Present a vocational award to someone in the community who has exemplified outstanding professional achievement while maintaining high ethical standards.

Encourage your RYLA students to participate in the essay contest. The award is a \$1,000.00, \$750.00, and \$500.00 scholarship.

Encourage your members to become a Rotary Volunteer by going to the RI website (www.ri.org) and download the Rotary Volunteer application and send it to me. Also have them look through the list of volunteer site locations where their talents can be used.

Larry Nash: District Vocational Service, Chair

When a tailor, a coal dealer, a mining engineer, and a lawyer meet in Chicago in Feb. 1905, they had no thought of International or Community service, only Vocational. They wanted to gain a better understanding of each other's vocation. As their membership grew they set up a classification system, based on vocations. It was 1907 before they had their first community service project [comfort stations in the city hall]. The second object of Rotary, after the development of acquaintances, is high ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations;

and the dignifying by each Rotarian of his occupation as an opportunity to serve society. Vocational Service is sometimes referred to as the forgotten avenue. Yet each week as we meet and discuss some business matter while eating our meal, we are involved in vocations. A classification talk by a new member is vocational. Our best programs are when a member talks about his or her business or profession. Thus- back to the original purpose of Rotary. A club that participates in its school system's Student Career Days program and does one on one mentoring with students who have a special interest in a specific field is doing Vocational Service. If your club is not doing this, then get with it!!

International & Vocational service project in District 6000!

Dear Rotarians,

Greetings from San Francisco, CA! My name is Christina Weber and I am a recent Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar sponsored by District 6000. During my scholarship, I received a Masters in International Affairs from The Australian National University in Canberra and was hosted by the Rotary Club of Woden Daybreak in District 9710 of Australia. After completing my studies, I was fortunate enough to spend time volunteering on-site a Rotary project in northern rural Thailand. My experience as a Rotary Scholar forever changed my perspective on 'service above self' and upon my return to the United States I sought an opportunity to continue my association with Rotary.

I am happy to announce that I have joined the **Center for Citizen Initiatives (CCI)**, a nonprofit organization based in San Francisco, CA. Here at CCI, I serve as a community outreach officer for the **Productivity Enhancement Program (PEP)**. PEP is a service project for Rotary that brings groups of Russian entrepreneurs to communities in the U.S. for business training, cultural exchange and an introduction to civic values.

I am pleased to know that Rotary districts in Iowa have been supportive of this project. Rotary Clubs across the state have helped to host 7 groups from Russia, including 11 clubs in District 6000! In the coming year, the U.S. State Department has asked CCI to bring an unprecedented number of Russians and I am <u>asking</u> Rotary clubs in District 6000 to help!

Through PEP, 11 Russian owners or managers of private companies spend 24 days in the U.S. learning about free market business practices and democratic principles, all while exchanging information about their culture with their adoptive communities. To date, **PEP has worked with over 430 Rotary clubs** across the U.S. to educate more than 3,500 Russian entrepreneurs. PEP alumni have returned to Russia to start **over 25 Rotary clubs** and

hundreds of others have joined existing clubs. This project is instrumental in **expanding Rotary in Russia**!

Many past governors, future governors and their partners and I participated in the 2003 Zone Institute held in South Bend, Indiana on October 9-12th. It was a time to meet old friends and make new ones, as well as learn about new initiatives that will be implemented in the 2004-2005 Rotary year. It was also to celebrate our outstanding accomplishments that the districts in Zones 27 and 28 made towards surpassing the \$80million Polio Eradication Campaign Goal. Keynote address from Sonny Brown, Foundation Trustee, music from the Michiana Male Chorus, and fireworks made the evening very special. Saturday was devoted to the Foundation and its programs and the new "EVERY ROTARIAN EVERY YEAR PROGRAM". This is a grass roots initiative, similar to the Polio Eradication Campaign. It is important for all club Presidents to begin talking with the President-Elects about the Foundation goal for the club in 2004-2005.

The Permanent Fund? What is it? This is the response I have been receiving from Rotarians across District 6000. All members seem to be familiar with the Annual Programs Fund as it is the one Governor Skinner mentions in his club presentations. The Permanent Fund is the other fund that comprises the Rotary Foundation along with the Annual Fund.

The Permanent Fund was established in 1982 as part of the Rotary Foundation to ensure a strong future for the Rotary Foundation by providing an extra stream of income to meet the increasing expenses of the Foundation's programs and to expand its ability to meet urgent human needs around the world. This endowed fund is invested in perpetuity and builds long-term stability for the Foundation's future. Targets of US\$500 million by 2005 and US\$1 billion by 2025 have been established. As of 6-30-03 the Fund had investments of US\$97.1 million and expectations of US\$243.4 million for a total of US\$340.5 million.

