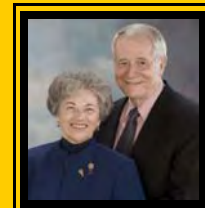

These thrilling words were spoken at the Rotary convention by Dr. Bruce Aylward, the head of the Polio Eradication Efforts for WHO. Dr. Aylward told us that a new vaccine which kills both remaining types of polio is helping to complete this feat. "Thanks to you Rotary for making this happen" were the words he used several times during his speech. There are fewer new cases being reported this year than ever before - 99% fewer cases than even last year. We promised the world that we would eliminate polio from the earth 25 years ago, and our promise will soon be fulfilled. We still need to continue our efforts at fundraising to bring this mission to its conclusion, but the end is in sight, and we can all be proud and grateful for this significant accomplishment. Millions of lives will be spared ruination from this disease, and billions of dollars will be able to be used for helping solve other world problems once polio is no longer with us.

It has been a pleasure for me to serve as district governor this year. I have enjoyed meeting so many of you when I visited your clubs and participated in some of your very special events throughout the year. I was amazed and delighted to learn about all the projects that every one of our clubs is doing. The numbers of fundraising events in our district is great, and the wonderful projects that result from the monies raised by these events are astounding. Many, many thanks to all of you for the wonderful work that you are carrying on in our Rotary clubs. I look forward to continuing on my Rotary journey in the months and years ahead, and I know that I will be working with all of you as you continue on in your Rotary journeys.

Ask someone to become a member of your Rotary club in the very near future. You will be giving them the opportunity of a lifetime. They will be joining an organization that is determined to make life sweeter, healthier, and safer for all humankind.

## The Rotary Leadership Institute Great Lakes Division

Excellent leadership is the key to successful service by our clubs to our communities and the world. The purpose of the Rotary Leadership Institute is to assist in improving the Rotary knowledge and leadership skills of the future leaders of our Rotary clubs.

Club presidents are requested to support this program by identifying club members with leadership potential to recommend them for participation in this program. This program consists of three full-day parts presented over time. The programs are presented using the facilitated discussion method, rather than lecture. The fee includes breakfast, lunch and training materials. The cost will vary based on location. It is suggested the club fund participation of club members.

Any club member of any district is invited to attend any event. Parts are to be taken sequentially. All sessions are facilitated by certified discussion leaders, who are all Rotary governors.

Part I covers Leadership Characteristics, Rotary Beyond the Club, Team-Building, Rotary Foundation I, Membership Retention, and Service Projects.

Part II covers Leadership Goal Setting, The Rotary Foundation II, Communication Skills, Ethics-Vocational Service, Membership Recruitment, and Analyzing Your Rotary Club.

Part III includes International Service, Effective Leadership Strategies (double session), Rotary Opportunities, Leadership-Public Relations, and Making a Difference.

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## NOTEWORTHY NEWS - NPPC Monthly Update from the PolioPlus Division

Someone You Should Know . . .

PolioPlus Staff Profile – This month we are featuring Amy Young, Senior Coordinator for the PolioPlus Partners Program. Background/job responsibilities: Amy began her Rotary career in the Educational Programs Division, where she spent eight years working first as a Senior Scholarship Coordinator for students pursuing studies in German-speaking countries, and then as Resource Development Supervisor responsible for overseeing the scholarship application process. After a 6 year absence from the organization, Amy returned to Rotary two years ago, and assumed her current role as Senior Coordinator for the PolioPlus Partners Program. In her current position, she coordinates grants for National PolioPlus Committee Chairs in the endemic and high-risk polio-affected countries, helping them to secure funds for their social mobilization and surveillance needs. Amy would like you to know: “that it is a privilege to work with such a dedicated group of Rotarians who commit so much of themselves each and every day to the cause of polio eradication.

### **Success Stories ~ Read about some positive developments in the fight against polio:**

#### **India**

· Bill Gates, Co-Chair of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, traveled to the Kosi River area in May to witness firsthand the challenges associated with eradicating polio in this part of the world. The Kosi River basin is surrounded by a dozen or more tributaries and is often submerged in the monsoon season, making it difficult to reach children living there. New approaches to vaccinating the children, including the use of better maps to track shifting populations, more frequent vaccination rounds, and the use of the bivalent vaccine are having a positive impact. As of 18 May, India is reporting 20 polio cases this year as compared to 43 at the same time last year.

