Rotary District 5770 – Making a Difference in Uganda

Have you ever desired to be involved in an international project but couldn't take the time away from your work or family, or perhaps the costs didn't fit in your budget? Here is your opportunity to take the challenge of "making a difference".

At the District Roundup this year, many of us had the opportunity to meet Ephrance Nuwamanya and her daughter, Phillipa. Ephrance, a dedicated Rotarian and past Zone Governor in Uganda, had the opportunity, while in Oklahoma, to visit and speak at a few clubs. She was visiting her daughter, Phillipa, who is currently staying with Buddy and Emilie Dugan, of Altus, while attending Western Oklahoma State College with the goal of achieving her nursing degree. The Dugans and Ephrance and her family have a 20 year friendship based upon the love of "service above self".

Ms. Nuwamanya, a registered nurse, developed and works with the Bushenyi Integrated Rural Development for maternal, newborn and child health.

Bushenyi Integrated Rural Development works with communities in the difficult to reach areas of the Greater Bushenyi region in Southwestern Uganda with an estimated population of 728,000. In this very rural and undeveloped area, women travel long distances, sometimes as many as 20 miles on foot, to seek care when they are pregnant or about to deliver their newborns. At this time, women will walk miles just to participate a minimum of three times in prenatal care and vitamins just so they can get a "mama kit". These kits are made up of a sterile plastic sheet, a sterile cutting tool, clean cloths and other articles that will help ensure a healthier birth in the case of home or "on the road" deliveries. The proposed Kiyanga Community Health Center, a 60 foot by 29 foot basic building, will provide shelter for outpatients, antenatal and maternity services. Today, many women end up giving birth in less than desirable situations due to the distance to the nearest facility. This Health Center will also provide room for child immunizations, family planning, basic medical checkups, health screenings and health education.

The proposed center will not only serve to improve the health status of the population, but will transform the lives of families in terms of health and socio-economic development.

We have the opportunity to participate in building this maternity/wellness clinic in Uganda! If we can raise a mere \$15,000, District 5770 will make a difference in the lives of thousands of people! And the best part, about \$8000 has already been raised or pledged! Altus Rotary Club, Norman Rotary Club, and the Greater Lawton Rotary club have already joined the challenge. The Norman Sooner Club and the Rotary Club of Midwest City recently gave 450 "mama kits" to make an immediate difference.

A special account has already been set up in Altus for this project. Buddy Dugan, a past District 5770 Assistant District Governor, has the information for the account.

For only \$25 per District 5770 Rotarian, we can build this clinic! That's less than a cup a coffee a day for just one month! If more than the \$15,000 is raised, it will go towards a clean water system. Come on District 5770, let's build this clinic!





John Maxwell To Be Keynote Speaker

The Lawton Rotary Club has, over the past several years, made sure that their community has access to first class leadership training. 60 Years Of Service Above Self Celebration

District 5770 Rotarian Melvin Moran was honored by the Seminole Rotary Club for "60 Years of Service Above Self" at noon Wednesday, Sept. 13. This special celebration was open to the public. The meeting was on the campus of Seminole State College, in the Utterback Ballroom of the Haney Center, Hwy 9 and Hwy 377 in Seminole.

Highly regarded for a career of philanthropic, civic and oil industry leadership, Mr. Moran was the keynote speaker. His personal story about becoming a Rotarian and the importance of service, integrity and involvement in civic life is a beacon for others, inspiring a commitment to lifelong service. A champion of service and Seminole, his contributions are evident in a vast multitude of local, state and national endeavors, as well as some international arenas. He and his wife Jasmine are particularly renowned for founding the Jasmine Moran Children's Museum, a nationally acclaimed educational attraction drawing tens of thousands of visitors to Seminole each year.

In the Seminole Rotary Club, Mr. Moran has 60 years of unbroken service. He is a past president and club Rotarian of the Year, actively participating or supporting every aspect of club service. Across the decades, Seminole Rotarian club presidents continue to rely on him to induct and draw new members into Rotary. Moreover, Melvin Moran and his wife Jasmine, led the club in establishing its annual community-wide holiday feast served

on Christmas Day, a major service project for some 40 years. The Earl Knowles Christmas Dinner provides a full hot holiday noon meal with all the trimmings to 650-700 children and adults, sit-down and home-delivery, regardless of the weather. The event is named for the late Earl Knowles, another Seminole Rotarian revered for his kindness and caring in the community.

Originally conceived as a way to provide a hot holiday meal for the hungry, the Christmas service project grew into a community-wide occasion. The project draws the homeless, disadvantaged, stranded, lonely, and bereft together with a host of volunteers joining Rotarians on Christmas Day for a festive occasion in the winter warmth of a local senior center. Additionally, each guest is provided a wrapped Christmas gift to take with them.

Many volunteers return each year, some traveling long distances, to deliver meals, de-bone turkeys, prepare salads, clear tables, make desserts, serve food, clean up and deliver meals to the homebound. Routinely, parents and grandparents bring children to assist and learn through experience the meaning of service, compassion and giving.

The club invites notes or stories to be put into a scrapbook for Mr. Moran regarding experiences with him and the community service he continues to champion.
