ROTARY CLUB OF PALESTINE

Palestine has long realized the importance of literacy projects. Two of the signature projects are:

ACADEMIC OLYMPICS

We recruit students from eight to ten of our area high schools as well as academies and home school associations to come on a Wednesday after our Rotary meeting at 1:30

pm. The competition is usually during April at our Trinity Valley Jr. College campus where they compete by answering questions about any subject. Five students are on a team at a time competing and we have a Rotarian Moderator, Score Keeper, Timer and helper (if needed) to put on each completion between each two school groups. Each team competes against all the other schools one at a time and we determine a winner depending on how many wins each team has. If there is a tie we have them compete in a winners round so we can pick the top three teams. We give out metals, take pictures for the paper and recognize the top three teams.

The Rotarians have fun doing the competition as do the kids and the adults learn how few of the questions we can answer. We have found the best training for the Rotarians is at the Rotary meeting on the day of or the week before the competition to have a competition between Rotarians made up of groups like the current board of directors versus the committee chairs. We can use real questions or better yet Rotary questions and try to mess up every way we can to teach the club how to run the competition and handle problems that might come up during the actual competition later. We have a blast doing it and it helps jell the club members.



DICTIONARY PROJECT

Normally, an encyclopedic dictionary is given out to every third grader in the county. (This means visiting eight or more schools.) The dictionary has 4 sections. The presenter (a Palestine Rotarian) tells the class a little about Rotary – that they are a service organization, etc. He then asks the students to look up the word service. The first student to find the answer gets a small prize. Additional questions are asked using all the sections of the dictionary. The goal is to show them how to use every part of the book.

The books cost about \$2.00 each. Some years we have money to give the teacher a full set of books as well as one for each student. If we only give out the one to the student, it is up to the teacher as to whether the student leaves it at school or takes it home. In the front is a label with the club

name, four way test and a place for the child's name. Occasionally this is the first book that the child has been given to be their own.

ROTARY CLUB OF VIDOR

Vidor is involved in many literacy projects. Most people know of their Green Bus. Twice a month during the school year, they go to low-income apartment complexes to feed supper to kids and let them check out books. In the summer, they go to at least four income locations every single week, taking sack lunches, books, and often peanut butter for the family.



Besides the Green Bus program, The Vidor Rotary has established lending libraries. These are housed in local businesses, and the United Christian Care Center.

In addition, they provide a free book to each child who completes the summer reading program at the Vidor public library every year. They also give free books from the Green

Bus to children at their community-wide garages sales, held twice annually.

Last summer, Vidor Rotary hosted a month-long summer reading camp for low-income children. They took them to the public library's program every week, and the Green Bus gave them a free book a week. In addition, they made sure the kids met the library reading goals, fed them two meals a day, and made reading come to life for them. A different author was focused on each week. They even had a kangaroo visit to read to them.

Another project Vidor is starting is called R.E.A.D. (Reading Education Assistance Dogs). A dog will help with his trainer, working with reluctant readers in the elementary schools.

Candidate Qualifications

For the purpose of complying with Article 13 (13.020), of the Bylaws of Rotary International in selecting a District Governor-Nominee a district nominating committee procedure shall be used. The qualifications of candidates for District Governor-Nominee shall be as set out in Article 15 (15.070) of the Bylaws of Rotary International. A candidate shall be selected by a nominating committee procedure in accordance with Article 13 (13.010) of the Bylaws of Rotary International.

Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee shall consist of the immediate Past District Governor, who shall serve as the chairperson of the committee, plus one (1) Rotarian from each area of the district represented by an Assistant Governor. These members shall be active members of a club in the district and shall be well-informed about Rotary and Rotarians in the district. In order to help insure that they are well informed, they shall have served a full term as a club president prior to their service on the committee. Additionally, they should be active at the district level as evidenced by their attendance at three (3) of the (5) five district conferences immediately preceding their service on the committee.

Qualification Interview

The committee may request that those individuals proposed by clubs to serve as District Governor-Nominee be present at a meeting of the committee to be interviewed concerning their qualifications for the position. Current plans are for the Nominating Committee to interview qualified candidates following the District Mid-Year Meeting in Woodville on **February 6, 2016**.

