**Zambia, Africa Domestic Violence Rehabilitation Center Project**

**Borehole, Tower, and Tanks**

**Objective: Develop a Domestic Violence Rehabilitation Center at the Orphan Medical Network International School at the George Compound in Ndola, Zambia**

As a physician with a license to practice medicine in Zambia and as Orphan Medical Network International Medical (OMNI), Medical Team Director, I have seen many cases of domestic violence. As a medical team, we have come to know that there are no refuges for domestic-violence victims in Zambia. When we see evidence of domestic violence and especially when we see severe cases of domestic violence, we encourage the women victims to initiate a police report and leave their perpetrator. In Zambia, and especially in the outlying villages that we visit, many of the women are poorly educated. Lack of education makes them highly dependent upon the perpetrator. This in turn makes the victims less likely to initiate a police report. Once a report is initiated the victim is relatively safe because the perpetrator is jailed and not likely to be released for years. The victim is then left with the duty to support her family. When the women have no education or vocation, they often elect to endure the violence.

I have been associated with OMNI for the past 18 years. We have been going to Zambia, Africa with a medical team of doctors, nurses and support persons once or twice a year. The team goes from village to village seeing all who come to us for whatever their medical need is. Those that we can treat there in the village, we treat. Some require hospitalization, and we transport them to the hospital and pay for their admission. Some need only food which we supply as best we can. Others need clothing, blankets,

mosquito netting, transportation to distant specialty hospitals and some need just prayer. We supply all we can.

OMNI established a school for children, grades 1 to 7 (Zambian elementary school grades) in the George Compound of Ndola, Zambia in 2007. The school has been highly successful, and the OMNI George School was one of 15 schools invited (out of 77) by the Ministry of Education to participate in accomplishing Goal 2 of the Millennium Development Goals set by the UN, which focuses on achieving Universal Primary Education by 2015. That year OMNI George School added evening classes for the women of the community. Many of the adults in the George Community now realize the importance of education and, apart from obtaining more employment opportunities, they would like to be able to read what is in their newspapers and make more informed decisions in their community. The major topics recommended by the Ministry of Education in addition to reading, writing and arithmetic include Civic Education, Health Education, Environmental Education and Governance. The Ministry of Education has developed teaching materials to be used in these classes.

This year OMNI was asked by the Minister of Education to add grades 8 and 9 (Zambian middle school). There are now 277 children attending the school. In 2015 OMNI began offering evening classes for the women of George.

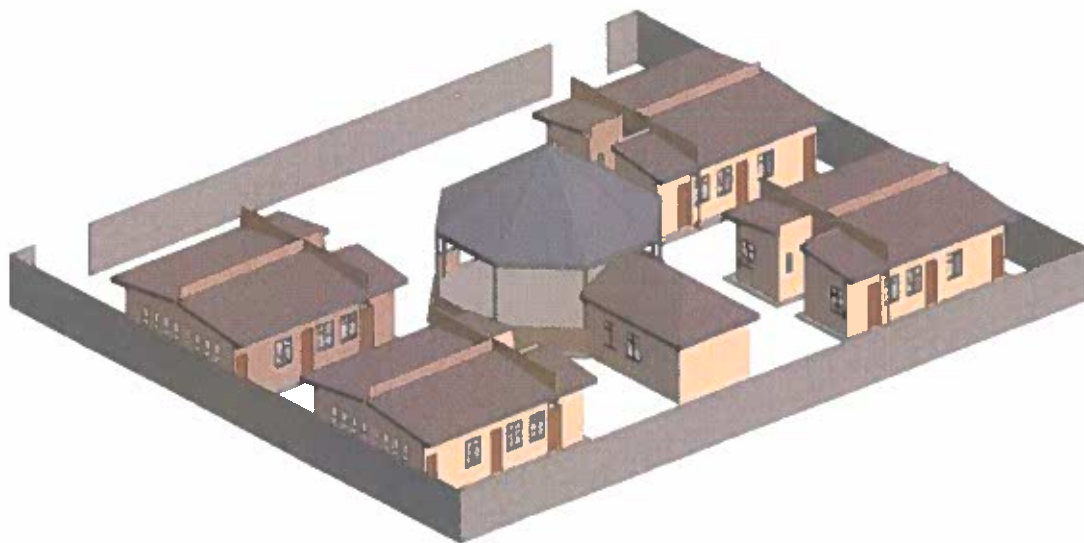

**Guatemalan Women's Health Initiative**

The Guatemalan Women's Health Initiative is focused on empowering 150 indigenous women in a remote area of northwest Guatemala to improve their health by enhancing their health knowledge and self-care practices. The initiative includes three one-day seminars with workshops on the normal functioning and care of their bodies, age-appropriate health and emotional issues, and information regarding family spacing options.