The Trustees of The Rotary Foundation are responsible for the general direct and control of the Foundation's investments. The Foundation invests Permanent Fund assets in such a manner to insure that the organization provides adequate funding for today's programs while sufficiently growing the portfolio to support the Foundation's programs in the future.

Among the programs supported by a portion of the earned income from the Fund are PolioPlus, Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarships, the Rotary Centers for International Studies in Peace and Conflict Resolution, Group Study Exchange (GSE), Matching Grants for International Humanitarian Projects, and Health, Hunger and Humanitarian (3-H) Grants. The Permanent Fund also supplements the Annual Programs Fund in other ways.

There are many ways of contributing to The Permanent Fund. The Foundation accepts gifts of cash, securities, real estate, life insurance, IRAs, and tangible personal property. There are also a variety of ways to transfer those assets: through an outright gift, a pledge, a bequest, a life income agreement, or a donor advised fund. at two events: the across lowa "Ragbrai" bicycle ride in which the riders and support personnel spent one night in Bedford (about 20 miles from Lenox); and the Lenox Rodeo, one of the primary events during the year for the Lenox community. The Club members made the ice cream with a freezer powered by an antique John Deere tractor. Some of the ice cream was frozen at the events so the people could see the actual freezing process, which in itself drew many persons to the Rotary sales sites. A total of 175 gallons of ice cream was sold at the two events. Funds raised from the ice cream sales will be used for Rotary service projects.

Our next project is the re-roofing of a shelter at the Lenox town park. The shelter was a project of the Lenox Rotary Club some years ago and now the roof needs to be replaced. The re-roofing is to be done early in October.

Also in October (19) is the annual Rotary Beef Barbecue, a fund-raising activity held in the high school and to which persons from the community and surrounding area attend. The Barbecue has become a very popular event, as persons share in fellowship in the high school and enjoy an excellent meal,

prepared and served entirely by the members of the Rotary Club. Tickets may be purchased either prior to the event or at the door, and the meals are taken out to any persons who are not able to come to the high school.

On the evening of November 4, the Lenox Rotary Club will sponsor a meal and program for the residents of "Taylor Ridge Estates," a home in Lenox for persons who are in need of assistance beyond an "assisted living" apartment situation, but lesser assistance than is provided in a "Care" facility. This is an event very much looked forward to by both the Rotarians and the 36 residents in the home.

Earlier this year (RY 2002-2003), the Club partnered with the Rotary Club of Limasawa-Maasin in the Philippines in a de-worming project for early-elementary students from economically depressed families. Although funds were sent to the Philippine Rotary Club during RY 2002-03, the project was carried out, in the Philippines, over a six-month period, which covered parts of both the past and present Rotary years.

These and other projects, such as support to a number of youth activities, keep the Rotarians actively involved in service and enjoying sharing in work, programs and fellowship.

The Indianola Rotary Club always has a busy summer schedule. First is the Balloon



Parking, our major fundraiser. August 1-9 members gave of their time to sell tickets and park cars at the National Balloon Classic. It was estimated that over 50,000 people attended this year's event and we were able to sell the tickets and direct the traffic to all who came to see over 80 balloons fly the friendly skies of south central lowa.

Next came our annual Book Sale. September 5, 6 & 7, the Indianola Rotary Club sponsored a used book sale in the Community Building of City Hall. The event was expanded this year from one day to three days to accommodate the huge interest in used books. In past years, we offered books for sale on a Saturday, in conjunction with Ridiculous Days on the town square. This year, we offered books for sale on the same weekend, but we charged admission on Friday evening, let all in free on Saturday and ended with a half price sale on Sunday afternoon. Books were sold at a price of \$1.00 for hardcover and \$0.50 for paperback. If you like to read, this is a must attend event.

The community supports the book sale by delivering used books to the Indianola Library throughout the year. The entire club is involved on the night the books are moved from storage to the sale location. They help by setting up tables, unpacking the books and finally selling all the books any one person is willing to carry out of the door.

We expanded the sale from one day to three days this year to give people additional time to search through the truckloads of books. Funds raised from the event will be shared, with the Indianola Library receiving the majority of the funds and a soon to be named Children's Literacy program.

Our new exchange student has arrived from France and is adjusting very well to life in the U.S.A. We welcome Melanie and look forward to learning more about her, her family and her country.

Our Club's Centennial project is to construct a shelter at a new park the City of Indianola is planning for the trailhead of the McVay-Sommerset Recreational Trails. Total cost of the shelter is estimated at \$10,000 and will be funded, partly with funds raised from parking and partly with funds donated by the late Earl Godwin, long-time Rotary member.

Indianola Rotarians use the change from their pockets each week to support projects for children. Our first project was the District's support to feed children in Argentina. Our latest effort has been to purchase a defibrillator for Camp Wesley Woods. Change and funds raised selling tickets for a noon meal at The Harvest Restaurant and a grant from District 6000 provided the funds to purchase the defibrillator for the camp.
