VIDOR INTERACT



BEAUMONT PLANS CENTENNIAL PROJECT

A new playground in downtown Beaumont could start taking shape this October if the Beaumont Rotary Club can raise enough money to build it, club president Becky Mason said. Club members envision a "barrier-free" playground to ensure that all children, regardless of physical ability, have an opportunity to play there, Mason said. It would be built next to what will become the Beaumont Children's Museum at Crockett and Neches streets, on museum property leased from the city. The location is on the east side of the city's new Event Centre between Neches Street and the lake, accessible from the west by Martin Luther King Jr. Parkway and about a block from the Henry Dannenbaum Bus Transfer Station. In all, the value of the playground would be about \$325,000.Rotary wanted a project to celebrate its 100th year the club's Beaumont chapter was founded in 1913 - and sifted through about 25 proposals, Mason said.

Paul Harris asked Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, to address the convention after Collins told him that the Minneapolis club had adopted Service, Not Self, as its guiding principle.
