2018 ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP ACADEMY (RYLA)

We are getting closer to RYLA week. I have heard from several of you around District 5710 and it appears that we have a lot of interest in RYLA again this year. We have received a few applications, so far, but I am hoping that we see more in the next few weeks. Remember May 4th is the deadline to turn in the applications for the students your club wants to sponsor. Do not let your club miss out on this wonderful opportunity to sponsor a student to enjoy this unique experience.



RYLA 2018 is a five-day camp for incoming high school sophomores, juniors and seniors interested in developing leadership potential. The students will learn from business and community leaders about strengthening their leadership skills and abilities, promoting ethical behavior, and facilitating personal growth and selfawareness. There are several past participants of this program that stated their experience was life-changing and made them more aware of their capabilities. It is common to see a student become emotional when talking about their experience with RYLA. For many students, this is their first exposure to Rotary and what we, as Rotarians, can accomplish. The projects and exercises in this five-day camp are designed to get the students to think differently about certain situations and develop their own solutions with fellow students they may have not met before attending the camp. Many students worldwide, who have attended RYLA, have continued on to become members of an Interact, Rotaract, and eventually a Rotary club.

The University of Kansas in Lawrence will once again host District 5710's Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA) from June 3th - June 7th. The cost per student is \$325 (\$300 registration fee paid by the sponsoring club and \$25 application fee paid by the student). A record 85students attended last year's RYLA, engaging in a wide range of leadership development, team-building, civic engagement, and community service activities.

The annual trip to Tulsa with District 5710 Youth Exchange students for the South Central Rotary Youth Exchange (SCRYE) winter conference was well represented by District 5710. David Beck and DGE Blanche Parks from Topeka, DGN Jason Leib from Lenexa, Inbound Coordinator Sandy Burgers from Overland Park and Youth Exchange Officer Stephen Wheatley from Atchison attended along with 100 other Rotarians and 150 Exchange students from 40 different countries.

Today, more than 8,000 Rotary Youth Exchange students travel abroad each year to live and study in about 80 countries. Some of those students come to us in District 5710. Families come in all sizes and ages. As a host family you generally host for a semester and then the student goes to a second host family. While hosting you are responsible for room and board. END POLIO NOW - UPDATE

Thank you to Rotarians across the District who are continuing to support the amazing efforts of the volunteers in Nigeria, Pakistan and Afghanistan who place themselves at risk to find and deliver to every child the critical vaccines that are bringing eradication closer and closer.

There was a sad news report in early March that two polio workers were killed by gunfire near the Pakistan-Afghanistan border. While 2017 ended with only 22 wild polio cases we are sorry to say that this year there have been 6 new cases reported; all in Afghanistan. In a major response to these reports, over 70,000 polio volunteers spread out across Afghanistan for a week in late March and successfully delivered vaccines to more than 1.2 Million children.



We are "This Close", but in addition to supporting the efforts in the endemic countries, it is so important to continue to support surveillance and world-wide vaccination efforts. Stay tuned for the very latest status to be reported at the District Conference.

Thanks to the efforts of Pat O'Donnell of the Olathe Rotary Club, Rotary District **LEADERSHIP** 5710 has received a Kansas Leadership Center Transformation Grant. This Grant of \$25,000 provides 40 training seats at the Kansas Leadership Center. The Kan-

sas Leadership Center is a non-profit organization committed to building stronger, healthier more prosperous communities through the effective exercise of leadership.

The district has 25 seats remaining for these three courses offered by KLC:

Your Leadership Edge: Designed for anyone who wants to lead more and get better results. Three days of intense learning followed by virtual learning. Held monthly in Wichita and Four times in the Kansas City Area

Lead for Change: Designed for people called to lead others through tough situations. Transforming the way you engage with your community or organization. Phase 1: Four Days at the Kansas Leadership Center. Phase 2: Three Months of Coaching and Online Learning. Phase 3: Three additional days at the Kansas Learning Center

Equip to Lead: Designed for those who know the KLC framework and want to share the Ideas with others.

Tuition is provided by the grant and all other cost will be the responsibility of the participants.

INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS - HOW CAN CLUBS HELP?

