




CLUB NEWS: Angelina





At a recent meeting of the Rotary Club of Huntsville, Texas, members did something a little different – they learned self-defense techniques used in the martial art of Hapkido.



Rotarian and past-President, Marcus Gillespie, is a 6th Dan black belt in Hapkido and has an academy at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville. During the meeting he explained that Hapkido means "The Way of Coordinated Power" and is based on the same punching and kicking techniques used in Tae Kwon Do, but combines them with the joint locks and throws used in Jujitsu. Like all martial arts, it emphasizes the same values embedded in the 4-Way test, especially courtesy and respect. Given that this was the first time for most members to learn self-defense, and that we didn't want anyone getting thrown and taken down to the un-matted floor, they focused on

escaping from wrist grabs and choke holds. As everyone experienced, it's very easy to escape from both of these if you know what to do!



Marcus and his wife, Nisa, and daughter, Asia (also students of Hapkido), also demonstrated some techniques to defend against knife and gun attacks as well.



Everyone seemed to have a good time, no one was hurt, and they all came away with a little more knowledge about how to defend themselves.