#### **Pakistan**

· Two recently approved PolioPlus Partners Grants will help support the following polio eradication efforts in Pakistan:

**Cross-Border Shelters** – In 2008, Rotary approved the construction of two cross-border shelters to be used for immunizations at the Torkham border crossing between Afghanistan and Pakistan. Based on the success of that project, Rotary has approved funding for two more shelters at the Chaman border crossing. One of the shelters will be placed on the Pakistan side of the border in the city of Killa Abdullah, Balochistan, and the other on the Afghanistan side in the city of Kandahar. The shelters will be inaugurated at a ceremony planned for the first week of July.

**Regional Pakistan Lab Upgrade** – a grant was approved to help strengthen the work of the WHO Regional Reference Laboratory for Polio Eradication in Pakistan. The lab serves as an important source for identifying polio cases in both Pakistan and Afghanistan, and continues to earn high levels of recognition for its excellent work. In addition to providing funding for instruments and chemicals, the grant will pay for two scientists from the lab to travel to the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta for two months of training.

#### **Nigeria**

· The 19th Expert Review Committee for Polio Eradication and Routine Immunization in Nigeria has published an official report from the meeting, which was held in March 2010. The report highlights the tremendous progress achieved in Nigeria in the second half of 2009 and early 2010. It also emphasizes the need to maintain the momentum that has been gained from these successes, and warned against any complacency at this critical stage in the eradication effort. Some of the recommendations for building on recent successes include more engagement with Local Government Areas (LGAs) in the high risk areas, more federal and state government oversight, continued engagement with traditional leadership, enhanced quality of immunization activities, and increased community mobilization.

#### **Cote d'Ivoire**

· President Laurent Gbagbo signed the Kick Polio Out of Africa (KPOA) ball on Monday, 17 May, at a ceremony attended by many Rotarians, representatives from WHO, UNICEF and

several governmental officials. At that time, President Gbagbo also pledged FCFA 20,000,000 (about US\$36,000) to The Rotary Foundation for polio eradication activities. This is the leader's 3rd contribution to the effort. He also made FCFA 10,000,000 contributions in March 2003 and March 2007.

#### **Policy Matters**

GPEI Strategic Plan Officially Unveiled

· The GPEI Strategic Plan 2010-2012 was officially presented for review at the World Health Assembly in Geneva, Switzerland, on 17-21 May. The text version of the plan is now available online at the [www.polioeradication.org](http://www.polioeradication.org) website.

#### **Advocacy Awareness**

· The following inter-governmental meetings scheduled to take place:

25th France-Africa Summit – Nice, France, 31 May - France. Global Polio Eradication Initiative Stakeholders meeting - 18 June - WHO Director General and UNICEF Executive Director will co-host a meeting of an expanded group of potential donor countries and key polio-affected countries to publically launch the new Strategic Plan. Also in attendance will be Incoming Trustee Chair Carl Wilhelm Stenhammar and CDC Director Tom Frieden.

G8 Summit 2010, Huntsville, Ontario, Canada, 25-27 June 14th African Union (AU) Summit, Entebbe, Uganda, 25-27 July - The theme of the summit is maternal and child health and presents an important opportunity to highlight polio eradication as part of that concern.

## Ambassador of Goodwill Award Fifth Anniversary

The Ambassador of Goodwill Award (AGA) is presented to our district's Rotarians and Rotaracts who travel to another country at their own expense to further the goals and objectives of Rotary. Those traveling to other countries (excluding Canada) to support Rotary projects, receive Rotary training, attend Rotary conferences, participate in Friendship Exchange visits, or engage in other Rotary activities are eligible for this award. Travel may include sightseeing and other non-Rotary activities as long as an official Rotary activity is included. Traveling Rotary spouses and other family members are also recognized with the Ambassador of Goodwill pin.

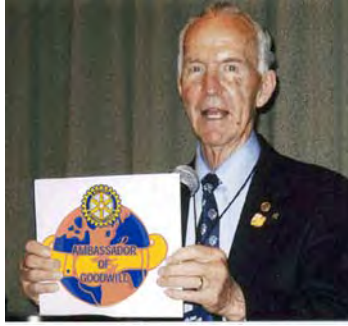
A little more than four years ago at the 2006 District Conference, Ann Arbor Rotarian Phil Alexander, chair of the District Friendship Exchange Committee (DFEC), read the names of the initial 24 recipients of the new AGA. As of now, 134 certificates have been awarded to 76 of our district's members. Six have earned five or more, including one member who has earned ten! At present, we are the only district that offers the AGA.

When Phil Alexander initially developed the award, he had several things in mind. In addition to providing club and district recognition of individual Rotarians' self-financed travel for international service activities on behalf of Rotary, he felt that calling attention to the international activities of Rotarians could add publicity in the media for the general public. This was consistent with one of past RI President Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar's key goals: to raise public awareness of Rotary and be supportive of the Rotary International's Global Public Image Campaign.

