VETERANS

Ypsilanti Rotary Club member, Bill Vollano, invited me to say a few words at their celebration of the veterans "Service Above Self" luncheon. Many of the veterans who attended shared their memories of past wars – Vietnam, Korea and WWII, as well as the present war in Iraq. The Ypsilanti Rotary is one of the sponsors of the Veterans History Project which is working with Southeast Michigan Veterans to record their experiences for posterity. Rotarian Bill Vollano who is also a veteran has worked very hard as the club's committee chair to make it successful.

POLIO ERADICATION

We all have heard of the importance of polio eradication. But it is most inspiring to hear of our continued successes and advances. With the Bill and Melinda Gates Challenge – \$100 million Matching Grant – each club is motivated to raise \$1,000 a year for three years as our fight to erase the virus goes on ... and we are almost there! Polio cases have decreased by 99 percent and the number of polio endemic countries has fallen to four! Ongoing Rotary participation is crucial!

AWARDS

At the Richmond Rotary Club Christmas party, I had the opportunity to present two Paul Harris Fellow awards and a certificate for an Ambassador of Goodwill. These awards were in recognition of Dental Missionary Trips to Honduras. Assistant Governor Sandy Pradko and her husband, Dr. Brian Pradko, have traveled to small local villages there since 2005 providing dental and medical care. The first Paul Harris was presented to Dr. Brian, and the second one to their friend Randy Brown. Emily Pradko, their daughter, received the certificate for being an Ambassador of Goodwill. Another example of District 6380 Rotarians, "Making Dreams Real," in the world.

EVENING OF CELEBRATION

An Evening of Celebration was held in January to thank past and present Rotary Foundation major donors. They heard first from the 1996-1997 Ambassadorial Scholar Mark Stone who traveled to Uganda, East Africa, to study traditional Ugandan Music. After returning from Uganda, Mark was hired as a music professor at Oakland University. For the past decade, he has been responsible for all the world music courses within the Department of Music. Help Needed - The Aussie GSE Team Is Coming!

The Inbound GSE Team from Australia (see www.rotary6380.org for a brief list of names and vocations) will arrive at Detroit Metro Airport around April 13 and depart by May 16. They comprise Rotarian Ms. Alison Blomkamp (a business coach / consultant) leading a team of four men - Jeff Stark (farm manager), Ian Skinner (crime detective), Ryan Blunden (web designer) and Ian Shaw (accountant). Interested Rotary clubs and Rotarian host families are requested to immediately contact their respective assistant governors who are serving as the focal points for coordinating hosting / vocational / touring plans amongst various sector Rotary clubs. Detailed information questionnaires are available for planning the hosts / itinerary for each GSE member. By March 1, we need to finalize the district's GSE Host / Itinerary Program for their four-week stay. Many clubs have already expressed interest in hosting this fine team, so please hurry and reach your AG if you or your club wants to be involved in this flagship Rotary Foundation program.

Clubs may participate in any of several ways outlined below:

- (a) Provide Rotarian host families for at least three nights per host family;
- (b) Host a 30-minute GSE Team Presentation at their club meeting (smaller clubs may organize a combined club meeting to share expenses and ensure maximum exposure for members to the GSE program);
- (c) Organize or match vocational opportunities for GSE team members with community businesses and organizations;
- (d) Accompany the GSE team for local shopping, sightseeing / cultural visits, entertainment shows and meetings with important dignitaries (clubs have to bear these expenses);
- (e) Arrange in pickup and drop-offs or other transportation needed by the GSE team;
- (f) Share Rotary fellowship by organizing parties or media presentations in the community to promote awareness;
- (g) Provide club banners and souvenirs / token gifts to GSE members

RYLA CONFERENCE MAY 8-10



On the weekend of May 8-10, the 24th Annual Rotary Youth leadership Awards (RYLA) Conference will take place at the Ridgetown Campus of the University of Guelph. The Ridgetown Campus is located in Ridgetown, Ontario, a small farming community of about 3,500 friendly people, an hour northeast of Windsor along the 401 highway.

RYLA is a program for young people designed to develop the qualities of leadership, good citizenship and individual motivation. Leaders from RYLA return to their communities with this training and influence other potential leaders and students in their own schools. It brings together students from southeast Michigan and southwest Ontario for a weekend of speakers, skits, projects and fun. RYLA provides the participants, along with their fellow team members, the chance to learn how to be better leaders, practice their public speaking skills and make new friends, both from the U.S. and Canada as well as from the many countries from which our exchange students come.

Perennial speakers Andy Thibodeau and Sunjay Nath will entertain and challenge their listeners to go back to their home schools and make a difference. As in past years, each group will be asked to pick a major problem facing the world, and to perform a skit about the problem and suggest possible ways they could affect change, both within their own communities and around the world. Those involved in planning the conference are always amazed at the talent and insight that comes out during the skits, which are performed Saturday night after the semiformal banquet held for the delegates and local Rotarians. The projects are judged by a panel of Rotarians and/or their spouses, a task that traditionally proves to be quite difficult.

In early December, letters were sent to high schools in the Michigan part of District 6380 encouraging them to seek out deserving students, those currently active in leadership roles

within the school environment, in Interact clubs, student government or athletics. Similar letters will be sent to the schools in the Chatham-Kent area of the District in January. We encourage your club to work now with high schools in your area to sponsor one or more deserving students to attend this excellent leadership development opportunity. The projected fee for the 2009 RYLA is \$225 (in both U.S. and Canadian funds, although we will monitor the exchange rate over the coming months to arrive at an equitable fee structure). It is our hope that each club will appoint a contact person to be the liaison person with area high schools. It is also our hope that a bus or busses from the Michigan area of the district will again bring their students to and from the conference. We will continue to liaise with the appropriate border officials in both countries to ensure smooth crossings at both borders.

Over the next two months, the 2009 RYLA committee will finalize the registration brochure, including registration form, which will be available for downloading from the RYLA link on the District 6380 Website, along with the permission forms and information about the bus mentioned below. It is also our hope to have online registration available. Payment of fees will be by check or online. Information about RYLA will be updated within the Website as details are finalized.

In these times of economic upheaval and uncertainty, it is essential that we continually help foster a sense of commitment and leadership within our promising young people. Please work with your area schools and help make the 2009 RYLA bigger and better than ever.