East Montgomery Presents 3rd Annual Polio Program



The Rotary Club of East Montgomery County held its third annual "We're This Close to Ending Polio" presentation on Thursday, October 29, at Lone Star College Kingwood. The program opened with Professor Doris Jackson (Nursing) providing a brief overview of the disease process of polio. She was followed by Past District Governor Rose Austin, who explained about Rotary and outlined Rotary efforts to eradicate polio. She shared photographs from her own trip to India to provide polio vaccines several years ago. Professor Kelley Buzbee (Respiratory Care) talked with the audience about her experiences in caring for patients in an iron lung. The final speaker was Frank Johnson, who had polio as a child and described his memories for the group. This program is provided in partnership with Lone Star College Kingwood. Current students in healthcare programs as well as students interested in healthcare careers were invited to attend. There were about 200 people present and most of them had never seen an iron lung before. Special

thanks to PDG Hugh Summers for allowing us to borrow his iron lung again this year.

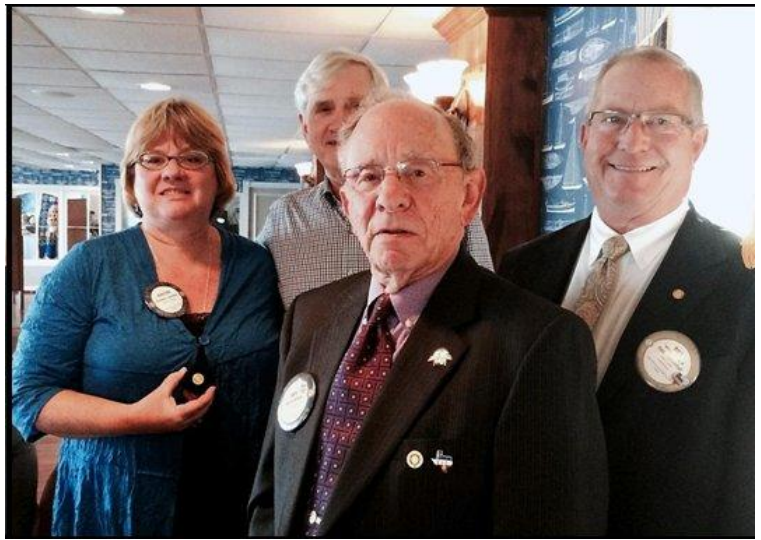
Galveston Club Has Special Paul Harris Fellow Recognition

Rotarians worldwide have a long, established tradition of supporting the Rotary International Foundation by honoring others by naming the deceased as a Paul Harris Fellow. This is certainly true within the Rotary Club of Galveston. Initiated some time ago by Gary Peters who wanted to honor a family member in memoriam - his grandfather who served as Club president in the 1930s - the tradition has continued with William Glenn, III honoring his grandfather and Neil Nathan honoring his late father with a Paul Harris Fellow. The PHF recognition acknowledges individuals who contribute, or who have contributions made in their name of \$1,000 to the The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International. This program was initiated in 1957 to show appreciation for and to encourage substantial contributions to what was then the Foundation's only program - Rotary Foundation Fellowships for Advanced Study - the precursor to Ambassadorial Scholarships.

Presentations were made at the Club's 11/18/15 meeting which featured presentations on both the RI and Club (VIT) Foundations. Dr. Glenn Jr. was also honored (as the club's eldest member) with a birthday cake.

