A MESSAGE FROM OUR DISTRICT GOVERNOR

August, the second month of the Rotary year, focuses on membership and new club development, putting the emphasis on recruiting new Rotarians to expand our reach and enhance our impact. Each year we resolve to march forth and enlist more energetic women and men to embrace service above self. And, since 2011, 10 of those 14 years have seen membership decline. From a high in 2012, District 5910 has lost more than 284 members. Clearly, when it comes to solving this problem, we seem to have many questions but few answers.

While approximately 38 percent of District membership reports no age, those that do report paint a portrait of an organization dominated by an older demographic. Those 70 or older make up a four-year average of 18.6 percent, with members 60-69 making up another 13.7 percent, almost one-third of the total. At the other extreme, those 39 or younger compose an average of only 6.6. While the older members have built Rotary into a thriving organization, the future clearly depends on expanding membership among energetic young volunteers.

Obviously, we need to continue to recruit members to our clubs. Programs and efforts aimed at expanding the member totals of existing clubs has not produced an expansion of total members. In fact, we have seen a continued erosion of our membership despite our best efforts. Perhaps we need to rethink our approach to solving this difficulty and make Rotary an organization that young members aspire to join.

Consider nearby communities without a Rotary Club and identify potential candidates you may know there. Then start a conversation with them about organizing a club to do good in their town.

Rotary clubs today differ from the past. No longer does Rotary require weekly attendance. Some clubs only meet every other week and have no programs. The old classification system has vanished. In fact, Rotary has adopted an array of flexible organizational structures designed to make clubs more attractive and relevant to potential members.

District Membership Committee Chair, Amy Killgore can help guide members through the various club structures available. As we unite for good, let's strive to expand Rotary.

10 ideas to maximize engagement during Membership Month from Rotary 360

- 1. Print <u>"What is Rotary?" wallet cards</u> for each member of your club and have a contest to see who can hand out the most in six months.
- 2. Share "Proud Member" graphics (<u>Rotary</u> or <u>Rotaract</u>) with your club and choose a day in August to post it on your social media channels. Remember to include information about how people can check out your club, attend a meeting, or take part in a service project.
- 3. Set aside a meeting in August to host a Thank-a-thon. Write short notes to new members, donors, businesses in your community, alumni, and anyone who has partnered with your club in the last year. It's a great way to appreciate these supporters and strengthen bonds.
- 4. Review and update your club information in My Rotary and consider using the optional "Notes" field to include relevant information about accessibility, costs, dress code, or club culture so that prospective members can find you easily and know what to expect.
- 5. Plan a meeting for members to share their personal Rotary goals for the next year. Get ideas from "Designing Your Rotary Experience"

On July 10, Spindletop Rotarians dropped off pillows benefitting the Sleep in Heavenly Peace of Beaumont program, an organization dedicated to ensuring that all children have a bed to sleep in — their motto is, "No kid sleeps on the floor in our town!" The organization reported in June that after delivering more than 760 beds to children in Southeast Texas this year alone, they had completely depleted their pillow supply, which is when Rotarians stepped in to help.

On July 29, a group of 10 Spindletop Rotarians worked at a local community resource center to sort school supplies and prepare 173 backpacks for students in need...in just one hour!

Rotarians working to eradicate all forms of Modern Slavery/Human Trafficking

It is estimated that there are 49.6 million people in forced labor, sexual exploitation, domestic servitude and forced marriages worldwide. The Rotary Action Group Against Slavery (RAGAS) works to help this vulnerable population and is committed to eradicating all forms of modern slavery and human trafficking locally and around the globe.

In the last three years, RAGAS provided \$30,000 in grants to fund projects focused on human trafficking education and prevention, including awareness campaigns and first responders training. Currently, RAGAS is partnering with World Vision and Rotary District 5180 to collect funds for the proposed Project Dignity Global Grant — Vietnam, with World Vision pledging to match what Rotarians raise, up to \$400,000.
