The walk will take place in every major city in the World. Rotary, Rotaract, Interact and Innerwheel clubs will help raise awareness of the devastating effects of this disease as well as raising funds to vaccinate a large number of children, which only costs euro 0.50 per child to vaccinate." There's a bandwagon surely worth jumping on, and gives we Rotarians a chance to affirmatively interact with our future Rotarians, no? Polio Walk 2015 is being organized via Facebook, and I strongly encourage you to engage your Rotaract and Interact Clubs on this.

Foundation Chair Kevin Tubbesing put out a missive about the upcoming Foundation Banquet on November 14 – he needs your help to gather data about all the great things we do and have done with Foundation Grants. Which will, of course, feed into the project I gave all of you to put together just such a list for District Conference – where we will celebrate 100 Years of Rotary in Eastern Kansas. Speaking of what we do with the Foundation – the Grants Committee met, and you have all been informed of the results. There are some really great projects in there. But there were some really sad, sad, projects. Those are the ones no one submitted, leaving us with TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS of money left on the table. Next year, please do DGE Chris a favor, and give him, Jim Mattes (who will be the Foundation Chair), Greg Shondell (Grants Subcommittee chair) and the committee a *lot* of great projects to wade through when the committee meets. Which means for many of us – remembering that a wave of clubs will need to re-certify their grant writers! Yep, it's been three years, so a bunch of you are going to need to re-certify, which means those of you who *aren't* certified, can also get that taken care of – [stern governator look].

Speaking of the District Conference, I have asked AGs Geoff Neufeld and Jason Camis to look at the tech needs for us to be able to livestream the speakers. Nigeria Declared Polio-Free, Removed from Endemic List

The World Health Organization (WHO) announced on 25 September that Nigeria is now polio-free and has been officially removed from the list of countries where polio is endemic. It's been 14 months since any cases of polio caused by the wild virus have been detected there.

With Nigeria's historic achievement, polio remains endemic in only two countries: Afghanistan and Pakistan. That means transmission of the virus has never been stopped there.



Nigeria was the last country in Africa where polio was endemic. The continent celebrated its own first full year without the disease on II August. Once three years have passed without a case in WHO's entire African region, officials will certify polio eradicated there.

"Rotary congratulates Nigeria on its tremendous accomplishment in stopping polio," says RI President K.R. Ravindran. "On behalf of the entire Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we thank volunteers, health workers, and parents in communities across Nigeria for their tireless commitment to ensuring every last child is protected against this devastating disease. In the months ahead, their dedication will remain as important as ever, as we work to keep Nigeria polio-free and to eliminate polio from its final strongholds in Pakistan and Afghanistan."

Nigeria's success is the result of several sustained efforts, including domestic and international financing, the commitment of thousands of health workers, and new strategies that reached children who had not previously been immunized because of a lack of security in the country's northern states.

Funding increase needed to reach final goal

On 25 September, the Polio Oversight Board met to determine the next steps needed to eradicate polio. The group concluded that \$1.5 billion in new funding is needed to help Rotary and its partners end polio in the next few years. With Nigeria now polio-free, spending will focus on the most vulnerable children in Afghanistan and Pakistan, while continuing to shield millions of children already living in polio-free countries.

"With a fully funded program and global commitment to ending this disease, we have the opportunity to interrupt transmission of the wild poliovirus in Pakistan and Afghanistan in 2016, opening the door for certification of a global eradication in 2019," says Michael K. McGovern, chair of Rotary's International Polio-Plus Committee. "With [Rotary members'] continued support, we will soon see our dream of a polio-free world realized."

Jayhawk Rotary Trivia Night

During the 2010 Rotary Year, Jayhawk Rotarians increasingly were concerned because they were unable to support community service projects as desired. Under the leadership of President Jane Blocher and at the suggestion of Teresa Kempf, Jayhawk Rotary Trivia Night was born.



The first Trivia Night was held on October 22, 2010, during the Rotary presidential term of Bruce Roberts. Teresa Kempf served as chair of the Trivia Night Planning Committee and, through the years, has served as quizmaster for the event. In addition, Teresa recruited her mother, Kathy Mulinazzi, to create questions while her father, Tom, served as umpire and her husband, Tony, was the challenge judge.

Meanwhile the planning committee was busy preparing for the fundraising event. Publicity materials were designed and distributed. In later years, to gather more dollars during the event, a silent auction was added to the festivities. The Jayhawk Rotarians gladly provided baked items for awards, items for the auction baskets and donated funds for miscellaneous expenses. Tables were decorated, and snacks were scattered liberally on the tables.

Trivia teams "bought" tables of ten. Trivia participants selected and named their table teams. A few of the creative team names included "Periodic Table Dancers," "Titanic Swim Team," "Trivia Newton John," "50 Shades of Decay", and "Lady Cerebellum."

As the evening progressed, one dollar tickets were sold for the drawing of donated raffle prizes. The room was filled with conversations, laughter, and gentle jibes. Points were accumulated and a limit number of mulligans (free answers) were sold for those who need extra assistance for the more challenging categories. Of course, there were always the trivia masters who would NEVER resort to using FREE answers.

The five annual Jayhawk Rotary Trivia Nights have been extremely successful. The 2014 event produced approximately \$7,000 which was used to support Jayhawk Rotary projects.

Proceeds from Trivia Nights benefited the Kennedy Elementary Early Childhood Development Program, Family Promise, Willow Domestic Violence Center, Martin Luther King Day Community Breakfast, and Rotary Teacher of the Year. In addition, support is provided for scholarships for high school students, eradication of polio worldwide, water purification projects, Rotary exchange students, and Rotary Youth Leadership Academy.

Jayhawk Rotarians and their guests are looking forward to the **2015 Trivia Night** which will be on Friday evening, **October 23, 2015**. Doors open at 6:30 pm at the Alvamar Country Club in Lawrence. The first question is at 7:00 PM. The cost is \$25 per participant. Put this date on your calendar and plan to participate in this fun-packed evening!
