





How Clubs Obtain Foundation Funds for Projects




District grant applications are due no later than **September 1**st. The Grants Final project report is needed for reimbursement no later than **May 1**st. A "memorandum of understanding" is needed with a District Grant application form.

The club must disclose any potential conflicts of interest and must comply with the Conflict-of-Interest Policy for Grant Participants as outlined in section 30.040 of the Rotary Foundation Code of Policies, and the Terms and Conditions for Rotary Foundation District Grants. Both documents can be found on this District Grants page under the RI Policies tab.

Paragraph 12.E of the Terms and Conditions for Rotary Foundation District Grants states in part:

"Some people are not eligible for grants or to benefit from <u>any</u> (emphasis added) Foundation grants. They include:

- 1. Current Rotarians
- 2. Employees of clubs, districts, other Rotary entities, or Rotary International
- 3. The spouses; children or grandchildren by blood, legal adoption, or marriage without adoption; the spouses of these children or grandchildren, or parents or grandparents by blood of people listed above; and employees of agencies, organizations, or institutions that partner with Rotary International or the Foundation.
- 4. Former Rotarians and people with the familial relationships to former Rotarians described above, for three years."




The Annual Fund

The Annual Fund-SHARE system pays for much of what the Foundation does. It's the source of funding for global grants and district grants.

When you give to the Annual Fund-SHARE, the donation enters the SHARE system. In this system, donations are divided between the World Fund and District Designated Funds. After three years, your district can use the District Designated Funds to pay for club, district, or Foundation projects. The World Fund is used for grants that further the Foundation's vision worldwide.







Wild Polio (Paralyzing)

- 2022
 - o 19 cases
 - 1 in Afghanistan
 - 14 in Pakistan (after 0 cases in 17 months)
 - 4 in Mozambique
- 2021
 - o 6 cases (Pakistan, Afghanistan, Malawi)
- 2020
 - 140 cases (Pakistan, Afghanistan)
- 2019
 - 176 cases (Pakistan, Afghanistan)

Vaccine Derived Polio (Mutated, somewhat less severe, and mostly in Africa)

- 2022
 - o 187 cases
- 2021
 - o 698 cases



NEW POLIO ERADICATION STRATEGY

Goal One

Permanently eradicate the Wild Polio virus.

Goal Two

Stop Transmission of the Vaccine Derived Polio virus.




The Gates Foundation has committed to match up to \$50 million per year through 2026.

- We must keep up our vigilance, research, vaccinations, environmental sampling, and required funding.





Other District Grants Committee Members

Mike Nix-Grayson County Rotary Club



To be eligible for a District Grant in 2024-2025, clubs must:

- ➤ Have two club members attend a mandatory District conducted Training Session for Club Qualification every Rotary year. By being here today you satisfy part of this attendance requirement.
- Enter Membership Goals into Rotary Club Central.



➤ To be eligible for a District Grant in 2024-2025, clubs must:

► Enter Foundation Annual Fund and Polio Plus Fund Goals at RI's Club Central Goal Center by August 15th

Contribute to The Rotary Foundation (TRF). Per Capita contributions to the ANNUAL FUND will be used in the award of Grant funds.

➤ To be eligible for a District Grant in 2024-2025, Clubs must (continued):

>Close all previous year District Grants.

➢ Be up-to-date on RI and District Dues Club.



- To be eligible for a District Grant in 2024-2025, Clubs must (continued):
- ➤ President Elect must Attend PETS Training. By being here today you have met this requirement.
- Club must attend District Leadership Training each year.



To be eligible for a District Grant in 2024-2025, Clubs must (continued):

District Grants are matching grants. Clubs must contribute additional funds in the amount of their grant request.



District grants fund small scale, short-term activities that address needs. Clubs may support a broad range of activities with their district grant funds.



Rotary Programs: RYLA, Rotaract, Interact

Construction Projects: To improve existing facilities, only.

Scholarships-No restrictions on dollars, education level, local or international. Funds must be paid directly to the Educational Entity to comply with IRS rules.



Some examples of projects District Grants <u>cannot</u> fund:

- Local or international service projects
- For International projects, an OFAC form will be required and must be approved by RI Legal for countries identified by the State Dept. as being under economic sanctions.
- Vocational training teams



Some examples of projects District Grants cannot fund:

• Fundraisers for Rotary clubs or public relations expenses

Purchase of land or buildings (remodeling is acceptable)

Unrestricted cash donations (i.e. debit cards)



Some examples of projects District Grants <u>cannot</u> fund:

Project signage over \$500.00

Establishment of a Club foundation

Admin expenses/personnel of other non-profit organizations

Club Memorandum of Understanding (MOU):

- Mandatory to obtain Grant
- Outlines
 - Leadership Responsibilities
 - Financial Management
 - Document Retention
 - Report on Use of Grant Funds
 - Authorization & Agreement
- MOU must be renewed annually & covers both global and District Grants for the Club.