In addition to providing a solid foundation of basic women's health information, the seminars will focus on the importance of good, simple hygiene practices to maintain health. A key element of the hygiene training will be providing reusable menstrual health management kits and education on how to use and care for them properly.

Trainers will include the indigenous Casa Colibri professional nurse, professional indigenous health care workers from Barillas, Huehuetenango, Guatemala, and volunteer health care professionals from the U.S. and Canada who have an established relationship with the villagers in this area. This mix of trainers will further strengthen our partnerships with local groups, enhance credibility, and provide for better follow up and sustainability.

The curriculum and teaching materials are being developed in collaboration with Oakland University William Beaumont School of Medicine. Teaching tools used during the seminar will have long-term value, subsequently being used at the Casa Colibri clinic to reinforce information and provide ongoing health education.

We are intent on ensuring the sustainability of this program. Utilizing Guatemalan trainers and training the local midwives will give them the ability to reinforce the training and train additional women in the villages. Utilizing the training tools in the clinic, following the seminars, will also ensure ongoing reinforcement of the training. The menstrual kits are reusable and have been proven to last 2-4 years with proper care. These kits will be purchased from the Guatemalan location of Days for Girls, meaning they were made by, and helped employ, indigenous women. Our future goal is to train indigenous women in the villages we serve to make the reusable kits, further enhancing sustainability.

**International Project:** Design and Construction of Kindergarten, Library and I.C.T. Centre for Old Lashibi T.M.A. Basic School Project.

**Location:** Ghana Africa

**Rochester Rotary Club's Component:** Sick Bay

**Areas of Focus:** Maternal and Child Health; Disease Prevention and Treatment

**Purpose:** The sick bay will be used in treating pupils who fall sick while in school and will have a ward where pupils can rest until their parents come for them.

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**Introduction:** The Old Lashibi T.M.A. Basic School is located at Old Lashibi in the Tema Municipality. The population of the area according to the 2012 Population Census of Ghana is 78,539 citizens.

During the Rotary West Africa Project Fair of October 2017 held in Accra Ghana, I personally visited this project site along with Rotary International Director Brad Howard, and we spent the entire day interacting with the kids in the school. The school consists of Kindergarten, Primary and Junior High Departments. The Rotary Club of Accra-Spintex District 9102 has adopted the Old Lashibi T.M.A. Basic School in 2012 and they have completed some projects in the school such as the provision of a library, refurbishment and provision of computers for the I.C.T. Centre and painting of the school. They have noticed that the children in kindergarten are in a make-shift wooden structure and are left at the mercy of the weather when it rains. This structure houses two classrooms with an average of forty children in each class. The Accra-Spintex Rotary club has decided to construct a new kindergarten block for the school which will also house a library and I.C.T. Centre for the whole school.

### **Brief Introduction of Rotary Club of Accra Spintex:**

The Rotary Club of Accra Spintex is the 25<sup>th</sup> Rotary Club in Ghana. The club received its Charter certificate on the 17<sup>th</sup> of July, 2012 under District 9102. The club was honored to be the first Rotary Club to be presented with its Charter Certificate by the Rotary International President Sakuji Tanaka who was president for the 2012-2013 Rotary year. The club has over 30 members.

The club has great experience and has undertaken a number of previous projects which include;

- Donation of books and foodstuffs to the Juvenile Correction Centre of the Ghana Prisons Service in Accra
  - Refurbishment and provision of library (furniture and books) to Old Lashibi T.M.A. Basic School
  - Donation of drugs to the LEKMA Hospital during cholera outbreak in 2014
  - Donation of consumables to the LEKMA Health Directorate to be used by field staff on World Polio Day in 2014
  - Refurbishment and provision of computers for Old Lashibi

The facilities to be provided fall under the following Areas of Focus of Rotary;

- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development.

**Disease Prevention and Treatment:** The provision of good toilet facilities as part of the project will help to reduce the spread of air and water borne diseases among pupils and teachers. This will improve the well being and general health of the pupils, teachers and the community as a whole.

**Water and Sanitation:** Good and proper sanitation is achieved when good systems are put in place. This project has been designed to have continuous water supply and good maintenance system.

**Maternal and Child Health:** The sick bay will be used in treating pupils who fall sick while in school and will have a ward where pupils can rest until their parents come for them.

**Basic Education and Literacy:** Four classrooms are envisaged as part of the project. These will reduce the pupil to teacher ratio and the pupils will learn in a good environment.
