DISTRICT GRANTS: REVISED METHODOLOGY

District Grant Opportunities, as of September 10:

- 1. District Grants are available to Clubs who have completed the necessary grants training and have a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in file with the District.
- 2. The maximum match from the District is \$3,000 with a minimum of \$1,000, equal to the Club's contribution.
- 3. Clubs which applied for district grants by June 1 received grants totaling approximately \$53,000 in August.
- 4. Final reports are due by May 1, 2018.
- 5. Rotary International has recognized the devastation and destruction caused by Hurricane Harvey. We have the opportunity to revise our district grant applications. If your club's circumstances have changed and you wish to reallocate funds to a different project, or request additional funds, Rotary has given us the latitude to revise our District Grant for the 2017-2018 year. We need to know right away if you would like to make any changes. We have an additional \$10,000 (approximately) in funds which may be used for district grant projects related to Hurricane relief.
- 6. The time frame is compressed and the projects must be completed and the final report filed by May 1, 2018.
- 7. Grant applications need to be submitted to Dave Johnson and Walter Hinkle **ASAP**.

CLUB NEWS: Cleveland

Rotarian Kelly Jenkel-Axton, a member of the Cleveland Independent School District Board, introduced the Cleveland Rotary Club lunch speakers – Richard Crump and Will Clayton of the Claycomb Associates Architects of Houston who shared an update on the plans for the Cleveland ISD construction. A thorough slide presentation reviewed changes to Eastside Elementary, Cleveland Middle, and Cleveland High schools. There will also be a new district service center that will house maintenance, transportation, food service, and other District wide departments. There is also a proposed layout of a new elementary school whose location has not been decided. Emphasis on design and construction is centered on what is best for the students – maximum capacity, increased food service areas, and larger commons areas for all students to use. Everyone should be proud of the CISD schools and the attention being given to judicious use of the bond election funding.

Rotary International has long fought for the eradication of polio. In recognition of this determined effort, members of the Cleveland Rotary Club highlighted World Polio Day with a an informative and inspiring presentation from a polio survivor. Lady Elizabeth Dalton, sister of Rotarian Ernestine Belt, gave a fascinating account of her journey with bulbo-spinal polio, which she contracted in the seventh grade, and affects primarily her neck and throat area to this day. She was hospitalized at the time, experienced the need to relearn to walk, and trainer her unaffected muscles to take up the slack for her weakened muscles. Cleveland Rotary raised over \$600 that is matched 2 to 1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation -successfully limiting polio to less than 10 cases reported worldwide this year.

On World Polio Day, October 24, 2017, President Scott Lambert, Foundation Chair Ernestine Belt, Secretary Tommie Daniel and Charlie Rice of the Rotary Club of Cleveland were on radio station KORG 95.3FM sharing polio awareness and the End Polio NOW campaign by Rotary International. We are "this close" to eradicating polio throughout the world. During the day, the Rotary Club of Cleveland collected donations totaling \$635; matched by Bill and Melinda Gates, the \$635 becomes \$1905 and that equals 1905 doses of the polio vaccine available.




The partnership of CHRISTUS Foundation for HealthCare and Rotary Club of League City share many of the same core values including improving the health of the communities that they serve.


CLUB NEWS: Lufkin
