District 6380 Matching Grants

Very recently, I received the quarterly Activity Report on District 6380 matching grants from The Rotary Foundation. I was very impressed with the bottom figure that indicates that \$436,783 was being awarded by The Rotary Foundation to projects sponsored by our district clubs. However, I was equally unimpressed by the number of District 6380 clubs involved in these projects. Eight clubs sponsored the projects and four other district clubs are partners. That means that our district has 41 clubs that are not involved in matching grants although they might be involved in club-to-club World Community Service projects outside the scope of this Activity Report.

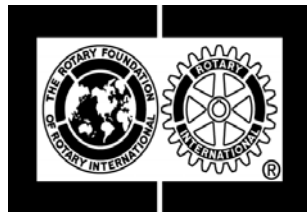
In 1985, I was handed a thin, brown envelope that contained all of the World Community Service project information that our district had accumulated until that time. I still have that envelope and should hang it up as a memorial. World Community Service is what you make it and what your club does with it is entirely up to you. Yes, **you** are the “**U**” in **community** which makes World Community Service possible.

That thin, brown envelope made me get involved in a world that I never knew existed, a world that needs help, Rotary's help, my help. I got to know a loving and caring Rotary Foundation staff at The Rotary Foundation office in Evanston who were willing to help me every step of the way through a matching grant. The Rotary Club of Ridgely became a regular customer of that business office and many of the staff know my name and even recognize my phone number when it comes up on their telephone screen. I try to initiate one new matching grant project for our club every single year. With matching grants in many countries of the world, came a reason to travel to see my projects in action and to keep my eyes open for new projects to be involved in.

In 1997/98, which was my year as district governor in District 6380, I made it my goal for every District 6380 club to be involved in a matching grant project. We had 52 district clubs and I wanted 52 projects so that every club could pin their project on their chest and be very proud of their own project. No, I did not make my goal of 52 projects, but our district had 38 projects that year and a lot of proud Rotarians.

This year, make it your goal to get your club involved in a World Community Service project. As Grants Sub-Committee chair for District 6380, I can and will help you, every step of the way, to a successful project. I even have some really good, affordable, projects in my back pocket that I am willing to share with you. Small projects can make you just as proud as a big project. Don't be afraid of it, jump in, the water is fine.

Rotary Club of Ann Arbor An International Humanitarian Project: Artificial Reefs in the Philippines

The people who live on the archipelago islands of the Philippines subsist largely from the fish they catch in the surrounding seas. These fish congregate primarily on the coral reefs that abound near the islands. With an increasing human population, over-fishing, and reefs dying due to global warming, the food supply of the population of these islands is threatened.

Our Rotary's project is to construct artificial reefs, or *arongs*, to increase the average fish catch. An *arong* is an indigenous fish aggregating device made of bamboo and coconut leaves installed under seawater to attract fish. This device which has been built and used by fishers since 1994 in Taklong Island National Marine Reserve in Guimaras proves to be economically viable, ecologically sound and socially acceptable.

Under the leadership of Don Devine, Len Stenger, and Ashish Sarkar, and with the partnership of the Rotary Club of Gumaca, we have obtained matching funds from Rotary International that have leveraged our contribution of \$6,300 to a total project cost of \$15,000.

The 24 members of the Rotary Club of Gumaca feel a level of ownership in the project beyond the money involved. Every member participated personally, 18 being active in placing the *arongs* at sea.

Results reported informally have been very favorable. Some fishing yields have improved tenfold. The *arong* also seems to be effective as a breeding ground that increases the total fish population.

Ambassadorial Scholarships

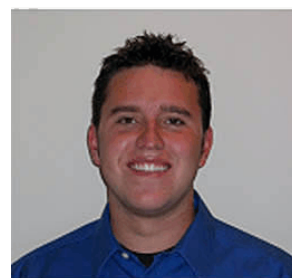

Since then, nearly 7,000 men and women from about 100 nations have studied abroad under its auspices. Today it is the world's largest privately funded international scholarships program. Nearly 800 scholarships were awarded for Study in 2005-06.

The purpose of the Ambassadorial Scholarships program is to further international understanding and friendly relations among people of different countries and geographical areas.
