DG John's Message

Greetings Eastern Kansas Rotarians! Essentially just a month left for the current crop of leaders to run things before becoming "once-was has-beens"... It's been a good year, yes? A challenging one, to be sure, but it wouldn't be any fun if it was easy, right? As I get ready to head off to the RI Convention in Seoul, time for a little taking stock. Membership – we're down a bit overall, but some clubs have done very well, and other clubs who face great demographic challenges have managed to grow a bit – that's no easy thing! Others of us have had some challenges as life and work do their bit to our membership. All in all, however, we're healthy, our retention is in better shape than in years past, and the new group of PEs has some real energy going into it.

And speaking of that – the RI Council on Legislation has really stepped up and given each club an amazing amount of latitude to tune their individual club policies to match their individual needs. Click this link to a summary of the changes that will be effective on I July. Presidents-Elect and the club boards need to be looking at and talking about this – great fodder for your club assemblies! And all of you who aren't on the boards – you should read it and bring it up for discussion if your boards don't! Key thing to note – none of these changes are mandatory, they are simply authorized if you want to implement them. In many cases, this will allow clubs to change their by-laws to match what they are doing anyway, and remove a "4 Way Test" conflict, eh?

Foundation – we set an ambitious goal collectively. At this point in the year, we are at \$101 per capita giving! Thank you one and all who have given of your time, talent, and treasure to meet that milestone. Last year we finished at \$123 per capita, so if you are sitting on contributions at the club level, there is still time to make this year a high note. Atchison, Bonner Springs, Johnson County, Johnson County Sunset, Lawrence, Leavenworth, Overland Park, Overland Park South, Shawnee, and Topeka are all well past their goals, with Bonner Springs overachieving at 218%! Several of us are in the high 80's or better: Council Grove, Gardner, Manhattan, Overbrook, Valley Heights at Blue Rapids and Western Johnson County are all within easy striking distance. And many of the rest are not far behind. We have clubs like Jayhawk Breakfast who, while they are at a little over half of their *goal* are at \$136 per capita. Setting stretch goals is a *good* thing! There are several clubs who while they aren't at goal, are at better than \$200 per capita, regardless. We'll keep those to ourselves, so that no one sits on their laurels and continues to vie to be number one for the year... We can all be proud of our efforts, as I am.

RYLA is coming up soon – a big "Thank You!" to all the clubs who have sponsored young adults to attend this life-changing event, and to John Curran, in his final performance as the Chair, and incoming Chair Faron Barr, for the amazing event they have planned for them!

The time is now, PEs and Boards, to be prepping your grants for next year. Don't wait until the "I July" start date of the Rotary year to get those moving. Better planning leads to better grants, which leads to better outcomes! Don't get wrapped around the calendar, the time is NOW to get cranking on those.



Strike Our Polio with the T-Bones



After her retirement from teaching Donna has been most active. Her love of teaching continues to



this day with her involvement in school activities. She is a charter and current member of the building Site Council, organizes and facilitates the annual alumni dinner, and is a leader in the annual third grade community service project that collects funds that are then used to purchase goods for the local food pantry. She is also involved with the third grade history unit dealing with community. She brings her knowledge and pictures which entertain the children, many of whom Donna taught their parents.

Donna also is a charter member of the Edgerton Historical Society. She donated her family home to the Historical Society which was moved to its present location in 2005, located next to City Hall. The museum opened its doors in 2013 with many of the family treasures included. She is very active in the Historical Society and serves as a living reference for research.

Her involvement with the Edgerton United Methodist Church is described as a quiet but strong voice. She was a Youth Leader for the High School youth program for many years. She has also been strongly involved with the community Food Pantry which is run out of the Edgerton UMC. She was the chairperson for the Prayer Circle until recently, but is still very involved.

Emporia Rotary Teams Up with Kiwanis to Repair Local Salvation Army

When the Emporia Rotary Club decided to renovate the Salvation Army's Annex building, President-elect Harvey Foyle reached out to the Kiwanis Club, resulting in what he believes is the first joint project between the two clubs. "This is the first time anyone can remember that two clubs came together to work on one project," Foyle said.

The Rotary Club received a two-for-one match grant from the Rotary District, and asked the Kiwanis Club to lend a hand with construction. "I knew (Kiwanis Club) knew how do woodwork and I know the Rotary group knows how to paint," Foyle said. "It's nice with the two clubs, with two different skill levels, to do this one project."

The Kiwanis Club constructed a 12-by-7-foot wooden cabinet, while the Rotary Club plastered, primed and painted the 40-by-40-foot meeting room. The groups also replaced the large window at the front of the room and provided a 10 foot steel serving table for the kitchen.



"We believe that the Salvation Army money that we give should go towards the spiritual and leadership things for the people and not for brick and mortar," Foyle said. "So we took care of the brick and mortar." Lt. Lynn Lopez of the Salvation Army said the updates to the building make it seem brand new. "It's a 'night and day' difference," Lopez said. "It's been so much easier to work in it and it just looks absolutely beautiful." Lopez hopes the updates will lead community organizations to view the building as a potential meeting location as well as using the location for ministry. "I cry every time I look at it because it's just so beautiful," she said. "We can do beautiful ministry in there because it looks so good."

Lopez also mentioned that, even though a wall which had a painting of sunflowers was painted over, the Salvation Army has a plan to preserve that particular piece of history. "We took several pictures of (the sunflowers) with the people who painted them years ago," Lopez said. "We're gonna have it framed and that'll go up on the wall. The sunflowers people are missing will go back up there in a beautiful picture frame."