On Thursday, April 26th, the **Manhattan Rotary Club** will be assembling hundreds (exact quantity unknown, as it keeps increasing as we gain more interest) of clean birth kits to be shipped to International Partner Clubs for them to distribute to rural maternal clinics/centers. Club members will be assembling the kits at their regular meeting time and place, at noon at the Holiday Inn at Campus. Any Rotarian interested in joining us in this project is welcome to attend!

So what exactly are clean birth kits? These kits ensure the World Health Organization's "6 Cleans": clean hands, clean perineum, clean delivery surface, clean cord cutting implement, clean cord tying, and clean cord care. Every minute a woman dies of complications related to pregnancy and childbirth. Ninety-nine percent of these deaths occur in developing nations. For every woman who dies in childbirth, another 30 women incur injuries and infections, which are often preventable. The Manhattan Rotary Club is looking to assist in the prevention of these deaths, injuries and infections with these clean birth kits.

The Manhattan Rotary Club currently has confirmed partner clubs in Nepal, Philippines, Nigeria, India and Uganda who are all on board to receive and distribute the kits. And there will likely be more partners added!

So how can other District 5710 Clubs partner in this effort? There are two important opportunities available:

#1 – Cash for Kits – as we identify more partner clubs the number of kits we'd like to assembly continues to increase. The kits are very reasonable in price, costing a little over \$1 per kit. Any club in the District that has an interest in partnering on this project can fund 100 clean birth kits for just \$100!

#2 – Dollars to Distribute – this may be the most substantial need for the project as the shipping costs are higher than the actual kits themselves. Any club in the District interesting in partnering on this project can fund the shipment of 100 kits (minimum) for \$300.

The Manhattan Rotary Club is committed to packaging as many kits as we can fund for this service project! If your Club has an interest in participating, we request a verbal commitment by Friday, April 20th in order to allow enough time to order supplies for the April 26th project date. Checks can be sent to the Manhattan Rotary Club, Attn: Service Project, PO Box 331, Manhattan, KS 66505. We ask that checks be sent no later than May 31st.

Over 50 women including District Governor Elect Blanche Parks enjoyed a Ladies Night event to raise money for the Heart to Heart Women's hygiene kits. The evening was planned and hosted by Overland Park lady



Rotarians, over \$600 was raised for the kits.

The event attracted both lady Rotarians from area Clubs and others who enjoyed fellowship and some shopping.

KANSAS CITY, KS & VILLAGE WEST CLUBS PARTNER ON WATER PROJECT

The Kansas City, Kansas Rotary Club along with the Village West Rotary Club partnered with Grandview Park Presbyterian Church in an effort to bring clean water to stormravaged Puerto Rico. Ten members of Grandview Park traveled to Caguas, P.R. to work with Catacumbas Church to do basic clean-up, demolition and construction in support of the devastated communities around Caguas. Two members of the team were Dr. Dee Ann Richards Behrens, member of Village West Rotary, and the Rev. Rick Behrens, member of Kansas City, Kansas Rotary.



Just prior to the trip Dr. and Rev. Behrens learned of a need for water filters in homes and community centers they would be visiting. Dr. Behrens contacted Rotary partner Jorge Coromac with Woodland Public Charity to inquire about the water filters he assembles and distributes. Jorge gave the team a crash course in assembling and operating the filters made of simply plastic pails.



As a result of this effort, ten filters were distributed to community centers and homes in Puerto Rico. Total cost of the project was \$600 with \$250 each contributed from the Village West and KCK clubs and \$100 coming from Grandview Park Presbyterian Church. Grandview Park will be continuing in partnership with the Catacumbas Church in Puerto Rico, raising money, offering support, and traveling to help whenever needed.

MANHATTAN ROTARY

President Vern shared that the club will have the opportunity to raise funds during the Bill Snyder Half Marathon race for the RI Foundation. He announced the dates of the Manhattan Rotary Club Golf Classic on May 21, 2018 and the 100th Anniversary Banquet on Monday, June 18th,, 2018. The golf tournament will support local charities and the Rotary International Foundation and the Banquet will support an International project.
