RI Member Access

C lub treasurers and Rotary Foundation committee chairs now can go to Member Access for all of their online Foundation contribution reports. In addition, club presidents and club secretaries can register these two new roles for their clubs on Member Access.

In addition, recent Member Access changes now allow Major Gift advisers, annual giving strategic advisers, and zone challenge coordinators to see Foundation contribution reports. These reports include information about each district's and club's Annual Programs Fund, Permanent Fund, and restricted giving contributions, including totals from the month, year to date, and previous year's totals.

Also available on Member Access is the club recognition summary, which shows all Rotarians' recognition totals, including how many points they have to transfer, and the club's all-time giving information from the charter date.

Other reports include the SHARE report, which details the District Designated Fund for each district, and the polio challenge report, which shows clubs' progress with this year's polio eradication fundraising goals.

After changing planes in Los Angeles, they arrived 30 hours later on February 28, morning in Brisbane, to the heat of the Australian summer, and an even warmer welcome by District 9630 Aussie Rotarians and host families. After a day of rest and relaxation, the team went about their "ambassadorial" mission to build goodwill and understanding by sharing their knowledge of our Great Lakes Rotary region. After a fortnight of Rotary programs, vocational outings and sightseeing, Barry and his team were formally introduced at the District 9630 district conference, March 13-15, where DG Chris Wright feted our GSE in the presence of District 9630 Rotarians - even as rain-bearing Cyclone Hamish bore down hard around the conference resort located on the Gold Coast region off Eastern Australia. Notes on the cyclone from Barry: "A cyclone dumped considerable rain on the coast, including Brisbane and where the district conference was, north of Brisbane. The winds subsided in Toowoomba 120 kms west from Brisbane where they were quite steady. I can assure all here in the Toowoomba and area where we traveled welcomed the predicted rain. They continue with an eight-year drought with the reservoirs at only 10 percent capacity. They received a good rain just the night before we arrived so all is quite green here in the town. And, by the way, all is going very well here with an excellent organization working like clockwork. We all had a very good vocational day. We are being hosted very well, including during the day, at Rotary meetings and most certainly in the evenings with our host Rotarians! And I am very pleased with how well the members of the team are functioning as a unit - it is being noted as we travel around!"

Update on our Guatemalan Family Christine Lind Hage President, Rochester Rotary

Linda and Jay Eastman go to Guatemala to staff a medical clinic that our club and several others in the district helped establish. On one of their trips they met a little girl, Maria Ingrid, who had a severe disfigurement. Maria and her parents were here for about three months and she underwent surgery to remove a growth. She had some complications, but was finally able to go back to Guatemala.

Dear Friends in Rotary,



Maria Ingrid and her parents are being escorted home as I write this. It's been a long, arduous, emotional journey. We did the best we possibly could for little Ingrid. She has become so near and dear to our hearts. There is no doubt that her

life will be different now. She will never have to hide her face in shame or endure the heartless taunts of others. People can get to know her for the darling child that she is, rather than shun her because of something unsightly on her face. Her parents are awash with gratitude.

I spent the whole afternoon with Ingrid yesterday. She looked FANTASTIC. Her stitches are out and the scar is healing very nicely. She looks so cute! She was as animated and active as any other 2 1/2-year-old kid. She was dancing, running around, asking me to read book after book to her, giving me lots of hugs and kisses, and speaking in three languages. She's a remarkable, wonderful little girl.

You probably know that the doctors had to put a shunt in her head to take the fluid off of her brain. When they went in to remove the screw which they had used to fasten the bone graft, fluid ran out of the incision and would not stop for two straight days. The neurosurgeon had no choice. My heart fell 25 stories when I learned this. However, we have to be positive and hope and pray for the best. We have a good plan in place for them in Guatemala, and we went over the drill 100 times. Her parents know exactly what to look for and who to call if there are any symptoms whatsoever. We have lined up a pediatrician (a Rotarian!) in the nearest city a couple of hours away who knows her history and is ready to care for her if the need arises. It is the very best we can do under the circumstances.

The family left today at 6 a.m. They were melancholy, especially Magdalena. She said over and over that we are every bit as much her family as her loved ones in Guatemala. They both said they shall never, ever forget the kindness shown to them during their stay here in the United States.

Thank you for your concern, kind words of encouragement, donations, and especially your prayers. We felt uplifted many times when we were close to despair. I know I need some time to digest the whole experience. It has been an emotional roller coaster, to say the least, but I believe that Ingrid's life has changed dramatically for the better. Knowing that she will be able to live a normal life makes our emotional investment well worth it. She will always be our little love!
