What's New for the 2010 Council on Legislation?

Deadline for Submitting Legislation

The deadline to submit legislation for the 2010 Council is 31 December 2008. Legislation must be received by this date in order to be considered duly proposed. Legislation received on or after 1 January 2009 will be considered late—no exceptions for the New Year's holiday will be made.
Legislation proposed or endorsed at a district conference or through a ballot-by-mail should be submitted within 45 days of the conclusion of the conference or the date fixed by the governor for receipt of ballots through a ballot-by-mail. (31 December 2008 still in effect).
Districts are an encouraged to endorse and propose no more than five legislative items per district

3. Districts are encouraged to endorse and propose no more than five legislative items per district.

Deadline for Submitting Amendments

The deadline to receive corrective amendments for legislation received by 31 December 2008 is **31 March 2009** (unless extended by the Constitution and Bylaws Committee).

Publication of Legislation

The volume of Proposed Legislation will be mailed to each governor, past directors, members of the Council, and the secretary of any club that requests it by **30 September 2009**.

The New Timeline is:

31 December 2008 / Year 2 Deadline for receipt of legislation, except the RI Board may submit enactments of an urgent nature until 31 December in the year of the Council (the Board may still submit resolutions at any time)

31 March 2009 / Year 2 Deadline for receipt of amendments by proposers to amend their own proposals

30 September 2009 / Year 3 Deadline for publication of legislation in English

Resolutions

Resolutions will be considered defective, and therefore not transmitted to the 2010 Council, if they

1) require an action or express an opinion that is in conflict with the spirit of the RI constitutional documents; or

2) require or request an administrative act that is within the discretion of the RI Board or the general secretary.

Mount Clemens Rotary Club Bets on Success

A "Night at the Races" was a wonderful success. Six fun-filled races brought laughs and smiles on everyone in attendance. The entire event grossed \$29,000, netting \$25,620. \$5,800 was made on the horses and the betting. The silent auction fell a bit short with only \$8,000. \$7,000 was made on the ticket raffle. Information that appeared in *The Macomb Daily* and in other media:

Celebrating Kentucky Derby season a little early, the Mount Clemens Rotary. Foundation's "A Night at the Races for Charity" was in

April at Zuccaro Banquets & Catering in Chesterfield. Toy stick horses vied for the rosy prize, some decked out to match their "jockeys" in the Derby's signature hats.

Spectators placed sure bets that the club will help people in the greater Mount Clemens area and worldwide. Rotary aims to eliminate polio, get wheelchairs to as many needy people as possible, and provide a way for people who don't have clean water to have it.

A silent auction included a men's wardrobe consultation and custom tailored suit, top-of-the line kitchen cabinets, and a sail on Lake St. Clair on a racing sailboat followed by a yacht club dinner. Bidders came away with a five-day dine-around at five downtown Mount Clemens restaurants, or four days at a three-bedroom Lake Huron cottage.

Someone will be the editor for a day at *The Macomb Daily* and may give their commentary and views to 70,000 readers. Someone also won a quarter page of Macomb Daily display ad space. There were three elaborate hunting packages, two game hunting opportunities in Dryden, and duck hunting on Lake St. Clair. Golfers bid on a PGA-approved physical training program or eight golf lessons from a PGA golf pro.

Auction packages included an in-home portrait session, a U-M football game tailgate party for four, a catered party for 35, and a stock of wine with advice on pairing wine and food. Two people will see the last Pistons game of the season at The Palace with VIP parking pass and Pistons gift certificate, and four will attend a Detroit Tigers game. Someone won a one year single membership to the Macomb Family YMCA, including four professional personal training sessions and access to fitness equipment.

"This is a fun fundraiser," event chair Nancy Dedenbach said. "We had the most fun last year. Everyone got involved and laughed and laughed. It was just a hoot."

Shelterboxes for Myanmar

s the humanitarian crisis worsened in Myanmar's delta region after a powerful cyclone hit on 3 May, a response team of four specially trained volunteers moved into devastated areas to distribute more than 800 ShelterBox containers. More than one million people have been left homeless by the disaster, and 100,000 are feared dead, the United Nations reports.



ShelterBox, a grassroots disaster relief organization supported by

Rotary clubs around the world, was among the first charities to reach cyclone victims. Desperately needed aid from many other international groups had been stalled at the border for days by Myanmar 's military government.

The team will work in cooperation with local groups in Myanmar to line up transportation and determine where the shelters will do the most good amid the massive devastation.

The first deployment of ShelterBoxes will benefit more than 10,000 survivors. Each container provides a tent, stove, water purification kit, blankets, tools, and other necessities to help a family of 10 survive for six months. Some include two 10-person tents, doubling the usual shelter capacity.

With no Rotary presence in Myanmar, Rotarians' direct involvement in the relief effort will be limited. But Beth Palmer, executive director of ShelterBox USA, has noticed a spike in online contributions and says her phone has been "ringing off the hook" as Rotary club members have called to donate. ShelterBox offices in Australia, Canada, and Germany have reported a similar increase in contributions.

Tom Henderson, a member of the Rotary Club of Helston-Lizard, England, and the founder of ShelterBox, says 224 containers left Dubai, United Arab Emirates. Another 220 boxes have been sent from Melbourne, Australia, and 400 were from ShelterBox headquarters in Cornwall, England.

ShelterBox was launched in 2000 as a project of the Helston-Lizard club and quickly garnered support among Rotary clubs worldwide. To date, the nonprofit has raised \$29 million and delivered aid to over 40 countries in response to more than 70 disasters. Each complete ShelterBox costs \$1,000 to sponsor, and Rotary clubs provide about half the charity's funding.
