The program operates a system governed by the Department of State, Rotary International, and several other organizations. Districts organize and conduct the program, but individual clubs participate in two ways. First, local clubs sponsor outbound students from their community to enter the program. Second, local clubs volunteer to provide homes for an inbound student for an academic year.

Rotary clubs and districts act to reduce a significant portion of some costs of an exchange. Although students' families pay a flat fee that covers some program expenses, local club volunteers provide support by identifying host families, assisting the student school registration, monitoring student wellbeing, providing a modest allowance for the student, and arranging transportation to Rotary events. Host families provide a home including meals for the students. This support is freely provided to the student. The program is not-for-profit, making it more affordable than many other exchange programs.

Spotlight on...supporting Texans in need

Helping those who have been impacted by the devastating Hill Country floods

Our hearts go out to those suffering through the disaster that struck Kerr County and West Texas on July 4. Among those lost were John and Julia Burgess of the East Montgomery County Rotary Club – John was the Club's President-Elect. Our thoughts and prayers are with their family and Club.

Rotarians always respond by acting to ease suffering and repair damage. While volunteers were discouraged from traveling to stricken areas as increased presence could hinder search and rescue efforts, Rotary has been responding. Craig Hardy, Governor of Rotary District 5840, which includes most of the hard-hit territory is preparing to request disaster assistance from the Rotary Foundation. In the meantime, all Rotarians can donate to <u>DisasterAid (DAUSA)</u>, and specify that they would like their donation to be ear-marked for the Texas floods (as of July 15, more than \$28,000 has been raised). DAUSA is a 501(c)(3) charity primarily partnered and supported by Rotarians and Rotary Clubs. As volunteers are needed in the disaster area, DAUSA will organize to send volunteers where they are needed. When you volunteer through them, you are covered by their insurance policy. While Rotarians across the district have sent donations, the Friendswood Club also assembled 'Flood buckets' filled with essentials for the Hill Country.






The Rotary Club of Livingston's Board of Directors voted to contribute \$500 to District 5840's Disaster Relief Fund.
