 million for local non-profits since its inception as the Corporate Woods Jazz Festival in 1989. Now in its 27th year, 100 percent of the net proceeds from attendees and sponsors will be donated to four local children's charities: Operation Breakthrough, Sunflower House, Growing Futures Early Education Center, Future of Hope Foundation

SoJo Summerfest will run from 5:30 to 11 p.m. on Friday, June 17 and Saturday, June 18 at Corporate Woods – Founders Park adjacent to Building 40, located at 9401 Indian Creek Pkwy., Overland Park, KS 66210.