GENERAL TIMELINE:

Requests for District Grants are due by Sept. 2024 (Start your planning now for next year):

- Our District must submit a spending plan to RI for approval.
- Grant funding notification will occur BY EMAIL, once the Club completes ALL qualification requirements.
- Final Report due within 30 days of completion of Grant project, or May 1, 2025, to receive your District reimbursement.
- Final Reports not received by May 1st will not be funded.



IMPORTANT DATES FOR ROTARY YEAR 2023-2024

- Feb. 29-March 3, 2024-LONE STAR PETS
- April 12-13, 2024 District Conference
- April 27 to March 3, 2024-DISTRICT LEADERSHIP TRAINING ASSEMBLY
- May 1, 2024
- Deadline for submitting Final Report on current year grants. Final reports not received by May 1, will not be funded.



- IMPORTANT DUE DATES-Rotary Year 2024-2025
- July 1, 2024 begin submission for District Grants.
- September 1, 2024 Deadline for submission of District Grant Applications
- September 1, 2024 (apprx.)-submit spending plan to RI for approval.
- Estimated RI Funding date September 15, 2024.



Funding:

Funds available are different each year.

Currently:

- Minimum Grant Request is \$500
- Maximum Grant Request is \$3,500 or the Club's calculated Maximum Amount
- Multiple Grant Requests Ok, but total cannot exceed \$3,500,or the Club's calculated Maximum Amount.

All dollar limitations are subject to change.



GRANT FUNDS AVAILABLE

Over the next two years the amount of funds for District grants will be less than this years grant funding.

This year, 23-24, we had \$78,236 available for District Grants, but had \$83,815 in grant requests. Thirty (31) Clubs submitted 41 District Grant requests.

In 2024-2025, \$84,402 is available.



Foundation Global Grants



Global Grant Procedures –

Global grants support international activities in Rotary's areas of focus and global grant scholarships.

International Club

- - Financial Support: The International Club provides crucial financial assistance, technical expertise, and comprehensive guidance.
- - Grant Application: The International Club is responsible for completing and submitting the grant application.
- - Grant Committee: Comprises a minimum of three (3) members, including a designated first contact person.

Host Club

- Project Initiation: The Host Club initiates the project and conducts a comprehensive community assessment.
- - MOU: Signs a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the beneficiary institution(s).
- - Project Management: Manages project implementation and budget efficiently.
- - Financial Oversight: Opens a dedicated Global Grant account with at least two (2) authorized signatories and manages fund reception.
- - Global Grant Committee: Maintains a minimum of three (3) members in the Global Grant committee.
- - Reporting: Ensures accurate and timely reporting to the International Club, Districts, and Rotary International (RI).

Both Clubs

- - Qualification: Must meet the qualification criteria to participate in a global grant.
- - MOU: Develops and signs a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with designated Club Officer(s).
- - Project Planning: Collaboratively develops a comprehensive project plan and assigns a project name.
- - Committee Collaboration: Establishes project committees that actively collaborate with each other.
- Reporting: Submits project reports through the Grant Center for transparency and accountability.



Global Grant funds requested range from a minimum of \$30,000 to \$400,000.

Budget

- International Club and other sources.
- Sources can include other clubs in the district, individuals, organizations or partnering organizations.
- District Designated Fund (DDF)
- RI World Fund
- Requires funding commitment from all sources, but no payment until final approvement is receive.

Step 1: Basic information

All global grants support activities within Rotary's areas of focus.

Select the primary host and international contacts for this project.

The primary host contact lives in the country where the project, training, or study will take place. The primary international contact lives in another country. Both contacts will be responsible for all grantrelated correspondence and reporting to The Rotary Foundation.

Step 2: Committee members


The committee will include at least three members from the host sponsor and three members from the international sponsor.

Create Timeline

- Project committee meetings
- Training
- Major meetings with the benefiting community and cooperating organizations
- Follow-up on meetings, conversations, and agreements
- Schedule communications with sponsors, beneficiaries, cooperating organizations, and any other stakeholders.
- Project implementation and benchmarks
- Ongoing monitoring throughout the project
- Evaluation and reporting in the middle and at the end of the project

- Host and International Club primary contact persons
- Host and International Club Presidents
- Host and International District Rotary Foundation Chairs
- Host and International District Governors


What Happens Next?

- Receive Global Grant (GG) Number from RI
- Assignment of Regional Grants Officer from RI
- Transfer of funds to Host Club global grant account
- Funds from other sources (other clubs, individuals, organizations) deposited to the Global Grant special account
- Timely audit and reports to be filed by Host Club to the International Club, Districts and RI
