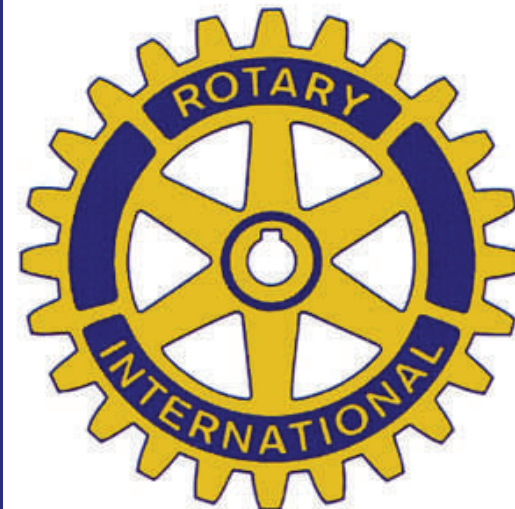

Clean Water Project in the Dominican Republic

I (a member of the Sterling Heights Rotary Club) have led several projects, with the cooperation of the Rotary Club of Bonao and supported by Rotary clubs in our District 6380, to install BioSand water filters for poor people in the central part of the Dominican Republic. More than 1,100 filters have been installed resulting in more than 13,000 people having access to clean water. I have built up a rapport with the Bonao Rotary Club having traveled there six times to observe the results and check on the sustainability of the several projects.

I have applied for a Rotary Foundation District Grant and am seeking financial contributions to fulfill this grant. Interactors Make Pictographs for Water Project

High school students from the Troy and Novi Rotary Interact clubs met with John and Eileen Heasley to learn about BioSand filters. The students plan to make pictograph directions to accompany the written directions given to those receiving a filter in the 2011 Ecuador Water Filter Project.

Epidemiologist Erica Gwynn organized the project. Erica worked in Mexico as part of a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship in 2007-8. She explained that, during that year, it was the young people who made her project a success and they continue to implement her changes. Now that she has returned, she wants to motivate our young people to help bring safe drinking water to those most in need.

The four-hour workshop began with a discussion about the benefits of the BioSand filter and how it works. The group then spent time sifting sand and gravel to actually commission a filter. Interactors were excited about the project. They learned more about how the BioSand filter works and met new friends to work with them on the project.

Queensland Premieres Disaster Relief Appeal

The very major floods we have been hearing about in South Queensland, Australia is exactly where the District 6380 GSE Team spent four weeks in March 2009. We spent eight days in Toowoomba which is the location of the viral video of the cars piling up along a creek on January 1 just after six inches of rain fell in 30 minutes on already very wet land. This was very close to where six of the seven Rotary clubs in Toowoomba have their meeting place. These are the comments from my Rotarian hosts, Graham and Margaret Christensen received on January 23.

"Tmba residences were not greatly affected -- just a few. See our most recent newsletter (including opportunity to donate to The Rotary Flood Appeal SQ). Mostly it was businesses along the line of the West Creek and East Creek, possibly up to 100 affected -- some quite badly though. Most are back in business to some extent. The council cleanup and road repairs will take ages with bridges washed away and metal railings demolished. Despite the two deaths in Toowoomba and the shock/awe of the event, Toowoomba was really quite lucky comparatively -- or let's say, one of the luckier communities. The towns out west of us (Darling Downs and Outback for 300 km -- very flat and very good farmland) have been flooded several times since early December and then with most of entire towns affected (too numerous to list, including St. George and Chinchilla where our team spent two weeks.) They are those where the water flows on down the Condamine, Bollone, Warrego Rivers into the Darling and in a few months time into the Murray River of South Australia. The real tragedies are East of the Great Dividing Range from the Eastern escarpment of Toowoomba. Massive destruction and high loss of life, many still missing and another body just found today -- some up to 80 km away. The creek beds with water substantially now subsided are like masses of trees all piled up with cars, trucks, vehicles unrecognizable, water tanks and farm houses all intermingled for about 80 km from Toowoomba but with total creek lengths about 1,000 km all up in the tributaries -- one hell of a mess and one body was found in a mangled house after the house had been searched twice previously. Still some water holes may contain bodies under gravel and trees after the water fully recedes."