Also, in the longer run, it was believed that as an RI-wide program, by recognizing the award recipients at the annual district conference, the district could provide key information to Rotary International for strategic planning purposes via the DFEC chairs' annual reports. This information could then be aggregated to give a reliable measure of individual Rotarian participation in international service activities for all of Rotary. Since the information includes the purposes of travel, as well as the Rotary clubs, districts and countries visited, the aggregate data could also be analyzed to provide useful feedback on various RI programs and initiatives.

We believe that there can be a greater number of awardees every year in our district, so we are attempting to increase the knowledge of it, including via this article. Also, although the AGA has thus far been solely our district's award, the plan in the near future is to get some other districts to begin offering the award. We are delighted that, thanks to Governor Judy Garver's efforts, RI encouraged all of its English-speaking chairs of DFECs to learn more about AGA at the Montreal convention. After a couple of more districts have tried the AGA, which they are certain to appreciate, then it can be presented to RI for approval. In a few years, our district will be honored by Phil's great concepts in designing this or award when it becomes RI-wide.

## District 6380 Peace Initiatives

There has always been a strong emphasis on promoting world peace and understanding between all peoples in Rotary. All of the Rotary Foundation programs such as Group Study Exchange, Peace Scholars, and Ambassadorial Scholars support this principle. Service projects that alleviate hunger and poverty, bring medical help to those who need it, bring clean water to those without it help to foster peaceful relations amongst all people and nations.

This year a Peace Committee was established in our district to ensure that this core value of Rotary was fostered and maintained through various activities and initiatives.

Two initiatives that were started this year were the establishment of the Rotary Peace Communities Program in our district and the re-installation and enhancement of the Rotary Peace Summit website which had been set up for the 2008 Rotary Peace Summit held in Windsor. West Bloomfield was declared the first District 6380 Peace Community in June 2009, and the website is now functional at [www.rotarypeaceproject.org](http://www.rotarypeaceproject.org)

Plans are underway to have a district-wide celebration of World Peace Day (September 23) by having a week-long series of programs and events during that week. This program will take place during the week that we have our District Foundation Celebration that concludes with the Knock It Out of the Park Rotary celebration at Comerica Park September 25.

The initial plan for our Peace Committee has been that there will be a steering committee to coordinate District Peace Initiatives. The committee will also serve as a resource group for clubs that wish to organize their own community-based peace initiatives such as the Peace Community Program. We are hoping that each club will appoint a Peace Champion for the club to oversee the club's involvement in District Peace Programs and club initiated programs.

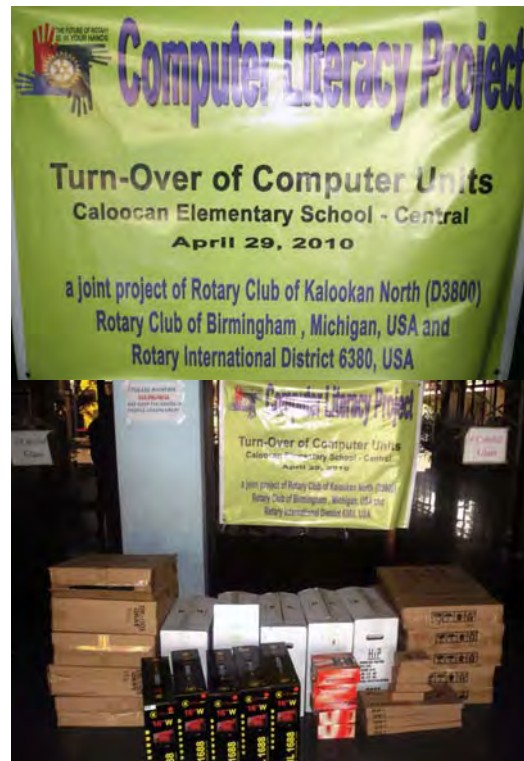

An annual highlight of every RYLA is the presentation of the group skits that tackled a world problem, such as discrimination, water conservation and literacy, offering both an explanation of the problem and some possible solutions that could occur worldwide or back within their own communities. As usual, the quality of the presentations made it very difficult for the judges to pick an ultimate winner. Our guest speaker, Harold Pankrac from Chatham, presented an amazing talk about the fun factor, and how to accomplish great things while still making it fun for all those involved. Over the course of his hour presentation, Harold received three standing ovations. As usual, many thanks go out to the many Rotary clubs in both Chatham Kent and Michigan for sponsoring all of these great kids for a weekend that we hope they will remember for a long time.
