# WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICES/GRANTS

The World Community Service committee has continued to meet on a regular basis during this rotary year. We have been evaluating possible projects, projects that have been submitted, and those that are ongoing from previous years. There have been setbacks because of heightened security in recipient countries, but the committee is optimistic that we will be able continue our efforts in the different parts of the world where we have dependable contacts.

The responsibilities for grant application and development have been divided into three geographic areas. We have done this so one person does not become overwhelmed with the job at hand. Dan Foley is working with grants in India and S.E. Asia, Jim Peterson is working with Central America, Mexico and South America, and Denny Skinner is working with Africa and China. Each geographic region has been allocated matching money to work with on grants for the 03-04 Rotary Year.

At this time we are continuing to look for projects that can be submitted in each region. An example of a project that can be funded, is assisting with the Xicotepec Mexico effort to supply materials for the

renovation of their Elementary and Middle Schools, whether it be desks, library books, computers or the many other things that go into furnishing a school. If that is not what your club is interested in doing, other possibilities, would be drilling a well to provide safe water to a village in India, or providing teaching materials to teachers in Uganda, or helping orphan and homeless children in Columbia.

If your club is already involved with a project, congratulations on a job well done. If your club is not currently working on a project, contact one of our area representatives to see what is available and encourage your club to sponsor a project this year. It is not too late. Sponsoring a project will expand your involvement in Rotary and develop contacts with other Rotary Clubs around the world.

### **Rotaplast Becomes Iowa MOST (Iowa Miles of Smiles Team)**

In April and May of 2003, several District 6000 Rotarians and medical volunteers journeyed to El Salvador to work with a Rotaplast team to perform cleft lip and cleft palate surgery for children of families with little means. District 6000 not only comprised the majority of the team members, it also funded the mission with donations from clubs and individual lowa Rotarians.

Convinced that there is expertise and enthusiasm to repeat the 2003 experience with District 6000 personnel and volunteers, the D6000 Rotaplast Committee began to consider such a mission entirely organized, staffed and funded by our district. To that end, the committee has developed a strategic plan with the objective of making three cleft lip and cleft palate surgical missions in the next five years to the same location in a Central American country. The plan will employ four strategies. They are:

- 1. Identify and develop a relationship with Rotary Club(s) in a Central American country.
- 2. Identify and develop a relationship with medical counterparts in the host country.
- 3. Identify equipment and medical supplies needs. Find sources for the equipment and medical supplies and means to transport to host country.
- 4. Develop fund raising plans to meet needs for three visits in the next five years.

To accomplish their goal, committee members have a large task, but they are committed to providing this desperately needed humanitarian service to people who would have to live a life of pain without the help we can offer. Thus, Iowa MOST (Iowa Miles of Smiles Team) identifies our new entity, our new humanitarian venture, another component of our generous and vigorous Rotary district.

# District 6000 News... Retary Volunteers

#### BECOME A ROTARY VOLUNTEER--TOUCH THE LIVES OF OTHERS

Would you like to tutor young students in the Philippines, work with elderly people in New Zealand, help with health care in Chile or India; practice your profession in Korea? There are hundreds of opportunities to be of service through the Rotary Volunteer Program.

The Rotary Volunteers are a group of people just like you who volunteer their time and talent somewhere in the world to make a difference. The main focus of written material from Rotary international is on international volunteering, but the need for and value of service in one's own community are equally vital. Goals of the Rotary Volunteers program are to: 1) foster understanding, fellowship and goodwill; 2) raise living standards and reduce economic disparities worldwide through education, health care, agricultural productivity, appropriate technology, sanitation, provision of potable water, and expansion of commerce.

How can you become a Rotary Volunteer?

1. Register with Rotary International on a specified form available on the internet or from our District 6000 Administrator in Knoxville. Registration is open to Rotarians, Rotaractors, spouses who accompany Rotarians, and even non-Rotarians. Once you are registered your names and skills are published in a Rotary Volunteers listing for a period of two years.

2. Find a Site. Study the Rotary Volunteers International Site List (from the website) which publicizes club-sponsored projects where volunteers are needed. You then make a direct contact to

investigate possible linkages. 3. **Secure funding.** Rotary Volunteers is not a funding program. Some volunteers find funded through their club or from assistance from the Rotary Foundation. There are some grants available for those who can do longer service. 4. **Make and Finalize Arrangements.** Plan 4-6 months before the trip; do your homework on the culture, and get ready for the experience of a lifetime.

People of all ages go on these volunteer programs. Many newly retired persons find time to offer their skills. And many people find the experience so rewarding they repeat it again and again.

Last fall I had the opportunity to join a medical team to Ethiopia for 1 1/2 weeks. This was a group of eye surgeons, and other eye professionals, and some people like me who are not in that field but can provide support and logistic work for the team and for the locals. Only two of us were from lowathe other was Mark Warchol from Davenport: others were from Rotary clubs in Pennsylvania, Denmark and Florida. The entire trip was organized by two dedicated professionals who knew they could make a difference. Over 600 Ethiopians had vision screening and over 100 had cataract surgery. Talk about life changing events! The volunteers contribute their greatest resource, their time and skills. In return they receive the immeasurable happiness of improving the lives of others. Consider it as an enriching possibility.