In the Brisbane, Ipswich, Goodna, Jindalee and Oakley areas where we spent one week, the flooding and damage was/is the most severe along the Brisbane River. Here are comments from my Rotarian hosts, David and Sue Herbert, in this area received January 24.

"Thanks for your concern. Our house, as you know, is up a hill so everything has been fine with us, however our kids had major problems. Emma has a house right on the river and despite being 20 feet above the normal river level she had water five feet high through the lower ground floor. She lost furniture, bedding, and a lot of stored items. Michael's house is on West Lake not far away and the whole of the ground floor went under. We have spent the last week tearing out plaster walls, all the cabinets in kitchen and bathrooms etc. Nine of the guys in Rotary came over last Wednesday and helped enormously. I am attaching a link to our last club bulletin which describes to some extent what happened and who was affected and the opportunity to donate."

Rotary Club of Ann Arbor North Adds Ronald McDonald House to Its List of Service Projects

On an extremely cold Saturday evening, January 22, seven Rotarians from the Ann Arbor North Rotary Club gathered enthusiastically to cook and serve a French-theme menu at Ann Arbor's Ronald McDonald House. This was the club's inaugural volunteering event at RMH, and they were supported by four Rotary family members, one RYE student from France, and two members of Skyline High School Interact Club. The event was championed and coordinated by Brigitte Romero and RCAAN President Charlotte Luttrell. More than 30 family members of long-term pediatric and neonatal patients enjoyed the hospitality and warmth of compassionate ears offered by the Rotarians as they deal with health challenges faced by their loved ones undergoing treatment at the U-M C.S. Mott Children's Hospital, Ann Arbor. The project was funded by the club's 50/50 raffle and Happy Dollars collected at weekly meetings, as well as the generosity of club Rotarians. From the members' unanimous positive feedback on this unique opportunity for combining fellowship with service, the club intends to cook quarterly and add the RMH to their long list of community partners.

Rotary International Foundation Approves District 6380 Sanitation Project in Eastern India

The Rotary Club of Ann Arbor North in partnership with the Rotary Club of Kolkatta Midtown (India) recently organized a consortium of five District 6380 Rotary Clubs (Ann Arbor, Ferndale, Milan, Saline and Ypsilanti) to apply for a District Simplified Grant. District Foundation Chair PDG Don Chisholm has confirmed that the application has just been approved by the Rotary International Foundation. Known as Project Dignity, the project intends to provide 100 toilet-septic systems to rural families in the Sunderbans Islands, an ecologically vulnerable part of Eastern India. Each toilet-septic system costs approximately \$100 installed. Project Dignity has been established by the Rotary Club of Kolkata and the Ramakrishna Mission (an interfaith NGO) to empower women from rural households to become economically independent and productive by resolving pervasive health and sanitation problems. The project enables literacy for schoolchildren, and ensures that families learn clean toilet habits, so that they are less likely to fall sick or succumb to diarrhea (a leading cause of death from water-borne illnesses in many third-world countries). The club welcomes new contributions from District 6380 clubs, which will help increase the number of installed new toilets (as the need is for 3,000 toilets). Several thousand pounds of food was sorted and packed for distribution to the needy. 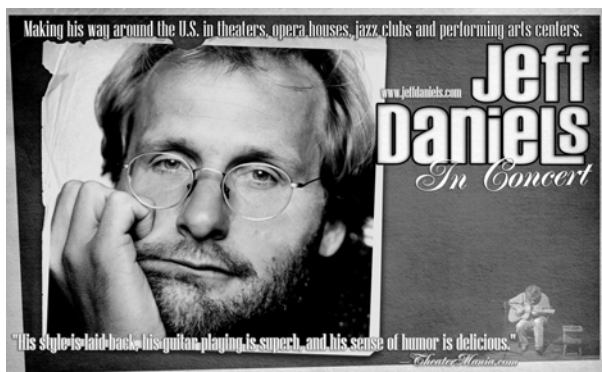
the members of Utica-Shelby for their fine achievement.

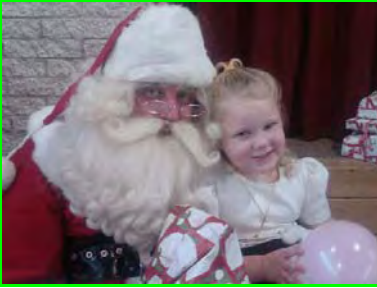