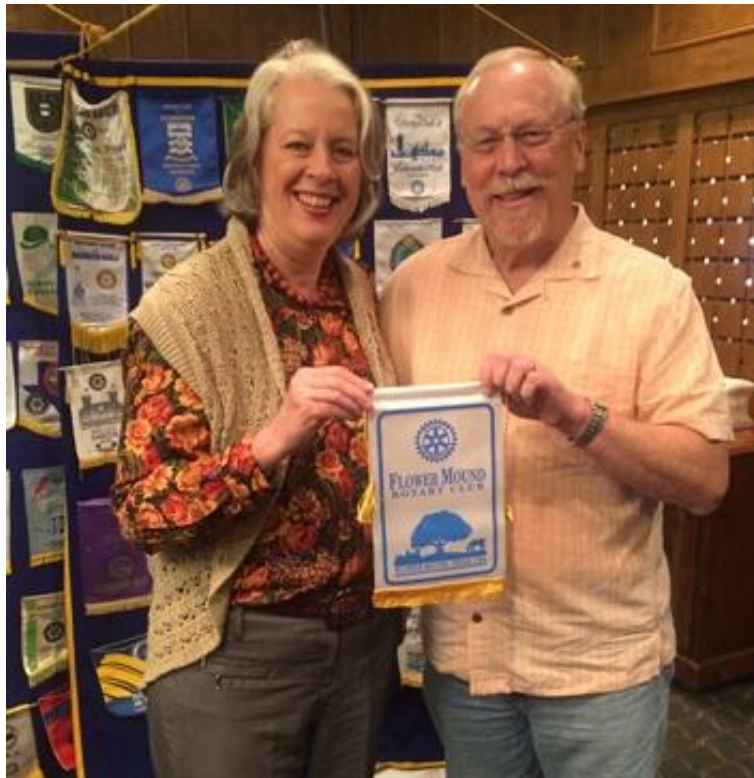

Third Graders Enjoy Dictionary Gift

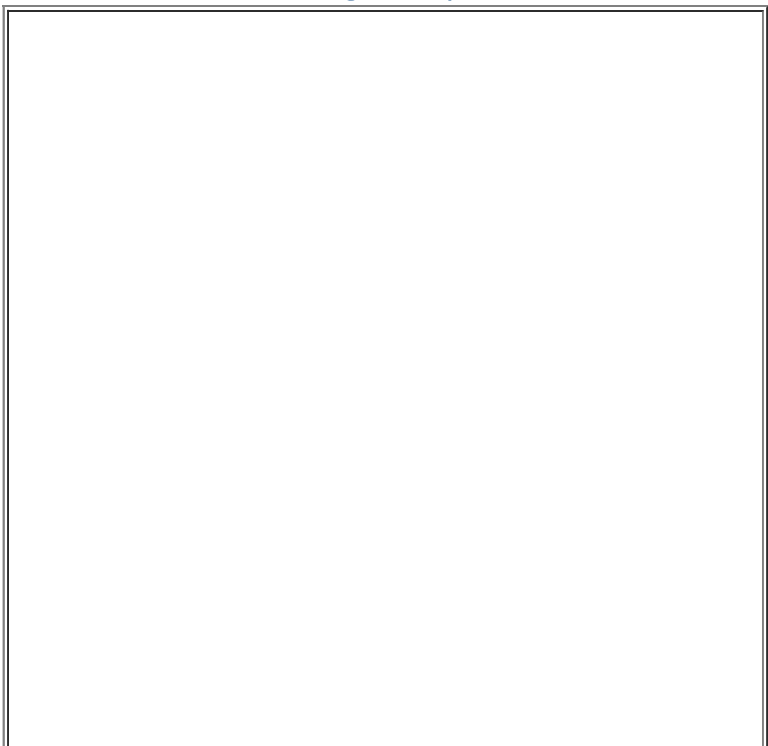

Rotaract-Interact Mixer

Interact & Rotaract Mixer is Successful

District 5910 hosted its first Interact/Rotaract mixer last Spring with about eighty youth and adults gathering at Vidor High School. There were Interacts there from Vidor, Orangefield, Westbrook, and Monsignor Kelly High School, as well as the newly-formed Bob Hope School (Port Arthur) group. Three Rotaracts, Lamar University, Beaumont Community, and Lone Star College, were on hand to encourage the youth to join a Rotaract. It worked.

Several nights ago at a Fall mixer held in Beaumont at Westbrook High School, students who graduated from Vidor High last year were asked if they'd like to join the brand new Vidor Community Rotaract. "We can't right now," they said, "because we've already joined Rotaract at Lamar University. But when we graduate, we will join the community group!" That's what this is all about....this bridge-building exercise to grow Rotary starting from the ground up.

The brainchild of District 5910 Interact chair Sally Andrews, the mixers held in Southeast Texas so far have been smashing successes. "I'm encouraging others around our District to host mixers," says Andrews. "I think once they have one or two, they're going to begin seeing the benefits."

At the first mixer last March, the students got to experience an iron lung, learn about polio, and of course, hear about Rotaract and Rotary. They also participated in a true 'mixer.' They were placed in groups of three Interactors and one Rotaractor. While grouped, they assembled candy rolls to take to local children in foster homes or protective custody.

Every five minutes a bell was rung, and they were instructed to move to a table where they could meet all new people. "Honestly, they probably loved meeting Interactors from other schools as much as anything," said Andrews. "We had a really hard time getting them to leave!"

At the November 19 mixer, a speaker from the local Rape and Suicide Crisis Center talked briefly about children and youth who are engaged in human trafficking and prostitution locally, followed by the founder of Harvest House, a safe house in Beaumont which rescues mostly young ladies ages 10-17 from human trafficking situations. The crowd of about 120 Interactors, Rotaractors, and Rotarians was a quiet one as the topic was discussed. They each wrote messages encouraging the young ladies to stay strong and not give up hope, then they packed toiletry bags for each girl rescued from trafficking. Each bag included a snack, some candy, deodorant, soap, bath gel, facial scrub, lotion, mouthwash, a toothbrush and toothpaste, and shampoo and conditioner.
