On Friday January 25, 2019, the 9 Inbound Exchange Students of our District and 6 Rotarians, including DG John Hathaway and DGE Betsy Robinson, flew to Tulsa, Oklahoma, to attend the annual South Central Rotary Youth Exchange (SCRYE) winter meeting (PDG Doris and Wally Lockey flew to Tulsa already the day before). Some of us had to get up as early as 4:30 a.m. to be in time at the airport. But we all made it and everything went much more smoothly at the airport than we expected (because of the Government and TSA shutdown). To the joy of our Brazilian and Thailand students, Tulsa greeted us with a light drizzle of snow, something they had never seen before in their lives.

Our students enjoyed a fun-filled weekend together with over 200 other Rotary Exchange Students from over 30 different countries world-wide. For the first night, students were home-hosted in groups of 2-4, whereas the second night, after the banquet, all 200+ students were "locked-in" together in a one room. Needless to say, they had a lot of fun talking, singing and dancing all night.

The Rotarians in the meantime attended business meetings to learn about the latest changes of the rules and regulations of the Youth Exchange Program, e.g., the new "General Data Protection Regulations" that now have to follow the standards of the European Union. Of course, they also received helpful information that hopefully will make our youth exchange program even better than it already is.



At the end of the banquet, it was a moving moment when a choir of youth exchange students honored PDG Glen Mattingly (Huntsville) and Zam Zarro (from the Houston District) with the Rotary song "We are One"; because of their health they, and our YEO Carol Mattingly, were unable to attend. For Glen and Carol it was the first time in over 30 (?) years that they could not come to the SCRYE meeting; no wonder that they were sadly missed. As every year, the banquet finished with everyone singing "Let there be Peace on Earth".

If each District 5910 Rotarian will just dig


a little deeper, say \$10 dollars, we will make it.



The RYLArians all had bunches of fun! On different teams, they built a car out of cardboard. Some got the car across by carrying parts across the finish line because theirs had fallen apart. One student from Cleveland was on a team that built a car that stayed together and crossed the finish line.

These 14 students representing the Rotary Club of Cleveland at RYLA ended the program by saying, "It was a fantastic weekend. Thank you, Rotary Club of Cleveland, for selecting us to go to RYLA."


